

Welcome to the Unlocking Buckinghamshire's Past website, which includes the archaeological database (Sites and Monuments Record) for the county of Buckinghamshire. The database contains over 17,000 records not only of traditional archaeological sites like excavations, earthworks and stray artefacts but also historic buildings and landscapes and covers periods from the earliest humans to the twentieth century. You can text search or search using the digital map. You can look at what is in the database about your parish or read a period overview of archaeology in the whole county. There are free teaching resources for use at Key Stages 2 and 3. There are also guides on how to start researching the past and getting involved in archaeology, and much more!

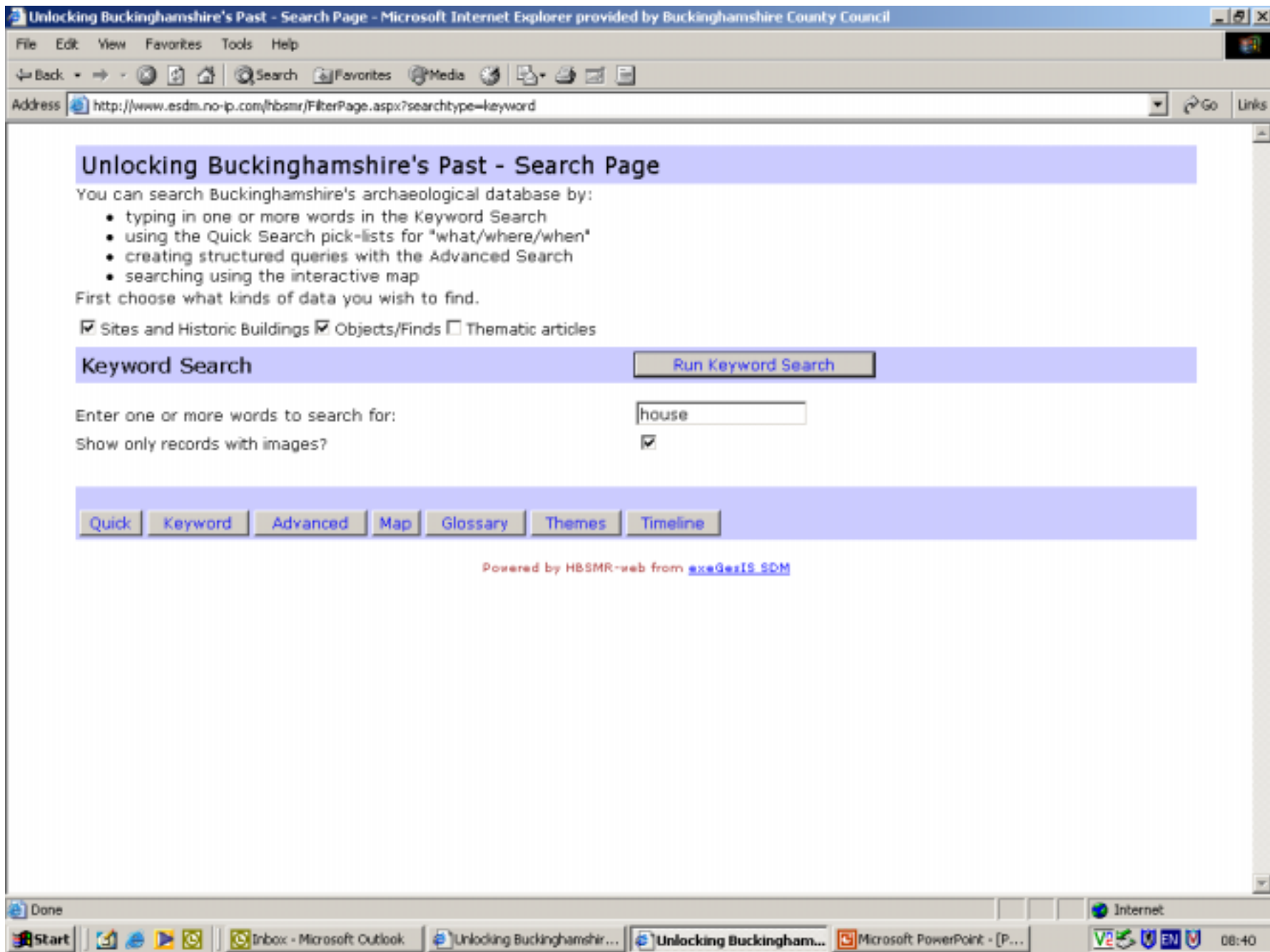

Archaeological skills and concepts

These worksheets can be used on their own to get pupils familiar with methods of investigating the past other than looking at historical documents, or with enquiry based worksheets looking at the archaeological remains left from each period. Below are short descriptions of what each worksheet aims to do and links to the full worksheet, should you want to use it.

National Curriculum Links

This worksheet is intended to supplement historical knowledge, skills and understanding. Many archaeological skills also involve geographical skills.

History; Key Stage 2; Knowledge, skills and understanding
