1 APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE / CHANGES IN MEMBERSHIP

Apologies were given from Mr N Crank and Mr H McCarthy.

2 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest.

3 MINUTES

The Minutes of the meeting held on the 14 March 2016 were agreed as a correct record subsequent to the following minor amendment:



Item 8 – Milton Keynes Archaeological Officer’s Report

Ms Wise presented the report on behalf of Mr Crank who was unable to attend the meeting.

4 MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES

Item 4 – Buckinghamshire County Archaeological Service Reports

Emergency Recording Archaeology Fund

Mr Newell explained that there had been no new expenditure from the fund since the last meeting and that top-up funds had been pledged by all organisations bar AVDC.

ACTION: Mr Newell to progress with AVDC

Roman Casket Fund

A member of the public had donated £1000 which had been used towards the urgent part of the conservation. A grant application had been resubmitted to the Haverfield Bequest for additional funding.

Accessibility of maps

The issue of about the accessibility of maps on the County Council’s website remained unresolved.

ACTION: Mr Newell to seek resolution with ICT.

Formatting of finds reports

Members were advised that the problem with formatting of grid referencing had been addressed and the issue had been resolved satisfactorily.

5 PRESENTATION ON LIDAR

Mr R Oram, Archaeologist Oxfordshire County Council, was welcomed to the meeting.

Members received a presentation on the Light Detection and Ranging system (LiDAR), during which the following key points were highlighted:

- The Environment Agency pioneered the civilian use of LiDAR in the 1990s using LiDAR as a tool for creating cost-effective terrain models of flood risk areas.
- The use of LiDAR for identifying archaeological features had been undertaken within the last 15 years.
- Information from the LiDAR system was consulted as a matter of course as part of the planning information process at Oxfordshire County Council.
- Some mapping took place from LiDAR but a composite image also had to be produced.
- New sites identified by LiDAR included Nethercote DMV, Cornbury Park, Lee’s Rest Hunting Lodge, Whitehall DMV, the North Wessex Down field system, Thame and Wytham Hall.
- The LiDAR had produced details about areas of Ridge and Furrow in Oxfordshire which had been useful in steering large housing applications from areas of

archaeological importance.

- The LiDAR system was initially used by the Environment Agency for their own purposes in terms of mapping out areas prone to the risk of flooding. However the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty Conservation Board were undertaking a programme of LiDAR work using lottery Heritage funds.

The Chairman thanked Mr Oram for the very informative presentation.

Members of the Forum received the following updates:

Buckinghamshire Archaeological Officer's report

Mr P Markham referred Members of the Forum to the report included with the agenda, from which the following key points were highlighted:

HS2

- Negotiations and advice were ongoing especially around the Service Level Agreement which was expected shortly.
- Schedule 17 applications were expected from October.
- There was a difference of opinion between HS2 officers and the Local Authority officers in terms of the amount of work that would be required.

Woodlands

- Excavation had recorded at least five archaeological sites of Iron Age to Roman date, of which three were significant settlement sites.

Eaton Leys

- The area for the proposed housing development in Milton Keynes had been trial trenched from which very little field information had emerged.
- Geophysics carried out further south had shown some quite important Roman remains.

New road in Weston Turville

- Excavations had shown the location of a possible roman tavern.

Stoke Mandeville (HS2)

- The church graveyard had been identified as a significant archaeological site. A heritage consultant had been contracted by HS2 to write a report about what was currently known about the site, what could be investigated and the appropriate method of investigation.
- Two other major graveyards had also been identified along the HS2 line.
- A meeting had taken place with members of the relevant Church bodies about the more recent interments and burials in the graveyard as discussions would need to take place with living relatives about the possibility of moving remains.

Mr Farley, Bucks Archaeological Society advised that Leicester University had expressed an interest in carrying out an ancient DNA project at the church in Stoke

Mandeville and that the idea of a legacy garden had been proposed where the remains and archaeological fragments from the church would be stored. Mr Farley also advised that a member of the Archaeological Society had partly transcribed the Parish register several years ago.

