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# Officer Decision Report

Title: Hardcore and Soil Contract Extension Review

**Date decision taken:** 28<sup>th</sup> November 2019

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Delivery Unit, Transport Economy Environment

#### **Decision**

To approve the extension of the hardcore and soil waste management contract by two years from 01 April 2020 to 31 March 2022.

Two further annual extensions will be available after the above extension period, should the new unitary Council wish to use them.

#### Reasons for the decision

Buckinghamshire County Council (BCC or "the Council") is currently the Waste Disposal Authority (WDA) for Buckinghamshire. During spring 2017, the Council began a procurement exercise for a suitably-qualified supplier to provide treatment or disposal services for hardcore and soil waste. This waste stream is primarily delivered by householders to the Council's Household Recycling Centres (HRCs). The supplier appointed by the Council is FCC Waste Services and their solution is based on using the hardcore and soil waste as quarry backfill material for the restoration of engineered landfill cells.

The contract commenced on 06 February 2018. In relation to extensions, the contract documentation states that "the contract period will be until 31<sup>st</sup> March 2020 with the Council reserving the right to implement four (4) further extensions of twelve (12) months or part thereof of a year. As indicated in the Contract Terms and Conditions (Section 4), a minimum notice of 3 months will be given to the appointed Supplier to indicate the expiry of the Contract. In any event, the Contract shall come to an end on 31<sup>st</sup> March 2023, unless notified otherwise in writing by the Council".

The options assessment undertaken during the contract review supports the extension of the contract by two years. This extension will give the Council service continuity and flexibility





during the transition to unitary status. It will also provide suitable lead in time for the Council to identify and procure the most suitable option for managing this waste stream beyond March 2022. The relevant Council's contract manager has been consulted during this review and it has been confirmed that the current contract continues to perform at a high quality level. The contract has been performing well, negligible issues and is considered a low risk contract. Some of the positive comments about the current contract performance include:

- Efficient management of the Council vehicles are as required;
- Responsive engagement from the supplier, including prompt responses to the Council's queries;
- A recent compliance audit of the supplier's waste acceptance site during August 2019 by the Council's contract officers raised no concerns; and
- The supplier has demonstrated good contingency approaches in response to additional requests from the Council.

# Other options available, and their pros and cons

To assess whether or not an extension of the contract was preferable, three options were considered as follows:

- Option 1: No extension i.e. the contract to expire on 31 March 2020;
- Option 2: Extension of the contract by 1 year from 01 April 2020 to 31 March 2021; and
- Option 3: Extension of the contract by 2 years from 01 April 2020 to 31 March 2022.

The review team is of the view that the current contract is beneficial for the Council both in terms of helping to achieve high recycling performance and achievement of suitable VfM. The

main reason why a two-year extension is being proposed instead of the full four years available is to provide the new unitary council some flexibility to review its wider waste management strategy before deciding whether or not to utilise future extensions.

The following recommendation is being put forward for consideration and approval:

It is recommended that the hardcore and soil contract is extended by two years from 01 April 2020 to 31 March 2022.

This is a delegated authorised officer decision. Consultation with the Cabinet Member for Planning and Environment has been undertaken.
