

PLANNING AREA 1 – BUCKINGHAM AND NORTH AYLESBURY VALE**1.1 AREA APPRAISAL**

This area covers a large rural area in the north of the County bordering on the neighbouring authorities of Milton Keynes, Northamptonshire and Oxfordshire. It also borders on Aylesbury Town and East, West and South Aylesbury Vale.

There are two main centres of population namely Buckingham and Winslow which have both experienced extensive housing developments over recent years.

1.2 PATTERN OF SCHOOLS

There are two secondary schools in the planning area:

- Buckingham Upper School (11-18)
- Royal Latin Grammar School (11-18)

7 combined schools and one junior school feed into the above schools.

1.3 MIGRATION OF PUPILS

Buckingham School shares the southern part of its catchment area with Waddesdon CE School (see Area 2) from which the majority of pupils attend Waddesdon CE School.

From September 1999, pupils in their transfer year at Winslow CE Combined School will have the option of attending either Cottesloe School (see Area 3) or Buckingham School. This is to reduce the intake to Buckingham School that exceeded its capacity from September 1999.

Royal Latin School takes just under half of its intake from outside of its catchment area, the majority being from Milton Keynes.

1.4 PUPILS FROM NEW HOUSING

The following major housing developments have been identified within this planning area and have been incorporated into the projected pupil numbers.

PLANNING AREA 2 – AYLESBURY TOWN PLUS SOUTH AND WEST AYLESBURY VALE**2.1 AREA APPRAISAL**

This is a predominantly rural area in the west of the County bordering on Oxfordshire, Buckingham, Eastern Aylesbury Vale, Princes Risborough, and Chesham and Amersham areas of the County.

There are three main centres of population at Waddesdon, Aylesbury and Wendover with significant housing developments planned in Aylesbury Town area.

2.2 PATTERN OF SCHOOLS

There are 8 secondary schools in the planning area:

- 3 grammar schools (11-18)
- 4 upper schools (11-18)
- 1 upper school (11-15)

16 combined and 6 junior schools within Aylesbury Vale feed into the above schools plus schools in Oxfordshire and Princes Risborough. In addition the 3 grammar schools take pupils from the Princes Risborough and Great Missenden areas.

2.3 MIGRATION OF PUPILS

Waddesdon CE School shares the northern part of its catchment area with Buckingham Upper School from which the majority of pupils attend Waddesdon. In addition, pupils from elsewhere in Buckingham Upper School's catchment area attend Waddesdon CE School.

Approximately one and a half forms of entry come from Milton Keynes to the 3 grammar schools in Aylesbury Town. This influx may reduce in the future due to the opening of two new secondary schools in Milton Keynes. In addition there is an influx of about 2/3 of a form of entry to the Aylesbury Grammar Schools from Hertfordshire and Oxfordshire.

There is significant movement of pupils in the planning area between the catchment areas of the upper schools. On the one hand there is movement from upper schools in the town to upper schools in the rural areas and on the other hand migration between catchment areas in the town resulting in over and under subscription at particular schools.

Part of Mandeville's catchment area is shared with Princes Risborough. The majority of pupils, approximately 1 form of entry, attend Princes Risborough.

PLANNING AREA 3 – EASTERN AYLESBURY VALE**3.1 AREA APPRAISAL**

This is a rural area in the east of the County bordering on Hertfordshire, Bedfordshire, Milton Keynes, Aylesbury Town and Buckingham.

3.2 PATTERN OF SCHOOLS

There is one upper school serving the planning area:

Cottesloe School (11-18)

7 combined schools feed into Cottesloe School. In addition, pupils in their transfer year at Winslow CE Combined School have the option of attending either Cottesloe School or Buckingham School with assisted transport. (See Area 1 appraisal)

3.3 MIGRATION OF PUPILS

There is a small influx from Aylesbury Town and approximately one and a half forms of entry from Milton Keynes. The pattern of intake in this area may also be affected in the future by the building of two new secondary schools in Milton Keynes.

3.4 PUPILS FROM NEW HOUSING

There are no major housing developments planned within this secondary planning area.