Emergency Recording Fund report

Mr S Newall, Environment Team Leader advised that there was money still available in the Emergency Recording Fund and that no requests for funding had been received since the last meeting of the Buckinghamshire Historic Environment Forum.

Buckinghamshire County Museum report

Mr B Thorn, Keeper of Archaeology Collections, gave the following update:

- The value of the Lenborough Anglo Saxon coin Hoard had been officially confirmed at £1.35m. £20,000 had been raised by the Museum, Friends and Patrons as well as a further £20,000 locally towards the potential purchase of the coin Hoard. Grant applications had also been submitted to the National Heritage Memorial Fund, the Art Fund, the Headly Foundation and the Rothschild Foundation for additional funding.
- A free exhibition of the Hoard and lectures at the Old Gaol, Buckingham had generated a large amount of funding and pledges. A meeting at Stowe House had also generated some additional pledges.
- The Mint of Norway, a private company, had expressed an interest in acquiring the Hoard, with the possibility of the collection touring around Scandinavia and the publication of a coffee table book.
- The Hoard had been designated as treasure and as the property of the Crown under the terms of the Treasure Act.
- The Act gave any registered museum the right to acquire the Hoard if the funding could be raised within a 4 month period. If funding could not be raised the Hoard would be returned to the individual to sell as they wished. There was the opportunity of the Museum acquiring some of the Hoard if all of the funds could not be raised.
- No extra security would be required as the museum already insured paintings of Hartwell House, which were equally valuable.
- A bid had been submitted for the re-development of the ground floor of the Museum. In the short term the display would be in the Georgian Room with the intention of the coins being displayed as part of the main lottery exhibition.
- In terms of the security for the storage and display of the Hoard, insurance indemnity was in place for the Museum and Hartwell House.

National Trust report

Mr G Marshall highlighted the following key points from the report:

- Restoration works on the 17th century south terrace at Cliveden continued.
- The restoration was being undertaken by Oxford Archaeology and had included major drainage works on the top of the terrace, across the two lawns at the ends of the terrace and on the parterre below the terrace.

- The original 17th century elevation had been uncovered behind the current structure as well as light wells in the chamber. The drainage work had also uncovered 17th century foundations which were thought to be the terrace from the previous mansion.
- Mr P Markham said that a well preserved Roman pottery kiln had been uncovered at Stowe as well as pits, ditches and a possible well, also of Roman date. The numerous findings had highlighted the significance of the landscape. A report on the kiln would be published on the National Trust website in due course and in *Records of Buckinghamshire* in due course.

Milton Keynes Archaeological Officer's report

Members of the Forum noted the report.

District Council Conservation Officer's report

Mr K Frost, Aylesbury Vale District Council gave the following update:

- The Heritage Team continued to be busy, with casework and requests for informal advice on historic building repairs, alterations and extensions, the team having received to date this year some 500 proposals for comment, which was higher than for the same period last year.
- The Heritage Team had recently undergone some major staff changes with Anne Davies and Julia Foster both having left earlier in the year. In the meantime Morwenna Breen-Haynes had been taken on earlier in the year as a Heritage Assistant, with Keith Frost having recently joined the team as Senior Heritage Officer. Emilia McDonald was also due to leave the Heritage Team in October, after 10 years with AVDC. As it stood the Management Team at AVDC were keen to ensure there continued to be sufficient staff for the work and were keen to see Emilia's post was filled when it became vacant.
- Buckinghamshire Gardens Trust had been hard at work producing some rather good research papers on various historic gardens (some designated, others not) around the County. AVDC have been sent pdf copies of the relevant studies for the Council's files but they were also available from the Trusts' website www.bucksgardensrust.org.uk

Buckinghamshire Conservation Trust report

Mr R Pushman gave the following update:

