- a. 30 minutes "drinking up" time will allow appropriate dispersal, use of lavatories etc.
- b. In order to further the licensing objectives, the licensee reserves the right to move the fire appliances, AWP machines, and or similar objects temporarily in a fixed location which may impact on the ability of individuals on the premises to use exits or escape routes without impediment.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

- a. The Rothschild arms has no other public houses near by, the nearest licensed outlet being Aylesbury Rugby Club, a members club.
- b. Security cameras fitted inside the building and covering the garden.

c) Public safety

- a. At The Rothschild Arms several staff hold Basic Food Hygiene Certificate.
- b. The outlet has smoke detectors and a fire alarm system.
- c. Security cameras fitted inside the building and covering the garden.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

- a. The Rothschild arms is of traditional brick construction and retains sound well.
- b. There are no other licensed outlets within half a mile.
- c. Customers are reminded on leaving that they should do so in a restrained manner.
- d. All windows and doors are to be closed at 23:00hrs, except for fire doors.
- e. Any speakers used during the transmission of the music are kept within the premises and not positioned near to openings such as a door or window.
- f. On regular basis the operator will remind customers on departing the premises to leave quietly and with consideration to local residents, and a sign must be placed in the pub to that effect.
- g. The garden to be cleared by 23:00hrs every evening.

e) The protection of children from harm

- a. There is no adult entertainment at this outlet liable to cause offence to children.

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NOTES ON DEMONSTRATING ENTITLEMENT TO WORK IN THE UK

Continued from previous page...

Entitlement to work/immigration status for individual applicants and applications from partnerships which are not limited liability partnerships:

A licence may not be held by an individual or an individual in a partnership who is resident in the UK who:

- does not have the right to live and work in the UK; or
- is subject to a condition preventing him or her from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

Any premises licence issued in respect of an application made on or after 6 April 2017 will become invalid if the holder ceases to be entitled to work in the UK.

Applicants must demonstrate that they have an entitlement to work in the UK and are not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity. They do this in one of two ways: 1) by providing with this application copies or scanned copies of the documents listed below (which do not need to be certified), or 2) by providing their 'share code' to enable the licensing authority to carry out a check using the Home Office online right to work checking service (see below).

Documents which demonstrate entitlement to work in the UK

- An expired or current passport showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is a British citizen or a citizen of the UK and Colonies having the right of abode in the UK [please see note below about which sections of the passport to copy].
 - An expired or current passport or national identity card showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
 - A Registration Certificate or document certifying permanent residence issued by the Home Office to a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
 - A Permanent Residence Card issued by the Home Office to the family member of a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
 - A **current** Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder indicating that the person named is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, or has no time limit on their stay in the UK.
 - A **current** passport endorsed to show that the holder is exempt from immigration control, is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, has the right of abode in the UK, or has no time limit on their stay in the UK.
 - A **current** Immigration Status Document issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK or has no time limit on their stay in the UK, **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
 - A birth or adoption certificate issued in the UK, **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
 - A birth or adoption certificate issued in the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or Ireland **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
 - A certificate of registration or naturalisation as a British citizen, **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.

- A **current** passport endorsed to show that the holder is allowed to stay in the UK and is currently allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Residence Card issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights or residence.
- A **current** Immigration Status Document containing a photograph issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person may stay in the UK, and is allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A Certificate of Application, **less than 6 months old**, issued by the Home Office under regulation 18(3) or 20(2) of the Immigration (European Economic Area) Regulations 2016, to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence.
- Reasonable evidence that the person has an outstanding application to vary their permission to be in the UK with the Home Office such as the Home Office acknowledgement letter or proof of postage evidence, or reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in the UK including:-
 - evidence of the applicant's own identity – such as a passport,
 - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member – e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and
 - evidence that the European Economic Area national has a right of permanent residence in the UK or is one of the following if they have been in the UK for more than 3 months:
 - (i) working e.g. employment contract, wage slips, letter from the employer,
 - (ii) self-employed e.g. contracts, invoices, or audited accounts with a bank,
 - (iii) studying e.g. letter from the school, college or university and evidence of sufficient funds; or
 - (iv) self-sufficient e.g. bank statements.

Family members of European Economic Area nationals who are studying or financially independent must also provide evidence that the European Economic Area national and any family members hold comprehensive sickness insurance in the UK. This can include a private medical insurance policy, an EHIC card or an S1, S2 or S3 form.

Original documents must not be sent to licensing authorities. If the document copied is a passport, a copy of the following pages should be provided:-

- (i) any page containing the holder's personal details including nationality;
 - (ii) any page containing the holder's photograph;
 - (iii) any page containing the holder's signature;
 - (iv) any page containing the date of expiry; and
 - (v) any page containing information indicating the holder has permission to enter or remain in the UK and is permitted to work.

