1. THE APPLICATION

1.1 Variation application

Subject: Application to vary the premises licence in respect to Mango, Silver Street, Aylesbury

On the 25 April 2012 a number of important changes were made to the Licensing Act 2003 and the regulations and the statutory guidance made under the Act. These changes form part of the Coalition Government's 'rebalancing agenda' which aims to do the following:

- Strengthen the licensing regime by giving local authorities, the police and communities stronger powers;
- Reduce red tape by de-regulating entertainment to an extent;
- Clamping down on under-age selling by increasing penalties for offences;
- Ensuring taxpayers should not have to foot the bill for late night drinking by allowing local licensing authorities to set licensing fees and impose a levy;
- Reduce alcohol related crime, deaths and hospital treatment; and reduce binge drinking.

Amid the various changes licensing authorities became 'responsible authorities'. This means the licensing authority can now make representations on applications. They can instigate reviews and make representations on applications for review by others. The existing delegations allow officers to take decisions and issue/serve notices in accordance with the Act and any regulations made under the Act. The existing delegations therefore cover the new right to make representations and as the Licensing Services Manager for Aylesbury Vale District Council I wish, in respect to this application exercise that right. In this representation I would like to draw to the attention of the Licensing Act Sub-committee various recent changes to the Licensing Act that I believe demonstrate the direction of public policy in the licensing of the sale of alcohol. I would also like to invoke the Council's Special Saturation Policy for Aylesbury Town Centre and explain its application on Aylesbury town centre.

Recent changes to the Licensing Act and Statutory Guidance

1. Changes in the licensing regime have effectively broadened the scope of those people that can make representations in respect to new applications and variations to existing licences. As well as the 'licensing authority' Primary Care Trusts can now also make representations and call for reviews. The 'vicinity test' has now been removed. Previously a person living/working in the vicinity of the premises (and their representative bodies) and AVDC Members could make representations. Now anyone can object as long as it is relevant and it relates to one or more of the licensing objectives.
2. Previously the council could impose conditions, exclude a licensable activity, reject an application, etc if it was 'necessary' for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The council can now act if it is 'appropriate' to do so. This effectively means that the Government have reduced the evidential burden and the council can intervene at a lower threshold of need.

3. The statutory guidance now says 'The licensing authority should accept all reasonable and proportionate representations made by the police unless the authority has evidence that to do so would not be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. This effectively gives police representations increased weight.
4. The statutory guidance provides licensing authorities more autonomy regarding closing times. In the Explanatory Memorandum accompanying the revised guidance, it is stated that the Government's package of measures include 'giving licensing authorities greater flexibility when determining licensed opening hours'. The guidance, in respect to licensing hours states 'the 2003 Act gives the licensing authority power to make decisions regarding licensed opening hours as part of the implementation of its licensing policy statement and licensing authorities are best placed to make decisions based on their local knowledge and in consultation with other responsible authorities'. The fact sheet explaining the changes in policy in respect to hours say that the introduction of 24 hour alcohol licences discourage the use of provisions contained in the Licensing Act 2003 such as staggered closing times, zoning and fixed closing times. According to the Government 'This power is about giving licensing authorities the right to decide to take control of closing times in their area based on local evidence'. This is a marked shift in Government policy and is further embellished in the introduction of Early Morning Restriction Orders (EMROs), which in practical terms could act as a curfew for licensed premises and Late Night Levies.
5. In relation to cumulative impact policies the evidential hurdle has been lowered and the Government are encouraging their application to off- as well as the on-trade.

Special Saturation Policy – Aylesbury Town Centre

1. Aylesbury Vale District Council have had a special saturation policy for Aylesbury town centre since the Licensing Act 2003 came into force. This reflected concerns expressed particularly by Thames Valley Police but also local residents in relation to crime and disorder and nuisance arising from customers collectively using a significant number of premises in the town centre, particularly late at night. The effect of the policy is to create rebuttable presumption that applications for new premises or variations that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, unless the applicant can demonstrate that there will be no negative cumulative impact on the licensing objectives.
2. This policy has been reviewed on three occasions since the inception of the Act and on the third generation review which resulted in the current policy it was decided to divide licensed premises within the saturation policy into two general categories – higher risk premises and lower risk premises. Higher risk premises are those for which the sale of alcohol is a primary activity, including pubs and nightclubs and also those that serve hot food or drink for consumption off the premises. Lower risk premises are those for which the sale of alcohol is at most a subsidiary activity, including theatres, cinemas, restaurants, gambling premises and performance venues.
3. The policy has very much focused on operating hours and explicitly says that applications for new licences or material variations for 'higher risk premises' seeking to sell alcohol beyond midnight or close beyond 12.30 a.m. will be refused. In relation to 'lower risk premises' any application seeking to sell alcohol beyond 2 a.m. or close beyond 2.30 a.m. will be refused. Furthermore this policy is intended to be strictly applied. Exceptions will only be made in genuinely exceptional cases and this would not normally be on the ground of the good character of the applicant.
4. Mango, the subject of this application falls within the 'higher risk premises' category. The venue does provide entertainment and facilitates dancing but the sale of alcohol is clearly the primary activity. However even if it were not the special saturation policy would still restrain the opening hours to less than the venue currently trades. This restraint policy would apply to both the application to extend the hours for the sale of alcohol and provision of late night refreshment for

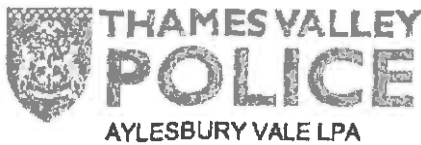
consumption off the premises. As for the provision of late night refreshment on the premises it would be appropriate to restrict that too. Experience has shown that a substantial period between last sale of alcohol and final closure of the premises is problematical. Apart from being difficult to enforce, it can provoke frustration from customers who expect to be served alcohol when the premises are still open to trade, albeit with a limited offer.