- There had been a small grass fire at Quarrendon Hills.
- A water pipe across the stream had fractured and had subsequently been repaired by Thames Water.
- The area had now been secured by a fence.
- The introduction of a Management Programme had not been possible as yet due to lack of resources. Dealing with breaches of the fence etc. was very time consuming and required extra resourcing.
- Extra full-time staffing is beyond us at the moment and would be wishful thinking!!
- Many thanks and kind regards

- The Conservation Trust had been obliged to take action in respect of the decline of the old church building. The church ruins had been formally placed at risk by Historic England meaning it would now be possible to access grant funding.
- Some income had been received from the Countryside Stewardship scheme and the Department of Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA).
- Field work was planned during the coming winter months. The possibility of using the new school car park at weekends had been discussed as there was currently only an agricultural entrance which made access to the site difficult.
- The response to a flyer circulated about the membership of the Trust had not been as good as expected.

ACTION: Mr Pushman and Mr Farley to discuss the possibility of holding an open day to publicise the Conservation Trust.

7 WOODLANDS PROJECT

Ms E Alqassar gave a presentation on the Woodlands project, during which the following key points were highlighted:

- A planning application had been submitted for a major development area to the east of Aylesbury.
- Extensive trial trenching and a full coverage geographical survey had taken place. The results of the trenching were generally bearing out the results of the geophysics and any anomalies would be targeted.
- A large amount of bone, pottery, tesserae from mosaic floors and floor and roof tiles had been found which indicated the presence of at least one high status Roman building. The significance of the sites would be determined before any recommendations were made to Aylesbury Vale District Council.
- The excavation of the areas on Hamden Fields had been well covered. The proposed Roman site had been preserved in situ.
- There were no LiDAR overlays of the area but aerial photographs had analysed and officers were satisfied with the desk-based assessment that had taken place.

8 DISCUSSION OF PUBLIC OUTREACH WORK

Ms E Alqassar gave the following update:

- 5 public outreach events had taken place including a presentation on the role of HERs in Planning to the National Gardens Trust in March, a careers event at Thomas Harding Junior School, a display about Buckinghamshire's Horrible History at the Waterside Theatre to coincide with a week of Horrible History performances, a display about Romans in the Vale, and an open day in Stone.
- Forthcoming events included a presentation at Bucks Local History Network Conference on the 1 October and a presentation to the Association of Local Government Archaeology Officers UK and the Chartered Institute of Archaeologists on

standards and guidance in producing fieldwork project designs.

Mr Farley advised that the Buckinghamshire Local History Network Annual Conference 2016 would be held on Saturday 1 October 2016, 10am, The Oculus, Aylesbury Vale District Council Offices. The conference included talks on topics such as Human Activity in the Buckinghamshire Middle Thames from 10,000 BCE to Roman times, the evidence of Kingsmead Quarry, Horton and Researching the Iron Age and Roman landscapes around Aylesbury.

The Chairman advised that as part of Heritage Open Days, the Tower Block County Hall, Aylesbury Crown Court and the Judges Lodgings had been open for visitors on the 10 September which has been very well attended.

A document giving details of the history of the buildings would be circulated to Members of the Forum – Committee Assistant / Chairman

9 BUCKINGHAMSHIRE HISTORIC BUILDINGS TRUST

Members were referred to the briefing note giving an update on activities undertaken by Buckinghamshire Historic Buildings Trust from which the following key points were made:

- The Trust had an active small grants programme for projects in Buckinghamshire and Milton Keynes.
- The rescue of a very dilapidated Grade 2 building in Newport Pagnell was current being undertaken.
- A Friends' of BHBT Programme was being created to give the Trust a wider base.
- A part time project officer had been appointed in May 2016, mainly to drive forward the Newport Pagnell project.



End of Continuation Phase Report 06 AUGUST 2017



1. Introduction

This project completion report has been prepared as part of the terms of grant of the Stanley Smith Horticultural Trust award of May 2015 for a sum of £3,500 to cover the two-year continuation phase of our Research and Recording Project for lesser known Bucks parks and gardens. It has been prepared by Dr Sarah Rutherford, Chairman of BGT and Trustee responsible for this project in collaboration with other Bucks Gardens Trust (BGT) team members.