If the document is not a passport, a copy of the whole document should be provided.

Your right to work will be checked as part of your licensing application and this could involve us checking your immigration status with the Home Office. We may otherwise share information with the Home Office. Your licence application will not be determined until you have complied with this guidance.

Home Office online right to work checking service

As an alternative to providing a copy of the documents listed above, applicants may demonstrate their right to work by allowing the licensing authority to carry out a check with the Home Office online right to work checking service.

To demonstrate their right to work via the Home Office online right to work checking service, applicants should include in this application their 9-digit share code (provided to them upon accessing the service at <https://www.gov.uk/prove-right-to-work>) which, along with the applicant's date of birth (provided within this application), will allow the licensing authority to carry out the check.

In order to establish the applicant's right to work, the check will need to indicate that the applicant is allowed to work in the United Kingdom and is not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

An online check will not be possible in all circumstances because not all applicants will have an immigration status that can be checked online. The Home Office online right to work checking service sets out what information and/or documentation applicants will need in order to access the service. Applicants who are unable to obtain a share code from the service should submit copy documents as set out above.

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NOTES ON REGULATED ENTERTAINMENT

In terms of specific **regulated entertainments** please note that:

- Plays: no licence is required for performances between 08:00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - Films: no licence is required for 'not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.
 - Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
 - Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports – defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or wrestling with one or more martial arts – are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an indoor sporting event.
 - Live music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
 - Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school proprietor or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.

- Dance: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500. However, a performance which amounts to adult entertainment remains licensable.
- Cross activity exemptions: no licence is required between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, with no limit on audience size for:
 - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the local authority where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the local authority;
 - o any entertainment taking place on the hospital premises of the health care provider where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the health care provider;
 - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the school where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the school proprietor; and
 - o any entertainment (excluding films and a boxing or wrestling entertainment) taking place at a travelling circus, provided that (a) it takes place within a moveable structure that accommodates the audience, and (b) that the travelling circus has not been located on the same site for more than 28 consecutive days.

Having reviewed the application for premises license at The Rothschild Arms, 82 Weston Road Aston Clinton Bucks HP22 5EJ, I would like to submit the following comments regarding Environmental Health.

Since April 2019 EH received ongoing complaints regarding noise from the pub from a nearby resident. In June 2019 a second resident also complained about noise from the pub. Diary sheets have been submitted by the residents indicating noise from amplified and live music. Complaints continued throughout the summer of 2019.

Despite attempts to arrange to install recording equipment or to visit in person, it has not been possible for EH officers to gather any actual evidence of the alleged noise or to witness it in person.

However the location of the pub – within a row of terraced houses – is not ideal and there is a strong likelihood of noise breakout and thus affect the amenity of nearby residents.

I note the applicant has requested live music until midnight 7 days a week. EH would request that reduced hours are considered, 11pm Sunday-Thursday and midnight on Friday and Saturday.

I note the applicant has requested recorded music until 00:30 7 days a week. EH would request that reduced hours are considered, 11pm Sunday-Thursday and midnight on Friday and Saturday.

I note the applicant has considered measures needed to prevent public nuisance, including reminding customers to leave the premises in a restrained manner and to remind customers on departing the premises to leave quietly and with consideration to local residents, and a sign must be placed in the pub to that affect. I support these actions and would expect them to be managed effectively and vigorously by the applicant.



To whom it may concern,

We would like to express our concern about a number of terms within the licence application being made for the Rothschild Arms public house in Weston Road, Aston Clinton. We are direct neighbours of this pub and over the past year and a half, have had to endure a considerable number of unacceptable and anti-social disturbances.

Please see the attached sheet which records some of the nuisances that have occurred during this time and the ways in which these have affected our lives, in our home.

In addition to the nuisances recorded, we are often woken at night by excessive noise that customers make when leaving the pub and by taxis collecting customers at closing time; taxis stop directly outside our house with engines running, loud music playing, voices are raised, car doors slammed. Use of the large car park opposite the pub for taxi pick ups could reduce noise levels, but this resource is not currently made use of.

We have also been unable to open the front windows of our house due to the amount of cigarette smoke coming into our rooms from smokers standing outside the front of the pub, and the associated noise from these drinkers. This is of further concern to us now that we have a baby and has caused significant problems with maintaining the temperature indoors during summer months.

In particular, we are concerned about the terms of the application for a live/recorded music license, as we feel that the level of noise, has in the past, regularly exceeded permissible levels, particularly when live music is performed outdoors.

