#### **Summary**

1. This report relates to two proposals for funding from the Chesham and Chiltern Villages LAF Local priorities devolved budget for 2011/12.

- 2. Applications received should be evaluated against the priorities agreed by the Local Area Forum (LAF) in its Local Area Plan. This report seeks agreement to allocate funding from the LAF's Local Priorities budget to enable the projects to be implemented.

#### Recommendation

5. Members of the Chesham and Chiltern Villages Local Area Forum are invited to agree that funding from the Local Priorities budget be allocated to the projects listed in section 3. If all the above projects are agreed, this leaves the amount unallocated at £3181.95. We have, however, been approached by Chiltern District Council's Communities Team for part-funding of two projects: a youth project in Waterside in association with the new Community Association and a project for the elderly in rural areas. These are likely to require in the region of £500 each.

#### Background

#### **Church2Community: Community Arts Quilt Project**

- 6. This proposal came to the last meeting but a decision was deferred pending further information on the cost of employing a skilled quilting teacher and the scale of the project. Church2Community would like to commission an artist/teacher to assist the community to create a piece of textile quilted art to be housed in Chesham Methodist Church, specifically the Wesley Hall. The piece would provide an opportunity for the community to express in creative art what Chesham means to them. The aim of the piece is that it will show aspects of the community, designed and created by the community with the assistance, guidance and teaching of a quilting textile artist/teacher. The piece will be owned by the church2community project.
- 7. The project in Chesham will provide workshops for local people of all ages to learn new skills, including a couple of workshops in the villages of Ley Hill and Lee Common. The aim is to start the project in early January so that the finished work will be able to be displayed for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Celebrations. The project proposer has already spoken to many members of the community who are very enthusiastic about the project and want to be involved. A Movers and Shakers group for older adults will link into an already established Hobbies social group for older and vulnerable people. 48 warden assisted residential housing flats opposite the church premises and Cromwell House (Paradigm Housing) just a few yards further along, provide major opportunities for engaging more older people. In addition, the project proposers have over 130 children and young people and their families coming into their premises each week for activities and they have also consulted them about the project. CAWS (Chesham Asian Welfare Society) have been consulted and are very enthusiastic about their involvement and being given the opportunity to use and teach their traditional embroidery skills to other members of the community in the town. This is the first time anyone has approached them to become involved a project of this type, and they are very excited about the possibilities for social integration.
- 8. The number of people expected to be involved in the completion of the project is approximately 175 people. This includes those attending workshops and those involved on site. The project will clearly have a much wider impact, as once completed, there will be an exhibition event to invite local dignitaries and the community as a whole to come and learn

about the project and how it was completed. The project will have the ability to offer anyone who visits the exhibition interested in learning such skills or participating in these activities to be able to join the Hobbies group to further that interest, thus providing an opportunity for further learning and experience to the wider community. The ages range from 4 years old to over 90 years old and they would come from all ethnic backgrounds, as identified above.

The artist cost are £150 per day 10 days = £1500 plus £100 for travelling expenses. This is a normal fee for any peripatetic teacher/artist and we have consulted widely on the costs and suitable people to ask through the Quilter's Guild of the British Isles.

- 9. The total funding being asked for is for artist/teacher fees £1600, Materials £350, publicity and launch £800. Total £2750.
- 10. In terms of meeting the Local Priorities Budget funding criteria, the proposal:
  - a. contributes to more than one of the local area priorities, namely:
  - More support to older people living in their homes. The project will encourage those living in their own homes to come out and meet new people, learn new skills and activities and meet young people building relationships, and reduce isolation and fear.
  - Reduction of anti-social behaviour by young people in rural areas.
  - Lack of youth activities and facilities
  - Weak links with the Asian communities
  - b. The project has already secured funding of £1780 towards the total cost of £4530 as well as the time of church volunteers in organising things.
  - c. The project will involve members of the community on a voluntary basis.
- 11. I recommend that this project receives funding because it meets several of the current local area priorities, it will develop the skills of the community by the delivery of workshops by a highly skilled artist/teacher and will contribute to the sustainability of the newly acquired or enhanced skills, by the running of the "Hobbies club". Further benefits will be inter-generational and multi-ethnic. The piece of art work will be a lasting legacy to encourage other community projects of this nature.

#### Whelpley Hill Village Hall Multi-Sports Sessions

- 12. This application is for extra equipment (£250) and flood lights (£500) that will enable the continuation of multi-sports sessions that were recently started up by Chiltern District Council. The LAF part-funded (£406) earlier this year, the start-up provision of eight weeks of multi-sports sessions. These have proven very popular and Whelpley Hill Village Hall Committee have now decided to train up volunteers and become affiliated to Action4Youth so that they can continue these sessions themselves and offer others. The flood-lights will allow additional activities to take place outside the hall.
- 13 In terms of meeting the Local Priorities budget funding criteria, the proposal:
  - a) Contributes to more than one of the local area priorities, namely:
  - Lack of youth activities and facilities
  - Reduction of anti-social behaviour by young people.
  - b) The project has match-funding in kind through CDC officer time until such time the volunteers are trained and able to deliver the activities themselves.