We were also in part funded by the Finnis Scott Foundation, also received funding from the Capability Brown Festival for research on Brown sites, and contributed from our BGT reserves. We continued to receive valuable in-kind help from Bucks County Council including HER resources, meeting spaces and Ordnance Survey mapping licensing.

2. Project Progress

Following the HLF funded Pilot Project of 2013-15 we seamlessly continued with our Research and Recording Project for a further two years as outlined in our grant award request, thanks in part to the generous grant awarded by the Stanley Smith Horticultural Trust. We continued the project at a steady rate, recruited and trained 5 new volunteer recorders and only marginally exceeded our average monthly projected budget expenditure of £562. We intended to research and record fully (to completion of dossier stage) 30 sites and

completed 24, with a further 14 sites under investigation, 5 of which are very close to this completion of dossier stage. We believe we have fulfilled our targets in this respect. Our progress and financial aspects are monitored by BGT Council including trustees, to whom a progress report by Dr Sarah Rutherford is submitted 3 times a year at meetings and discussed. BGT Council is pleased with the steady progress the project has made.

3. Project Outcomes

The most obvious outcome was the completion of the investigation of 25 sites with the production of 24 dossiers published on our web site at <http://www.bucksgardenstrust.org.uk/locally-important-sites/> and five close to completion. The sites are named in Appendix 1 and the dossiers are available for download on the web site. As our contribution to the Capability Brown tercentenary celebrations we targeted unregistered sites connected with him and also produced a historic development of the registered Ditton Park (in historic Bucks), which was poorly understood. This gave us new material to present at a day seminar on Brown in Bucks which we held at his master work Wotton Underwood.

A further 14 sites have been under investigation since April this year, including 8 Humphry Repton-associated sites, in anticipation of the commemoration of the bicentenary of his death next year. This brings to 57 the number of sites completed and in progress by the end of this phase, i.e. over a four year period 2013-17. We have 44 dossiers on the web site. We believe there are up to 400 sites to be addressed in this way, so we are making steady progress in this long term project.

The Stanley Smith Horticultural Trust has been mentioned on the front of each dossier completed in the period and the financial support provided by SSHT is gratefully acknowledged in the introduction to each.

Summaries of the significance of 34 of the sites studied have been published in the scholarly *Records of Bucks* published by the Bucks Archaeological Society in the editions of 2016, in which the support of the SSHT has been acknowledged, and 2017. A copy of the 2016 article was sent to you last year and the 2017 article is attached.

A less obvious outcome of the project has been the personal development of the 20 volunteers who have developed into a cohesive and enthusiastic team. A few volunteers have dropped out for various reasons, but all have said how much they have enjoyed learning new skills and seeing Bucks landscapes in a new way, in detail.

We are held up by our umbrella body The Gardens Trust as a model of good practice for other County Gardens Trusts to use when developing similar projects of their own. Historic England's Regional Landscape Architect has provided positive feedback on the standard of the dossiers, and various local authorities use the dossiers to inform their consideration of planning applications. Dossiers are used by the Bucks County Council Historic Environment advisers and lodged in the HER.

4. Conclusions

- The Research and Recording Project has contributed considerably to the knowledge of Bucks designed landscapes, with the information contributing to understanding their significance and helping to conserve them for future generations, and to the personal development of our 20 volunteers.
- Underpinned by the completed 2015-17 continuation phase, so generously funded in part by the SSHT, we have been able to embark enthusiastically upon another two-year phase, in part breaking further new ground by studying the work of designer Humphry Repton in the county. The successful implementation of the 2015-17 phase has helped us to attract funding for this next phase, including a further tranche of £4,700 from the HLF, as well as a further most generous award of £4,500 from Stanley Smith Horticultural Trust for which are continuingly grateful.
- With the momentum we have generated over four years, we intend to continue the Research and Recording Project until all 400 sites are addressed if we can continue to obtain the funding and recruit volunteers.
- We believe we have furthered the Stanley Smith Horticultural Trust charitable objects and fulfilled our obligations in the terms of the grant award.

