Calverton, Passenheim Quarry Extension	Evaluation	Northamptonshire Archaeology	2006/01/27	Further trenched evaluation identified a series of sub-rectangular plots within an area enclosed by a ditch that formed a continuous boundary around the north west and north east sides. The site was characterised by ditches, gullies, pits and stone-walled structures, including a circular building and possible metal track. Recovered finds included Romano-British pottery, animal bone, a piece of glass and metalwork indicating activity from the 2nd to 4th centuries. The presence of building materials including hypocaust tile, brick and roof tile suggests that the site is on the periphery of a relatively well appointed settlement.	Article
Wavendon, Nova MK1	Geophysical Survey	Northamptonshire Archaeology	2006/02	Magnetic susceptibility followed by detailed gradiometer survey revealed a sub-rectangular enclosure and linear anomalies in the northern part of the site. The south east of the site revealed a possible extension to an existing field boundary and possible tree planting pits. The area of the former exhibition ground was revealed to be highly disturbed. North Crawley, Brook End Farm	Building Assessment	Northamptonshire Archaeology	2006/02	18th century timber-framed and weatherboarded barn attached to Grade II listed 17th century farmhouse. Probably constructed as an animal shelter reusing some timbers. Now in a poor condition and with a corrugated iron roof.	Note
North Crawley, 7a High St	Evaluation	Archaeological Services & Consultancy	2006/02/01	Archaeological evaluation comprising 4 trenches failed to reveal remains of the buildings shown on the 1815 OS map. However, sparse features of probable agricultural origin containing a small quantity of probable medieval pottery were revealed in addition to a small dog or cat burial.	Note
Bow Brickhill, Belvedere Nurseries	Watching Brief	Oxford Archaeology	2006/02/23	The watching brief revealed evidence for a Roman field system. Four ditches were identified from which Roman pottery and animal bone were recovered. Previous work had revealed Roman inhumations, though none were seen during the watching brief.	Note

Emberton, Petsoe Wind Farm	Evaluation	Albion Archaeology	2006/02/23	7 Cruciform trenches were positioned on the proposed sites of the 7 wind turbines. A further linear trench was opened on the site of the proposed substation. Archaeological deposits were present in trenches 1 and 6. Trench 1 revealed 2 ditches on a perpendicular alignment which may represent part of a late Iron Age/early Roman field system or enclosure. Trench 6 revealed 2 parallel undated ditches which may have formed part of a trackway. The remaining trenches contained no archaeological features.	Note