5. Mango have used a number of Temporary Event Notices (TENs) during 2012 effectively allowing the premises to trade extended hours for twelve weekends. It might be argued that, without complaints or specific evidence of crime and disorder this is sufficient proof to demonstrate extended hours do not necessarily result in problems. However these extensions, when seen in the context of a complete year cannot be seen as providing a reliable description of what might happen in the fullness of time. Certainly without a genuinely exceptional case to depart from the special saturation policy, granting this application would undoubtedly result in similar applications from other premises trading in the town centre and thus the erosion of the Council's policy.

6. The application also refers to adult entertainment performances. Depending on the number of performances this may require a separate permission in the form of a Sexual Entertainment Licence.

Conclusion

The Council's special saturation policy has been in operation for seven years during which time crime and disorder has fallen. Town centre crime and disorder in the town centre late at night is almost entirely driven by the consumption of alcohol and the existence of the policy has not only deterred existing premises to extend their trading hours but also attract more diverse uses of venues in the town centre. It has also encouraged a more responsible approach by licensees operating in the town centre and is seen as a successful policy by Thames valley Police. The policy does not deal with individual premises, most of which in any event do not present a particular cause for concern. It deals with the impact collectively of all the premises trading in the town centre. Changes in Government policy in relation to licensing have acknowledged that the kind of approach Aylesbury Vale District Council and its partners have adopted works. Licensing authorities have been given more discretion in relation to restricting hours and imposing conditions and reintroducing staggered hours and zoning, concepts that were eroded when the Licensing Act was first introduced. The Government have radically changed how licensing authorities can now deal with licensed premises. Up until recently, apart from the use of special saturation policies licensing authorities were duty bound to deal with premises individually. Licensing authorities now have the opportunity to deal with groups of premises. An early Morning Restriction Order can be introduced if the licensing authority considers it appropriate, effectively introducing an artificial closing time in a town centre for example. Given the Council's special saturation policy and the Government's general policy in respect to licensing it is strongly recommended that this application is refused in its entirety.

Re application to vary the licence of "Mango" 1 Silver street, Aylesbury.

Objection to the application

To invoke the Town Centre Saturation Policy as outlined in the licensing Policy Statement 2011.

This is an application being made by the Kyle Arran Michael; it is to extend the licensable activities at the above premises in the following way:

- All licensable Activities on a Friday and Saturday from 0700 to 0659 hrs.
- Late Night Refreshment form 2300 to 0500 each day of the week and hours premises are open to the public from 0700hrs to 06.59hrs the following day each day of the week.
- Plus an additional hour for Thursday –Sunday preceding a Bank Holiday Monday.
- Good Friday, Christmas Eve, Christmas Day & Boxing Day and additional Hour.
- New years Eve start of permitted hours on New years Eve to the start of permitted hours on New Years Day.
- BST One hour to the standard and non standard times when British Summertime Commences.

At the present time the licensable activities are from 0700 to 0300hrs with the premises closing at 0330 hrs.

This will be the third application to extend the hours of the activities, the first being October 2007, the second being early in October 2010. These premises currently enjoy the latest hours within the town, and attract people to the premises who have already been drinking. The premises has the latest licensing hours in the town centre and can stay open to the public until 03.30 hours on Fridays and Saturdays, which is an hour longer than the majority of other licensed premises. These premises are the hardest to

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police in the town centre because of the location. The premises are surrounded on 3 sides with alleyways which lead onto Market Square and Bourbon Street, they are only overlooked by one CCTV camera which looks down into Silver street.

Thames Valley Police still object to any application to extend this and any licence within the town centre and in an effort to contain the hours fully support the Licensing Policy Statement of the Council and would seek to invoke the Town Centre Saturation Policy as outlined in the licensing Policy Statement 2011.

The Licensing Policy Statement is a document produced every three years and its role is:

To promote a sustainable local leisure economy. Such an economy must be **safe, welcoming, diverse, accessible and attractive** to the population as a whole. It must also minimise negative impacts of such an economy, whether on local residents, visitors or the environment.

It is also concerned in the promotion of the licensing objectives.

The current Licensing Policy statement reflects the concerns of the police and the Government who have recently reviewed the licensing Act and made a number of changes supporting additions like Late Night Levys, the consultation made by the government at the time read:

"For too long town centres up and down the country have been blighted by crime and disorder driven by irresponsible binge drinking. Local communities have not had a strong enough voice in determining which pubs and clubs should be open in their area and for how long they should trade. Local authorities have had their hands tied by an overly bureaucratic licensing regime meaning they have not been able to adequately respond to local concerns."

On the 25th April 2012 a number of important changes were made to the Licensing Act 2003 and the regulations and the statutory guidance under the Act. These changes form part of the coalition Governments 'rebalancing agenda'.

The statutory guidance now says that the Licensing Authority should accept all reasonable and proportionate representations made by the police unless the authority has evidence that to do so would not be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

This statement is reflected by Aylesbury Vale District Council's licensing policy statement for 2011, which is fully supported by the police. It is our experience that parts of the Licensing Act of 2003 have not worked, especially with regards to hours. It is our experience that longer hours have not seen customers slowly dispersing, but in effect has seen them drink right up to the last possible moment and then leave en masse.