5. Acknowledgements

We wish to thank the Trustees of the Stanley Smith Horticultural Trust for so generously funding this phase, which will have long term benefits beyond the immediate period.

We wish to record our thanks to Dr David Rae. The relationship was made as easy as possible and we are most grateful to him for his help.




Buckinghamshire Gardens – facts and figures

- There are over 400 parks and gardens on the local list
- There are 4 district councils plus Milton Keynes unitary authority in the county
- Shape of county makes for difficult logistics stretches from MK in north to M25 in the south
- Volunteers needed across the county
- Bucks GT members approx. 180 a need to recruit from outside
- Support from other local organisations, including Bucks Archaeological Society
- County town Aylesbury – centre for meetings and location of records office




A. PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

- 1 To advise the Forum of the work of the County Archaeological Service since the last BHEF meeting (19th September 2016).

Report Summary

- HS2 Ltd: discussions and advice are ongoing with Helen Vass's Team and with Fusion's (Company overseeing the archaeological field work) Director Jay Carver, over project designs and written schemes of investigation
- East-West Rail: advice and information is being provided for their ecological mitigation sites
- Heathrow New Runway: We have been invited to a number of meetings on this and have provided advice to a number of documents and the forthcoming environmental statement.
- Berry Hill Farm Taplow: Excavation prior to sand and gravel extraction has recorded a Romano-British 'ladder settlement' and earlier prehistoric settlement and landscape.
- Marlow Flood Alleviation Scheme: Excavation prior to the flood alleviation scheme works is currently being undertaken with linear ditches appearing to run towards a series of Bronze Age burial sites together with probable Neolithic pottery recorded in a number of pits.
- Wainwrights, Long Crendon: Excavation prior to a residential development revealed three north-south aligned ditches, probably all of prehistoric date, a curving ditch and a small number of other features more certainly of early/middle Anglo-Saxon date indicating occupation of this date.

C. RESOURCES

- 3 The County's archaeological service forms part of the Transport Economy Environment Service's Environment Team within Environment Services. Philip Markham is the Senior Archaeology Officer, Eliza Alqassar is the Archaeology Officer (part-time), Julia Wise is the HER Officer, Paul Clements is the HER Assistant (part time) and Simon Newell is the Environment Team Leader.

Since the last report Eliza Alqassar has left her part-time post with Historic England as an Assistant Inspector of Ancient Monuments and currently works three days a week for Bucks County Council, increasing to four days per week from the end of September.

D. SUPPORTING INFORMATION

4 Strategic Issues/Projects

High Speed 2 –We continue to advise HS2 Ltd on draft documents and revisions and these documents now resemble standard practice through the Planning system and the Design Manual for Roads and Bridges. We provide advice through the HS2 Ltd Heritage Sub-Group. HS2 Ltd historic environment documents that we have been dealing with which provide the basis for the working procedures include:

- Burial Grounds, Human Remains and Monuments Procedures
- Procedure for the unexpected discovery of archaeological remains of national importance
- Historic Environment Research and Delivery Strategy
- Generic Written Scheme of Investigation
- Generic Written Scheme of Investigation – Built Heritage
- Generic Written Scheme of Investigation – Archaeology
- Technical Standard: Specification for historic environment investigations
- Technical Standard: Specification for Project Plans and Location Specific Written Schemes of Investigation
- Technical Standard: For the recording of the setting of Heritage Assets
- Technical Standard: Archaeology and built heritage approach to geotechnical investigation
- Historic Environment Physical Archiving Strategy
- Technical Standard: Historic Environment Physical Archive Procedure
- Historic Environment Digital Data Management and Archiving Strategy
- Technical Standard: Historic Environment Digital Data Management and Archiving Procedure

The Heritage Sub Group generally has two meetings per year and the next meeting is scheduled for the 26th September 2017. These meetings alternate between London and Birmingham.