3.5 COMMENTARY

The appraisal shows that in this planning area there will be:

- 24 (2%) place **deficit** in 2003
- 33 (3%) place **deficit** in 2005*
- 2 (0%) place **surplus** in 2008

PLANNING AREA 4 – PRINCES RISBOROUGH AND GREAT MISSENDEN**4.1 AREA APPRAISAL**

This is a predominantly rural area with centres of population at Princes Risborough and Great Missenden.

It borders on Oxfordshire, Aylesbury Town and Aylesbury Vale, Wycombe and the Chesham and Amersham areas.

4.2 PATTERN OF SCHOOLS

There are 2 upper schools in the planning area:

- The Misbourne School (11-18)
- Princes Risborough School (11-18)

8 combined schools and 1 junior school feed into the above schools.

4.3 MIGRATION OF PUPILS

The Misbourne School admits a significant number of pupils from outside its own catchment area in particular from the catchment areas of Chesham Park, Princes Risborough (though this is declining) and Sir William Ramsay schools.

Princes Risborough School shares part of its catchment area with Mandeville School (see Area 2 appraisal). The majority of pupils, approximately one form of entry, attend Princes Risborough. It also takes approximately one form of entry, on parental preference, from the Cressex catchment area.

4.4 PUPILS FROM NEW HOUSING

The following major housing developments have been identified within this planning area and have been incorporated into the projected pupil numbers.

PLANNING AREA 5 – CHESHAM & AMERSHAM TOWNS PLUS THE CHALFONT AREA**5.1 AREA APPRAISAL**

This area is a mix of rural areas with urban centres at Chesham, Amersham, the Chalfonts, Iver and Iver Heath, Denham and Gerrards Cross.

It borders on Hertfordshire, Slough, Beaconsfield, Burnham, High and West Wycombe, Princes Risborough and Great Missenden, and Aylesbury Town.

5.2 PATTERN OF SCHOOLS

There are 6 secondary schools in the planning area:

- 3 Grammar Schools (11-18)
- 3 Upper Schools (11-18)

13 combined schools and 9 junior schools feed into the upper schools with the grammar schools also admitting pupils from out-county.

5.3 MIGRATION OF PUPILS

There is considerable movement of pupils into and within the planning area as follows:

Dr Challoner's Grammar School admits pupils from out-county and in particular from Hertfordshire.

Chesham High School has recently admitted a significant number of pupils, also from Hertfordshire.

Amersham School admits approximately one form of entry from Chesham Park School catchment area and half a form of entry from the catchment areas of Holmer Green and the Chalfonts.

The Chalfonts Community College admits pupils from the Beaconsfield catchment area.

7.3 MIGRATION OF PUPILS

There is a significant influx from outside of the planning area to Great Marlow School and to Sir William Borlase's School.

7.4 PUPILS FROM NEW HOUSING

There are no major housing developments planned within this secondary planning area.

The appraisal shows that there will be a **deficit** in the planning area of:

- 150 (8%) places in 2003
- 215 (11%) places in 2005*
- 61 (3%) places in 2008

PLANNING AREA 9 – BURNHAM AND SURROUNDING VILLAGES**9.1 AREA APPRAISAL**

This is a mixture of urban and rural areas, the main centre of population being at Burnham. It is now closely associated with Slough in the southeast and Maidenhead and Windsor in the southwest, Beaconsfield and Chesham and Amersham towns.

9.2 PATTERN OF SCHOOLS

There are 2 schools in the planning area:-

- Burnham Upper School (11-18)
- Burnham Grammar School (11-18)

5 combined schools feed into the upper school. Out-county pupils feed into both schools.

9.3 MIGRATION OF PUPILS

The upper school and the grammar school admit about a significant number of pupils from outside their catchment area, mainly from Slough. (The catchment area of the upper school extends into NW Slough).

9.4 PUPILS FROM NEW HOUSING

There are no major housing developments planned within this secondary planning area.

9.5 COMMENTARY

The appraisal shows that in this planning area there will be:

- 22 (1%) place **deficit** in 2003
- 15 (1%) place **surplus** in 2005*
- 84 (5%) place **surplus** in 2008