It is accepted that each licensed premises will have its fair share of problems; this is the nature of entertainment connected with alcohol. It is also known that, although not entirely connected with young people, they are normally the age group that come to notice.

With regards to Mango it is the view that the premises are reasonably well run by the DPS Mr Kyle Michael: he is a supporter of the local Pub Watch scheme; he has run a number of TEN's through the summer which have been incident free. This is not an objection of Mr Michael's abilities as a bar owner but highlights the bigger picture of Aylesbury and the local area, which is affected by late night drinking.

I would refer to the Licensing Policy Statement Section 5.1 para 3:

"The Policy is intended to be strictly applied. Exceptions will only be made in genuinely exceptional cases. A case will not normally be considered exceptional on the ground of the good character of the applicant or the size of the application or variation."

However, as stated above, this is one of the premises that comes to notice. It is accepted that some problems are not in the control of the premises but some can be caused as a direct result of action taken by the premises. Some incidents take place away from the premise but still within the town centre. It should be noted that the number of incidents connected to these premises has declined since the last hearing. The majority of incidents take up police time when they are required to respond to them. These incidents are at Appendix "A".

The Special Saturation Policy reflected in the Licensing Policy statement has come about for a number of reasons. Aylesbury town centre changed in the year 2000 and saw a large number of vertical drinking establishments with extended hours under the old licensing Act. As a result of this, it changed the profile of the town centre. One of these effects was the customer profile changed to a large amount of young vertical drinkers; it also changed the hours they would come out to drink. It is accepted that even now they are coming out later and later after preloading at home on cheaper drinks from take away establishments. As a result of these extra hours and more premises alcohol related crime and disorder increased and to a later time. It was in 2005 when the new act was introduced we were able to submit evidence to support a Special Saturation Policy to be adopted in the Licensing Policy statement. This was reviewed in 2008 when it was strengthened and again in 2011 when it was again strengthened.

As well as alcohol lead premises, the Special Saturation policy also relates to Late Night Refreshment Houses; they were placed into the policy as it is well known that they used to be hot spots in the town and would keep persons in the town after Alcohol lead premises closed. At the introduction of the licensing Act in 2005, these premises had restricted hours to operate and a reduction in Crime and Disorder was seen. It is as a result of Mango's and one other later premises being allowed their current trading hours the town centre take aways were allowed to extend their hours.

Special Saturation Policy.

The saturation policy deals with the cumulative impact on the licensing objectives of a concentration of licensed premises in Aylesbury town centre. It addresses the need to consider the bigger picture and the wider impact individual licensing decisions are likely to have on crime, disorder, nuisance and disturbance in sensitive locations.

The Licensing Policy Statement, "Is based on the concentration of licensed premises selling alcohol for consumption on the premises which give rise to large numbers of people who have been drinking alcohol on the streets in Aylesbury Town."

The effect of the policy is to create a rebuttable presumption that applications for new licences or variations that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, unless the applicant can demonstrate that there will be no negative cumulative impact on the licensing objectives.

However, each case still has to be determined on its own individual merits.

Does the Saturation Policy apply?

Yes for the following reasons.

- There are approximately **21 pubs/clubs operating after 2300 hours** in the town centre.
- The increase in the number of town centre premises selling alcohol and the increase in licensing hours has led to **an increase in crime, disorder and nuisance over the years.**
- The town centre is a **hot spot** for incidents and policing.
- Most town centre premises are open to the public until **0230 hours.**
- It is the operational experience of the police that longer hours have not seen customers slowly dispersing but in effect has seen them drink right up to the last possible moment and then leave **en masse at a later hour.**
- Later licensing hours have resulted in **later incidents of crime, disorder and nuisance.**
- Most crime and disorder incidents happen in the town centre between 2200 and 0300 hours and **generally peak between midnight and 0200 hours.**
- Most premises **do not open late during the week** and that is why the majority of incidents take place over the weekend when the majority of premises open for longer.
- The police have already changed their **shift patterns** in response to the demands of policing the town centre for longer and later at night. This concentration of resources has inevitably spread policing resources across Aylesbury Vale more thinly throughout the 24 hour period.
- Even later hours at the weekends and during the week **would cost the police even more money to police the town centre** and would mean an even greater disproportionate amount of police resources being deployed in the town centre.
- Late night town centre incidents can be **very labour intensive** with a single arrest monopolising the time of at least two officers for hours. (See statement from Officer)

Since the introduction of the special Saturation Policy, it is right to say with a few exceptions that crime and disorder within the town centre is slowly declining and to date is still declining. (Show Chart)

Does the Saturation Policy Work.

Although the number of incidents have declined since the high water mark in 2007 it is **still unacceptably high.**

The reduction has come at a price: bigger police wage bill and less policing elsewhere.

The reduction is proof that the saturation policy and the police strategy is **working and should be continued to be supported** to avoid a decline.

The policy as stated in 2011 states "**Applications for new licences or club premises or for material variations seeking to sell alcohol beyond midnight or close beyond 12.30am will be refuse**"

Having assessed the likely impact of the extension of hours of this application, the premises being a town centre-based public house, which sells alcohol for consumption on the premises we believe by granting additional hours, it would add to the existing cumulative impact. Regard should be had not only to the nature of incidents and timing but also to the wider impact this has for example policing.