The BCC HS2 team has been in discussion with HS2 Ltd over a service level agreement covering BCC and the Districts. These discussions are based on the HS2 Information paper C13: Local Authority Funding and New Burdens arising from HS2. Of the 14 activities which HS2 will provide funding for, the historic environment is included or will have an input in 6 of these.

Geophysics is still being undertaken when HS2 has access. There are some interesting results from around Fleet Marston. Archaeological groundworks have now begun, mostly in Hertfordshire but we are expecting evaluation works at Stoke Mandeville in early autumn. At the time of writing we have yet to receive the written scheme of investigation.

It is expected that significant archaeological works will begin this autumn for the line and will continue for a number of years. This is expected to lead to a shortage of available archaeological field teams for normal planning and DMRB schemes.

We understand that the location specific written schemes of investigation will be based on the generic written scheme of investigation and on the Historic Environment Research and Delivery Strategy document. These will be written by the archaeological contractor, approved by Fusion and HS2 Ltd and provided to us for comment. Fusion and HS2 will ensure that all field work and recording is undertaken to the same standard and format. BCC will be invited to monitor the work but comments will currently go to Fusion and HS2 and not the field team. HS2 say that most of the recording will be digital and available on-line quickly to inform other investigations along the route and interested individuals. Archiving has not been agreed but Historic England appears to favour a single repository for the archive, such as the Cheshire salt mines. It is envisaged that the information produced will be in an appropriate HER format for easy data entry although this has not yet been discussed with the HER community. HS2 have recently agreed a three-year SLA for HER data and this will be supplied imminently.

- **East-West Rail:** This has been ongoing for a number of years and consultants have been in touch with us over the environmental statement and for providing advice on approximately two dozen ecological mitigation sites. These sites are now beginning to appear on the district council's planning weekly lists. Where agreed these sites will usually have a geophysical survey and trial trenching, on smaller sites a strip, map and sample excavation will take place. A service level

agreement has been agreed for our input into this proposal. The HER has provided data for an updated environmental statement.

- **Heathrow New Runway:** We have been invited to a number of meetings on this and have provided advice on a number of documents and the forthcoming environmental statement. A service level agreement has been agreed for our input into this proposal. The HER has been approached to supply data for the environmental statement and is awaiting agreement to proceed.

New National Designations – DCMS added 17 buildings to the List between July 2016 and June 2017, all at Grade II: 16 are war memorials (Akeley, Aylesbury, Burnham, Drayton Parslow, Granborough, Haddenham, Hazlemere, Mursley, Naphill, Newton Longville, Padbury, Radnage, Stewkley, West Wycombe, Wingrave and Winslow) and the other is 10 Rowsham Road, a 16th century timber-framed house in Bierton. Three parks and gardens were added to the Register, all at Grade II: Stoke Place, Wakefield Lodge Park and the formal gardens at Stockgrove House. In addition the landscaped park at Wotton House has been upgraded from Grade II* to Grade I.

Significant archaeological investigations include:

Berry Hill Farm Taplow: Archaeological excavation has been undertaken on this site for a number of years as different phases of sand and gravel extraction have been programmed. These works have been undertaken by Wessex Archaeology and prior to excavation a desk based assessment, geophysical survey and trial trenching took place. This prehistoric to Romano-British settlement site was recognised at an early stage and its excavation was timetabled so that it could be fully recorded prior to the sand and gravel extraction. Although carefully timetabled aggregate demand was such that it was agreed that the site would be worked north to south and completed areas would be signed off when completed. With flexibility on both sides this was amicably achieved and at the time of writing the on-site investigations would be completed in two to three weeks. As work progressed and the site weathered further features came to light with what appear to be a number of phases of 'ladder settlement' and earlier hut circles. Two sunken floor buildings were recorded and although appeared to be of a typical Saxon plan were dated to the Roman period. Two interesting burials were found: a full cow skeleton and a human burial (photos below). We look forward to the report in due course. A training day run by Wessex Archaeology for the BCC Planning Team was a great success.