- c) The project will increase community capacity to deliver youth activities.
- 14. Because this project meets the local priorities and will support the endeavours of a budding youth club, I recommend this project for funding.

#### **Further applications**

15. If the above proposals are agreed and we ring fence £1000 for the CDC youth and older people projects (subject to projects being agreed), we have £2181.95 that can still be used to commission work that will meet the local priorities. Please let me know of any such projects as soon as possible or the uncommitted amount will return to the Locality Services budget from the beginning of November.

### Community Quilting Project Background Information

This project has been researched by two members of Chesham Methodist Church who have a keen interest in encouraging older and younger people to learn and share their skills. It was particularly inspired by three projects that had been undertaken, two were done in a local community and one done nationally.

The Samphire Quilters in King's Lynn Norfolk undertook to engage the community in two projects producing two different pieces which reflect the history of the local community as described below. Both projects involved the local community including the statutory and voluntary sector in making, financing and supporting the projects, which are now displayed in the town for all to see.

'The 800 Quilt' was commissioned by the Borough Council of King's Lynn and West Norfolk and sponsored by the M. Audrey Stratford Memorial Trust. It was made by members of Samphire Quilters to commemorate the 800th anniversary of the granting of a Royal Charter by King John to King's Lynn. The panel represents the history and folklore of King's Lynn over the 800 years.

'The Vancouver Quilt 2000' was made by members of Samphire Quilters as a Millenium Gift to the town to commemorate the life of its most famous son, Captain George Vancouver, who was born there in 1757. The quilt depicts his early years through to his voyages and discoveries.





#### **Example: Heritage Lottery Project**

From 2008-2011 the Heritage Lottery Fund supported the Quilters' Guild of the British Isles at the Quilt Museum and Gallery in York. The project, called 'Unfolding the Quilts' developed and delivered learning and volunteering projects including community engagement initiatives with local groups, including schools, families with children under 5, young mums, people in hospital and using community recovery services, elderly people in care and other members of the community.

One group to use the Museum as part of the project was the York Unifying Multicultural Initiative (YUMI). YUMI is a local multicultural charity with many members from BME groups, including individuals from India and Pakistan, Africa, Russia, Poland and China. The group had never had the opportunity to work with a Museum, and very few members had sewing skills despite coming from cultures with unique textile traditions. After a five-week course in patchwork and quilting, taught by textile artist Christine Shaw and the Museum's Education Officer, YUMI members and their friends were invited to create a patchwork block based on the theme of identity, culture or celebrating their home. The finished blocks were constructed by Museum volunteers and the finished banner displayed at the YUMI street festival in July 2010. YUMI continue to use their patchwork banner at events and participants now pass on their quilting, patchwork and sewing skills to other members of the community during their own activities.

Without the support, enthusiasm and vast knowledge of the professional tutor employed on this project, participants would not have been able to achieve the outstanding results they did, nor would they have had the confidence to complete work in their own time or during open sessions at the Museum. Christine helped participants build on their existing knowledge, and using her own extensive teaching experience, was able to provide the right level of support to individuals with English as a second or even third language. Using the professional tutor on this project, as with many other Museum initiatives, provided participants with inspiration and aspiration as well as a means to integrate with the wider community on an equal level, without the stigma often caused by language barriers.

This project is a good example of communities working together, sharing skills and ideas and also building an understanding of each other's culture. The strong relationship that YUMI now has with the Museum and its volunteers is testimony to its success, as are the many YUMI members who still attend workshops and courses at the Museum today.

#### **Health Benefits**

In addition there has recently been a research project undertaken by the University of Glasgow published in the Journal of Public Health which was conducted from a public health perspective, looking for activities that promote wellbeing among the population. The results showed clearly the health benefits of undertaking such activities in groups.

#### **Chesham Project**

The project in Chesham will be a local example of similar work. It will provide workshops for local people of all ages to learn new skills, including a couple of workshops in the villages of Ley Hill and Lee Common. The aim is to start the project in early January so that the finished work will be able to be displayed for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Celebrations.

We have already spoken to many members of the community who are very enthusiastic about the project and want to be involved. We have a Movers and Shakers group for older adults starting in October, which will link into our already established Hobbies social group for older and vulnerable people. These provide a major opportunity for engaging with isolated older people.

In addition we have over 130 children and young people and their families coming into our premises each week for activities and we have consulted them about the project. We have also consulted with CAWS (Chesham Asian Welfare Society) who are very enthusiastic about their involvement and being given the opportunity to use and teach their traditional embroidery skills to other members of the community in the town. This is the first time anyone has approached them to become involved a project of this type, and they are very excited about the possibilities for social integration.