It is overly simplistic and unduly restrictive to suggest that an application to extend hours well beyond the time that most or all other premises close is not capable of adding to the cumulative impact on the basis that it will not increase the number of incidents of crime, disorder and nuisance at the time when such incidents normally peak.

Cumulative impact can have a much broader application; it can arise from the large number of customers in the town centre late at night but an application which is likely to result in later incidents or disturbances is just as capable of adding to the cumulative impact of a concentration of licensed premises and is just as objectionable.

This means that the onus is on the applicant to demonstrate that the variation will not add to the cumulative impact.

Impact if granted.

Licensing experience since the Licensing Act came into force strongly suggests that longer licensing hours in the town centre will result in more and later incidents of crime and disorder and nuisance. This will cause even further disruption to the town centre residents.

Local licensing experience also demonstrates that a significant extension of hours granted to one premises in the town centre is likely to result in other similar applications and ultimately customers drinking for even longer followed by a mass exit of customers at a common but even later hour. Other premises have already stated that if the hours in the town were to extend any further for other premises then to compete they would have to make the same applications.

The use of TENs on 12 Saturdays so far this and last year prove that extended hours would or would not add to the cumulative impact. The temporary, ad hoc nature of these extensions, over a relatively short period of time, which may or may not have been common knowledge, do not represent in our view a reliable account of the likely impact of extending the hours in the longer term.

We still have concern about customers migrating to the premises in the early hours of the morning from other premises if this is the sole premises supplying these activities. This, by past experience, will cause problems when people who have already been drinking all night or who have drunk too much attempt to gain entry to the premises or once they are inside the premises. The significance of these incidents is that even if they are properly handled by the premises and even if the management could not have done anything to prevent them, they arise from the use of the premises for licensable activities at that time.

The impact to other agencies and persons not only in the town should be taken into consideration before considering granting this application.

Domestic Abuse within Aylesbury impacts not only on the victim but other agencies to deal. For the past year recorded incidents of domestic violence between the hours of 10pm and 4am have reached 950 for Friday through to Sunday for the same hours 456 are recorded.

The Ambulance Service has seen 153 incidents dealt with within the town centre between the hours 10pm and 4am for the past year. Of the 153 117 occur on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Accident and Emergency at Stoke Mandeville Hospital dealt with a large volume (39811) in 2012 up to the end of October. During the hours of 10pm and 4am Monday to Sunday a total of 6554 attended; of these, 2930 are between the same times Friday through to Sunday.

As stated earlier in this report this objection is not about the way the applicant runs his premises but is a reflection of the town as a whole and the impact that the Late Night Economy has on the town and its residents and other agencies. It is for this reason the policy was introduced and it is for this reason TVP wish to invoke the special saturation policy.

I have put together a small CD showing incidents within the town that are dealt with by officers during the Late Night Economy.

Alcohol Related Disorder in Aylesbury Town Centre 2009- 2012

Introduction

This report aims to analyse data in relation to alcohol disorder in Aylesbury Town Centre for the period 2009-2012 between the hours of 22:00 and 4:00. This report will compare between the two periods and will concentrate on the recorded offences/incidents in the locations of Kingsbury, Market Square, Cambridge Street, Cambridge Close, Cambridge Place and Exchange Street, which are all located in the town centre. These areas are where there is predominantly the highest amount of licensed premises in the Town Centre.

This report will consider the offences of:

- Common Assault
- ABH
- Assault on a Constable
- GBH
- Public Order

Data has been derived from the I: on Bucks website, which contains data from CEDAR and command and control.

Fig 1 shows the total number of offences in 2009 was 251 and 195 in 2010. This shows a marked 22.3% reduction in offences from 2009-2010. The total offences for 2011 was 159, which is a percentage reduction of 18.4% from 2010 and 36.6 % reduction from the 2009 figure.

When considering the offences individually; statistically ABH remains at the same figure (64 offences) from 2009 to 2010 but reduced to 47 offences in 2011 . Assault

without injury decreased in 2010 to 42 offences compared to 2009 where there were 51. This figure has further decreased to 36 offences in 2011. Public order offences have seen the biggest decrease from 123 in 2009 to 71 in 2011 (percentage reduction of 42.2%). The only increase was GBH with intent (Sec 18) which increased to 1 offence as opposed nil offences recorded in 2009.

Overall, when contrasting the number of offences in 2011 to 2009/2010 it is evident that there have been significant reductions across all offence types, with only the exception being from GBH with intent (Sec 18).