It also appears that the current licence application exceeds the times permitted by the Live Music Act 2012, which requires cessation at 11pm. When music events have been held in the pub garden in the past, we have disappointingly been unable to sit in our garden (we are unable to hear ourselves speak), or even remain comfortably inside our house or get our baby to sleep, due to the excessive level of noise. To avoid this, we have needed to vacate our house for significant periods of time and have on occasion stayed away overnight.

We fully understand that the premises has been granted saviour from closure recently and appreciate that the owners have verbally proposed improved changes. We therefore genuinely trust that the owners will take this opportunity to reflect on past experience and will in future be fully considerate and respectful of their community and local neighbours in an area that is predominantly family housing, thus enforcing their required obligations as owners.

To whom it may concern,

I have owned my property [REDACTED] for 18 years. I bought the property knowing I was going to be living next to a Public House (PH). The car park has been lost to development and the RA has been purchased separately. Circumstances around the RA have now changed.

Issues that need to be addressed.

- Parking.
- Music Licence.
- Inevitable noise from street drinking while smoking outside front and back.
- Antisocial behaviour.

RA will have no readily available parking for customers, this will not meet licensing requirements. The car park that was available in the past will be developed for housing. The Bar floor area measures 69.5sqm, applying the Councils maximum parking space standard of 1 space per 3sqm floor space associated with bars, the requirement of 23 spaces cannot be met. Separate provisions should also be available for loading, unloading and manoeuvring of delivery vehicles. There will be no parking available.

Only parking options will be the on-street residents parking spaces, that will inevitably be used by customers of the RA as well as cars mounted on the pavements and grass verges, taking up an already oversubscribed residential on-street parking area and in breach of S137 of the Highways Act 1980 blocking highways. This will just alienate and cause further distress to local residents, as well as blocked splay lines to entrances, putting residents at risk when trying to leave their driveways onto a fast moving traffic, as well as destroying an all ready failing infrastructure of pavements, grass verges and kerbstones on Weston Road, which has fallen into a completed state of disrepair.

The RA has been promoted as a place for tournaments events, Darts, pool, etc. As well as used by local football clubs, rugby clubs playing weekly in the area and after match drinking. People don't walk for miles to events, lucky if people walk more than a few 100meters now days! Footpaths are in poor condition and cycle paths that do exist, are not fit for purpose. In my experience the car park gets fully utilised during these weekly events, as well as leading to additional illegal parking as customers carelessly park on pavements and grass verges on a regular basis.

There should be no Live or recorded music licencing allowed, RA is now surrounded on all sides by residential properties. The old car park will be turned into residential properties directly opposite. Music in such close proximity will have a significant impact on the health and well-being of local residents. Noise echoes across the road at the front and rear of the RA, at the same time customers stand outside smoking and drinking, disturbing local residents.

There has been antisocial behaviour with gangs of people fighting in the car park and only six meters from where my [REDACTED] daughters bedroom. [REDACTED] should not have to witness antisocial behaviour and fighting outside her bedroom window. Totally unacceptable.

I have no objection to the opening hours but feel that allowing live/recorded music from 10:00-00:30 every day is extremely excessive.

The pub is in close proximity to a number of houses. The houses and pub are Victorian in build and the walls are of single brick thickness so sound does carry. We cannot have windows and doors open on occasions as the music/noise permeates our house and interferes with own television and radio enjoyment.

Customers already stand on the pavement at the front of the pub drinking and shouting and with the front door being opened and closed the music will also be heard.

The pub has various open sided structures in the rear garden so will music be played in these? Marquees have previously been erected in the rear garden and loud music played.

Customers take little heed of leaving the pub quietly and frequently shout to each other across the car park and down the road. I have have numerous empty bottles, cans, crisp packets etc. thrown into my garden. I have also caught customers urinating in our gardens. Not pleasant.

Once again, I strongly oppose the licence application on the grounds of public nuisance

Please can I first say how disappointed I am at not receiving the notice of application for premises licence regarding The Rothchild Arms, [Redacted], I learnt about the application via a neighbour.

I am writing to oppose firstly the application for live music everyday. From past experience when The Rothchild Arms has had live music, they might as well be playing in my lounge, it is so loud I can not even hear my TV. [Redacted] I have tolerated their loud live music on the occasions they have had performers, but to grant the option for the pub to have live music everyday would be intolerable not just for me but for the whole road. The pub is on a residential street, there is nothing else around it accept residential houses, with families, small children and older people, how could the option for the pub to have live music on regular occasions or even everyday, if they so choose, even be considered.