Marlow Flood Alleviation Scheme: This scheme has been about to start for a number of years and is now taking place. Difficulties have arisen over this complex scheme as the site has a number of stakeholders and contains significant archaeological features such as Neolithic/Bronze Age burial mounds (which are being preserved) and other prehistoric features. The BCC Archaeological Service has been in discussion with the Environment Agency, their in-house archaeological advisers, the Marlow Archaeological Society, Trent and Peak's archaeological field team and Wycombe District Councils

Planning Department. Some of the difficulties have been over the Marlow Archaeological Society gaining access to undertake their investigations, the timing of the field work and the extent of the ground works and the height of the required bund which will go over the burial mounds to protect them. Meetings have taken place to try to get everyone 'singing from the same hymn sheet' and with the site works progressing and weekly site meetings taking place all is happily going well. This is a complex site and may be a ritual landscape used over a period of time. Two linear features appear to be a trackway leading from the River Thames to the burial site. At the time of writing approximately 30% of the site remains to be stripped and significant archaeological features and finds are likely to be present. An open day is being planned for the end of September 2017.

- **Wainwrights Long Crendon:** On a smaller scale to the above sites, excavation here was undertaken prior to a residential development and revealed a moderate number of linear features, pits and post-holes, much of which was not identified by geophysical survey, but was revealed in some of the earlier evaluation trenches. The earliest activity is represented by a few finds of prehistoric struck flint and sherds of Later Bronze Age pottery. The earliest features are dated to the Iron Age and consist of a number of ditches. The majority of the deposits appear to reflect the presence of early/middle Anglo-Saxon occupation. Most early and middle Saxon occupation is recognised by the presence of houses, either sunken floored buildings or halls, neither of which were recorded here. The most significant and unusual feature observed was a curvilinear ditch with pottery and a radiocarbon date of the late 7th or 8th century. Along with the modest amount of animal bone, these features all suggest occupation on the site. A single fragment of smithing hearth bottom from the ditch is scant evidence for smithing on the site, and while the bone-handled awl is suggestive of leatherworking, it cannot be definitively tied to this period. The environmental remains were likewise limited, but suggest arable

crops and the usual domesticated animals were consumed on the site. In summary, this modest amount of fieldwork and modest range of finds has, nevertheless added to an understanding of the historic topography of Long Crendon before nucleation of the village in medieval times.

In October she gave a presentation to the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists (the UK's professional body) on good practice in preparing archaeological project designs. Julia arranged a poster display and demonstrated the HER live at the Buckinghamshire History Fair in November.

2017

In January Eliza gave a talk to the BAS Active Archaeology Group and a talk on 'Romans in the Vale' to both of the Marlow archaeological groups in February; Julia was involved in a fieldwalking event at Cuddington, organised by Mike Farley for the Buckinghamshire Archaeological Society; whilst Eliza was instrumental in arranging a fieldwalking event at Quarrendon in April. Later in April Eliza gave a talk on Iron Age and Roman settlement around Aylesbury to the Aston Clinton U3A group.

In May Eliza gave a presentation on careers in archaeology to students at St Michael's Catholic School in High Wycombe and in June she gave a presentation on the 'Archaeology of the Chilterns' to the Chilterns Conservation Board.

More recently Julia and Eliza laid on a display about Saxon and Viking Buckinghamshire with childrens' activities for the County Museum's Festival of Archaeology fun day in July and a poster display on the Medieval and Tudor earthworks at Quarrendon for the Bucks Conservation Trust's public open day. Eliza, Julia and Phil also helped with stewarding the open day, acting as expert guides.

The Archaeology Service has also hosted work shadowing students in April and in July.

Thanks to Paul, the Archaeology Service is now using Facebook and Twitter to keep local residents in touch and up to date through social media.

Staffing

Paul's contract has been extended to the end of the 2017/18 financial year and he continues to be a great asset to the team.