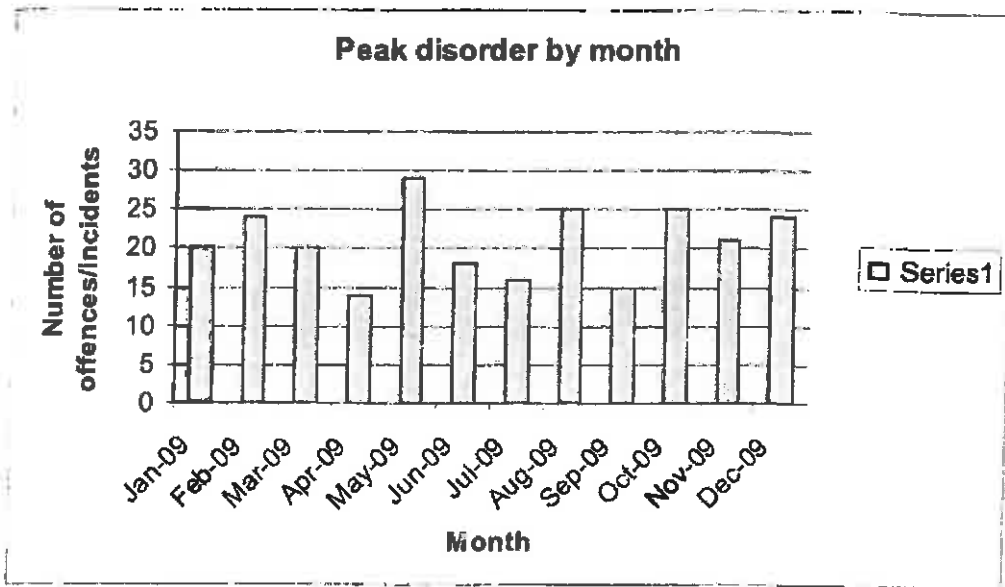


Fig 2.1: Number of offences by month for 2009

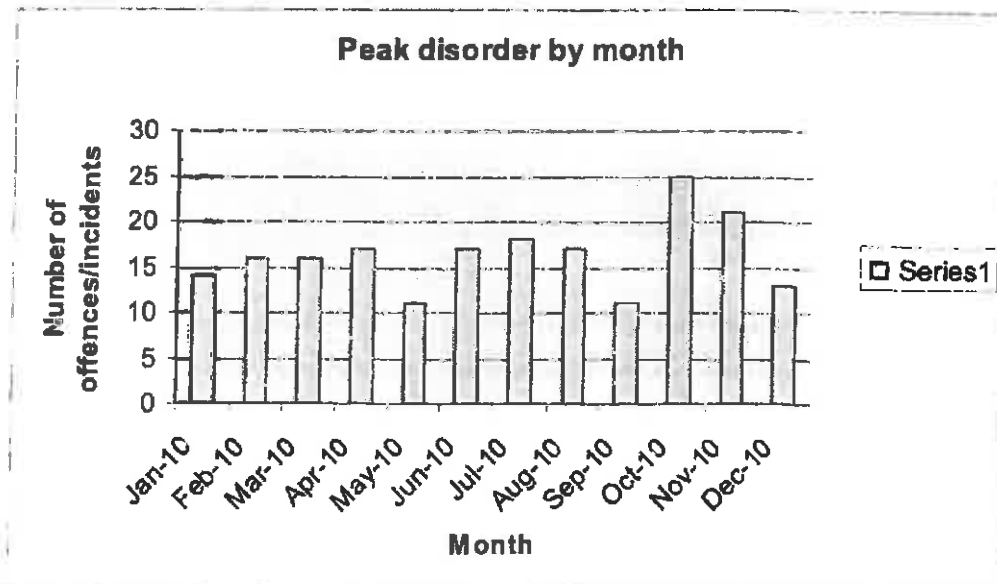


Fig 2.2: Number of offences by month for 2010

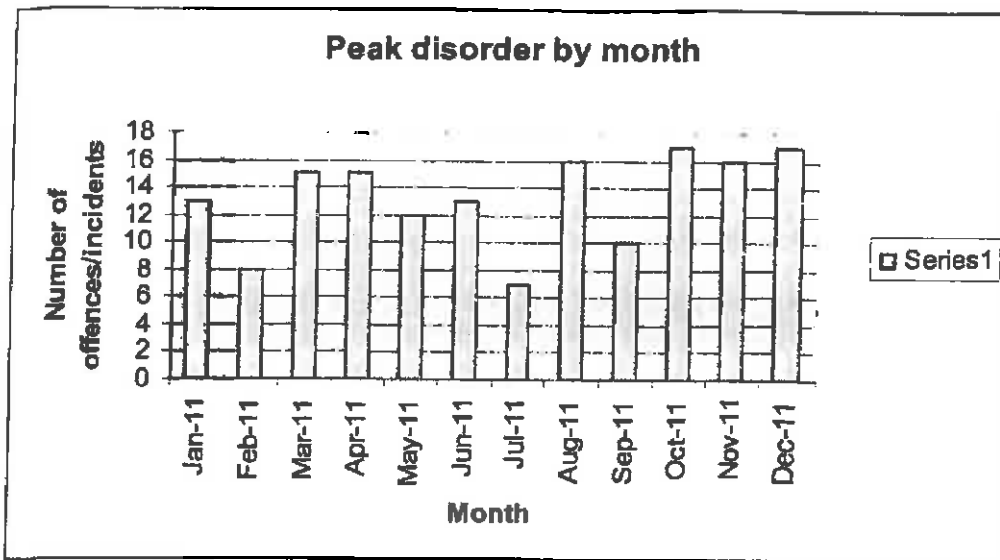


Fig 2.3: Number of offences by month for 2011

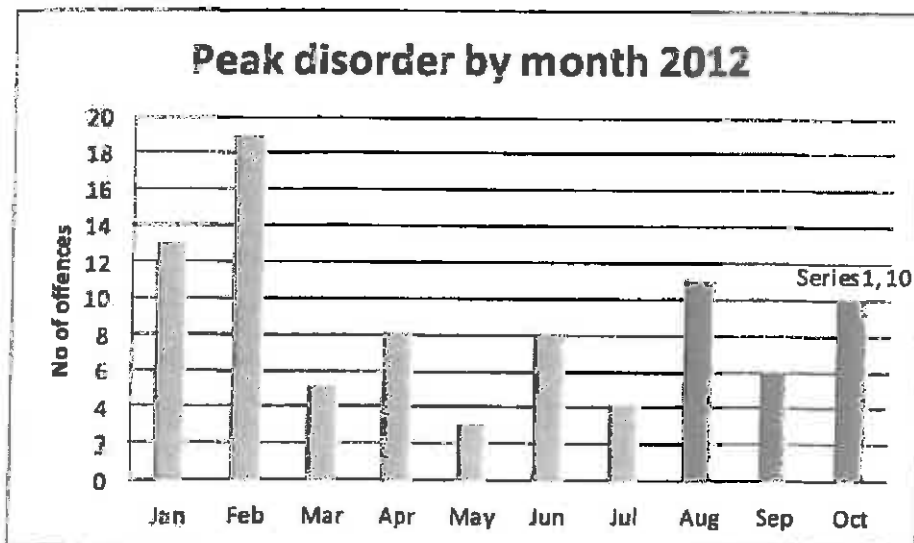


Fig 2.4: Number of offences by month for 2012.

From Figure 2.1 it is evident to see that most offences in 2009 occurred in Jan-Mar (64 offences) and Oct- Dec (70 offences). Jun-Aug offences were 59, which compared to the Spring and Winter data is lower. May was the highest month statistically for offences at 29.

From Figure 2.2 it is clear that in 2010 the highest month for offences statistically was October which is opposite to 2009's highest month of May. 2010 Offences typically were at the same rate for most of the year apart from Oct-Nov which had 45 offences. This peak in Oct-Nov shows the same trend in the amount of offences around this time in 2009.

Fig 2.3 shows that in 2011 the highest month for incidents was jointly October and December (17 incidents a piece). The last quarter of 2011 experienced the most

incidents compared to the months of February (8) and July (7) which experienced the least.

Figure 2.4 reflects that in the first 5 months of 2012, February (19 offences) was the highest month for alcohol related disorder with May (3 offences) the least for offences. So far in 2012 this contrasts differently to 2011 where February was the least highest month for offences and 2010 where May was the highest month for offences.