Secondly I wish to oppose the requested opening times. The landlords of the Rothchild Arms allow their customers to gather outside the front of the pub to smoke, this causes noise and is quite intimidating having large groups of men standing around the front of the pub. I have heard several people on the road saying they cross over to the other side to avoid the pub. I tend to do any work required to the front of my house before the pub opens as I am also intimidated by the men that gather outside smoking. The pub used to open at 4pm during the week and 12.00 at weekends, the proposed opening at 10am every day will not only encourage longer drinking hours, resulting in more drunk people but also not give any of us close neighbours any respite time from the pub. Even without live music the normal music played is loud enough. The pub does not control their customers outside the front of the pub, their customers will regularly sit on my wall smoking, stand right outside my front door talking loudly, shouting, swearing etc. [Redacted]

The pub garden is surrounded by neighbour's gardens at the back [Redacted], if the pub was to open 10.00-00.00 everyday, with their customers in their pub garden, again with no respect for neighbour's, swearing shouting etc. us neighbours will not even be able to enjoy any peaceful times in our own gardens.

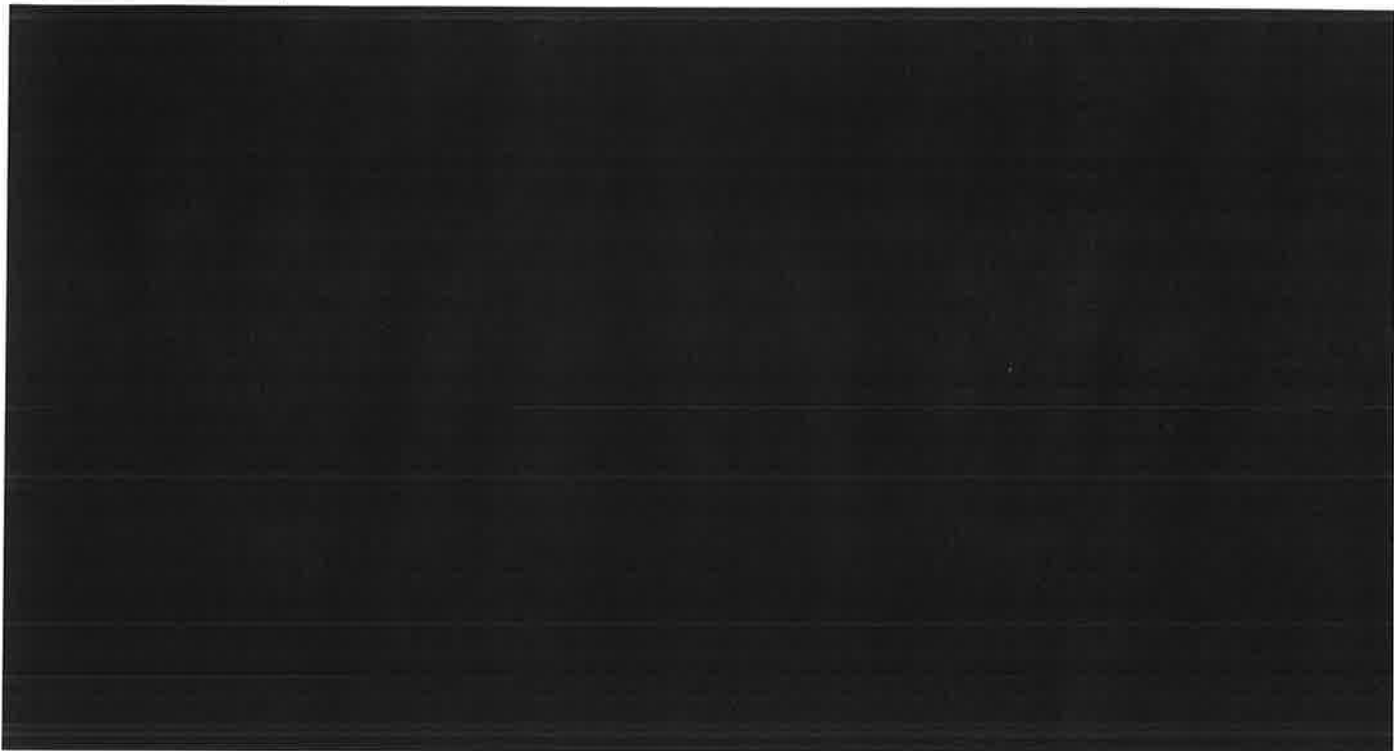
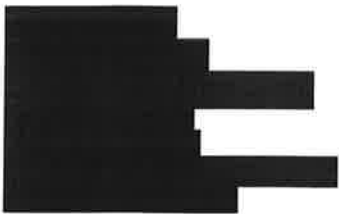