HER software

The HER database and GIS was upgraded to the latest version of the specialist industry-standard software in January. Due to the complexity of the Bucks HER bespoke elements, we were the first HER to upgrade to version 5 and the consultants spent a lot of time and effort ensuring the upgrade went to plan.

HER enhancement and volunteer projects

As reported at the last meeting Paul is continuing with geo-rectifying AP plots and contractors' geophysical surveys and loading them into GIS. Julia has recently acquired and loaded a 2012 update of surviving Medieval and post-medieval ridge and furrow earthworks for 6 priority parishes in the north of the county.

Progress is still being made by one of the HER volunteers on the milestones project. The other regular volunteer has completed inputting new records for the turnpike roads in Buckinghamshire and is moving on to recording theatres and cinemas.

The Buckinghamshire Gardens Trust Research and Recording Project is continuing to make good progress with 44 reports completed, 4 reports in draft and work underway on a further 10 gardens. In 2015 and 2016 the Gardens Trust volunteers concentrated on 20 parks and gardens in Buckinghamshire where Capability Brown is known or alleged to have worked; in 2017 the volunteers are concentrating on the parks and gardens where Humphrey Repton was involved.

Julia was involved in a national project piloting the enhancement of Historic England's online National Heritage List by external partners and members of the public through the submission of additional information, website links and images. The HER was one of only three HERs testing and developing the software, which is now live.

Julia has also been involved in developing national HER outcomes and detailed performance indicators in partnership with Historic England and the Association of Local Government Archaeological Officers. She was one of 5 HER Officers working on the project which sets national standards against which all HERs can be measured as part of regular audits.

Report from the National Trust

Cliveden

Oxford Archaeology have recently completed a report on their research into and recording of the electrical generator house at Cliveden. The building dates from c. 1896 and was built by the William Astor to provide power to the estate. Sadly the building lacks any machinery and what we are left with is the shell of the building, plus the concrete engine and dynamo bases, glazed bricks on the walls and some line shafting used to drive a workshop in one of the rooms. The interior was archaeologically excavated a few years ago by volunteers and members of Bucks. Arch. Soc. Active Archaeology Group, leading to the recovery of a number of objects associated with the operation of the building. Recent research by property volunteers has led to the recovery of a huge archive of information on the Museum of English Rural Life at Reading. Currently tenders are being received for re-roofing the building but its final use remains yet to be determined – possibly an exhibition space for statuary currently held in storage and items relating to the operation of the building.

There are several other restoration projects at Cliveden where archaeological recording has been undertaken. These include the Blenheim Pavilion where removal of the 1970s internal cement render has led to the exposure of two blocked doorways leading to an external privy and cold bath, thus confirming design drawings by Giacomo Leoni (1730s). Excavations have taken place at the 19th c. Flint House to expose the clay tile roof and several enigmatic circular holes in the parapet which we think may have supported a roof-top viewing platform looking across the garden parterre. Both these projects have been undertaken by Oxford Archaeology. OA are also currently completing their report on monitoring observations on the South Terrace at Cliveden, a major project which has been going on for about four years now.

Boarstall Tower

Some recent test pitting in the east paddock at Boarstall Tower used as a car park has identified a narrow wall close to the east wall of the gardens which we think could be the remains of a medieval building demolished during the Civil War siege of Boarstall Tower. The pits were undertaken to identify a suitable location for a replacement septic tank. The pits have confirmed a feature identified by geophysics in 2008 which appears to be an infilled moat or canal running across the width of the northern third of the paddock.

Stowe Gardens

Excavations have recently been undertaken to locate the site of the statue of Thalia at the Fane of Pastoral Poetry (unsuccessful!) and statue bases and paths around the Doric Arch (partly successful with four of ten bases identified and a well-defined gravel path also located). The aim is to reinstate these statue groups but locating firm evidence can be frustrating and accurate restoration can also be frustrated by the presence of mature trees which were not there in the 18th century! One successful project is the reinstatement of the 1814 Coade stone Gothic Cross. I hope I can show a couple of images at the forum.