The December figure over the three year period has been erratic. Initially there had been a decrease in offences from 2009 (24 offences) to 2010 (13 offences) but 2011 saw an increase (17 offences). The greatest proportion of offences in December 2011 took place in Market Square (see fig 5). Comparatively the highest amount of offences in 2009 occurred in Kingsbury. The decrease from December 2009 to December 2010 was uncharacteristic in nature for the festive season but may well be related to the improvement in the way the clubs are managed and licensed as well as Police/PCSO presence in the Town Centre. It is possible that the rise in December 2011 offences occurred because attentions were focused on Kingsbury, when there had been a shift to Market Square.

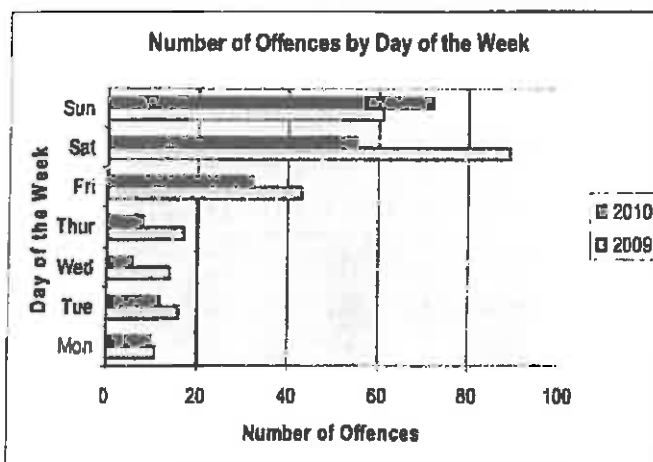


Fig 3: Offences by day of the week (2009 & 2010)

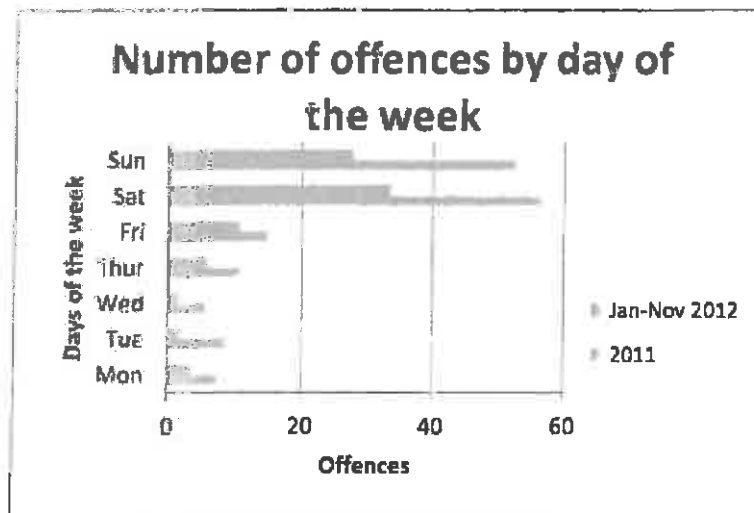


Fig 3.1 Offences by day of week (2011 & 2012)

When comparing the offences by day of the week from 2009 to 2010 it is clear to notice that every day of the week has seen a decrease in offences. Weekend offences are still unsurprisingly the highest, however Friday and Saturday night offences have decreased. Sunday is the only day of the week where there has been a marked increase from 61 offences in 2009 to 72 in 2010. This could be due to the fact that police data is exported using the date the report was made (input date) and our data source (1:0n Bucks) is uploaded using the committed date (when from date).

When comparing the 2009/2010 figures against 2011 it is evident to see that there are fluctuations occurring for Thursday and Saturday offences. Thursday and Saturday offences increased in 2011 compared to 2010. Although increases have occurred the figure is not as high as the initial 2009 numbers recorded.

Wednesday offences between 2010 and 2011 remained static compared to Monday, Tuesday, Friday and Sundays which all experienced a decrease in offences upon the 2009 and 2010 figures.

In the first 5 months of 2012, it is possible to see that Saturday nights are still the highest evening of the week for offences. So far Tuesday and Wednesday have had no offences reported.

Peak time for offences to occur

The peak time for offences to occur was between 00:00 and 02:00 hrs. This remained the trend from 2009-2012. These are the key times that late licensed premises close and people are likely to loiter.

Offence Locations

Fig 4 highlights the location which saw the highest amount of offences was Kingsbury. However, there has been a decrease in the amount of offences that the Kingsbury area experienced in 2009 (123 offences) and in 2011 (37 offences), which is a decrease of 69%. This is a significant reduction, especially considering Kingsbury is a popular area due to the high volume of takeaways in the area which people use after a night out clubbing. In the first period of 2012 it is evident that Kingsbury was the third highest location for offences, therefore further contrasting from Kingsbury being the number one hotspot location for disorder in 2009.

The second highest location for offences was Market Square with 67 offences in 2010. This figure shows an increase in offences compared to the 48 offences in 2009. This increase continued in 2011 when the figure reached 89. This is a marked increase of 85%. In 2012 Market Square in the first 5 months shows the highest for offences. This clearly shows that attention needs to be focused on Market Square possibly more so than Kingsbury.

Cambridge Close had no offences between 2009-2012. Cambridge Street, Cambridge Place and Exchange Street all reflect decreases from 2009 to 2010, but in 2011 Cambridge Street equalled the amount of offences recorded in 2009. Cambridge Place reduced in 2011 and the first 5 months of 2012 to a nil figure, however, Exchange

Street Offences started to rise in 2011. It will remain to be seen whether the Exchange street offences rise past the 2011 figure throughout the rest of 2012.

To see the breakdown of offences by location and month see fig 5, 6 and 7 in the appendix. Key offence locations for 2009-2012 were:

Conclusion

In Summary, there has been a decrease in offences across the board from 2009 to 2011. Apart from GBH with intent (a rise of 1 offence from a previously nil status from 2009-2011) all other offence types experienced a decrease from 2009-2011. These figures are highly encouraging that the amount of alcohol related disorder has reduced significantly over the three year period. It will be interesting to see the total offences for 2012 when the year is complete to see if the decrease continues.

Exceptions have been between the amount of offences which occurred on a Sunday between 2009 and 2010 and also GBH with intent (Sec 18) rose from 0 in 2009 to 1 incident in 2010.

Saturday night is still the day of the week where there is most likely to be problems in the Town Centre. The trend also remains unchanged for the peak time for disorder being between 00:00 and 02:00.

Peak disorder by month varied slightly from 2009 to 2010. 2009 saw more offences in the Spring and Winter months whereas 2010 saw offences take place mainly in the Winter months and a steady amount in the summer months. This is also reflective of the 2011 crime trends.

Kingsbury was the most frequent location to experience incidents in 2009 and this remained the trend in 2010. Market Square is second highest with an increase in 2010 from 2009s figure. In 2011 the hierarchy changed. Market Square is the area which experienced the most offences presently.

Although there is some disparity in amount of offences that occurred in Market Square between 2009 and 2011, the actual statistics across the board generally for offences as a whole are extremely positive.

Review of town centre licensing hours

On Friday and Saturday nights Aylesbury Town utilises two shift groups after 2200 hours. The shift that starts at 2200 hours covers the town centre as defined by the ring road whilst the other shift covers the rest of Aylesbury itself. The team tasked with covering the town centre consists of one Sergeant and between four to six police constables who utilise foot patrols and a marked police transit van to provide high visibility patrols and respond to spontaneous incidents. The type of incidents that these units commonly respond to range from low level alcohol related public disorder through to serious assaults and or sexual assaults.

The number of incidents varies from night to night, to put this into context I will give you a scenario for a straight forward assault resulting in common assault injuries (slight reddening). Officers are called to the Kingsbury Public House within Aylesbury town Centre where there are reports over the pubwatch radio that there is a disorder within the premise, due to an unknown number of persons being involved four officers attend to minimise the risk of injury to themselves and the public. Once on scene two males are being restrained by doorstaff with male A alleging that male B has punched him in the face, officers can see reddening above male A's left eye corroborating the report made. One officer arrests male B and along with his/her crewmate transport him to Aylesbury Police Station to be booked into custody together with the Police Transit driver.

Once at custody they are held in a queue to book in as a result of a male being arrested for an unrelated incident. Once in custody the arresting officer relays the grounds for the arrest as well as the necessity criteria (reason for arrest i.e. interview/prevent harm). The Custody Sergeant authorises male B's detention in custody at which point he is asked risk assessment questions regarding medical condition, state of mind etc and then his three rights are gone through (right to free legal advice, copy of the codes of practice, someone informed he has been arrested). Male B will then be searched by the arresting officer if of the same sex to ensure that male B has no items on him that he may harm himself, officers or damage custody with. This procedure takes between 30-45 minutes on average and both officers have to remain throughout due to male B's intoxicated state. Whilst male B has been taken away an officer has remained on scene for 30 minutes collating witness details (name, address, DOB, contact number) and seized CCTV from the Kingsbury public house.

Male A does not require medical attention so is taken to Aylesbury Police Station with a friend who witnessed the assault by one officer, due to other incidents they are transported in the police van resulting in a loss of police presence for approximately 20 minutes from the town. The arresting officer and their crewmate then obtain the statements from male A and friend, this procedure using the full PEACE model can take up to 2 hours with the crime being reported through to the PEC for a crime report number to be generated and given to the aggrieved. The statements can only be taken if both male A and friend are composites (dependant on alcohol consumption). A photograph will be taken of male A's injuries and he will then be sent away to convey.

The two officers dealing will then separate, one going back into town and the arresting officer stays to complete arrest paperwork and interview. If the offender has been drinking heavily then a handover will be completed for the early turn shift to deal with male B after 0700 hours or if he is fit he will be interviewed by the arresting officer. The arresting officer will complete a SE3R interview plan taking 20 minutes and then take male B through to interview. Dependant on male B's account the interview will take approximately 30-40 minutes. After interview male B is returned to his cell whilst the interviewer completes their pocket notebook detailing the interview before liaising with the custody Sergeant as to how male B will be dealt with in custody. If male B has made full admission he may be dealt with as follows; caution taking 30 minutes, reprimand taking 1 hour including completion of file or charge taking up to 2 hours dependant on guilty or not guilty pleas and the completion of the related file as well as the building of charges. If male B denies the offence then advice will be sought

from the Crown Prosecution Service direct over the phone. This will take approximately 2 hours due to faxing and emailing a detailed file for them to make a decision as to the likelihood of a prosecution.

The crime report will be updated with regard to investigatory actions completed and the recording of both victim and witness updates.

It must be said that this incident involved just one person being arrested, I a drunken fight in the town involved two persons then double the man power, time, resources would be required.

This incident can occur multiple times in one evening along with more serious incidents, this ties up valuable resources who should be in the town centre reassuring the public. Extended licensing past 0230 hours would add strain to police resources further than they already are. If licenses are to be extended past this time I would suggest that licensed establishments pay for police officers to be allocated to their establishments, the added police presence will reduce offences and with a cost implication to the establishments they will no doubt become more responsible.

To whom it concerns, it has been brought to my attention that the premises above have applied for a later licence, effectively allowing them to trade for 24 hours a day. Being a town centre resident and a public house owner, I feel this is totally unnecessary. The amount of noise in the town centre after 2am when the current later night venues shut and empty out is, at the moment, just about bearable on a Friday and Saturday night, let alone midweek.

Though essential, our bins are emptied at 6am creating levels of noise awaking us, but the thought of a venue emptying out after the current licensing hours and for that matter even later than the binmen is ridiculous. Property damage to private houses, shops, restaurants, pubs and other local businesses with the usual licensed opening hours can get quite bad so if the extension of hours was to go ahead it will most likely increase chance of property damage to the towns shops and other business and this should be considered too. I believe that if this extended licence is granted, it will only cause more problems for both the police, the local authorities and certainly the residents of Aylesbury town centre. As this letter explains, my wife and I are against this application.

It may resolve the fire officer representation if you e-mail a copy of the fire risk assessment to AVDC-CDCFireSafety@bucksfire.gov.uk

We have not received any letters of support for your application. As the consultation period has now ended we are unable to accept any further representations (either against or in support of) however you may be able to use them as part of your submission. The same would apply to the petition you refer to.

According to the Regulations, the sub-committee may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their case before the day of the hearing. If the documentary or other information is produced on the day of the hearing, the sub-committee may take it into account only if all the other parties consent.

In the interests of fairness and to avoid either the sub-committee or the other parties being taken by surprise, if you intend to rely on written evidence you must send five copies of your evidence to the Council, and one copy to such of the other parties as is appropriate, no later than 5 working days before the day of the hearing.

Please be advised that I will be in attendance for the public hearing on 29th January and have received the representations.

At this point I am unable to confirm who I shall have with me but I shall have someone with me, but that person will not address the committee. It is likely that others will attend to view the hearing and in support of the application and the committee may wish to talk to them. I will advise you if any person wishes to have time specifically to talk to the committee.

In relation to the fire officers representation, I see no point in his attendance as I realise his time can be better spent

and I accept his recommendations in full. The fire risk assessment is a legal requirement already under other legislation and has been checked recently by an attending fire officer - I shall provide a copy for the hearing. The Licensing Act specifically states that it should not be used to duplicate areas which are already covered by other legislation and this is covered by the The **Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005**.

In relation to the police and environmental health elements, I shall provide a written response before the hearing to reduce the time the hearing should take as the committee found this helpful on the last occasion.

In relation to the complaint from Mr & Mrs Amos, I believe this is commercially driven and there is a known animosity with Mr Amos and I. As such I believe this letter should be dismissed as vexatious and without weight. Should it be allowed then intend to ask Mr & Mrs Amos why they have not lodged a single complaint in the entire time they have been a resident of a public house as confirmed by both the Environmental Health and the police.

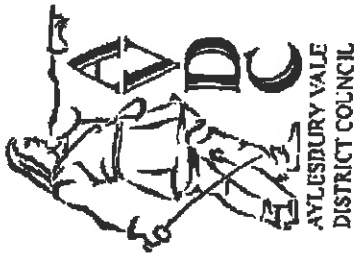
