Implications

Financial Implications

The strategy does not commit the Council to any additional financial resources and will help enable a range of partner and community organisations to access external funding by highlighting existing shortfalls in open space and recreational facility provision.

Risk Implications

The strategy directly informs and supports the Council's Delivery Development Plan (DDPD) and Core Strategy. Not having an up to date open space and recreational evidence weakens their value and credibility and also reduces the potential of both the Council and community groups to access external funding by not being able to definitely confirm existing shortfalls in provision.

Equalities Implications

The strategy will help attract inward investment to improve the provision of local open space and recreational facilities. Improving the physical access will enable more residents and visitors to enjoy a broad range of facilities and natural open space that is available to enjoy across the District.

Sustainability Implications

A key focus of the investment will result in more energy efficient buildings and an improved infrastructure network that will enable and encourage residents and visitors to enjoy green modes of transport including cycling and walking.

Background

- 1 A draft of the refreshed Open Space and Recreational Strategy (2015-2018) was presented to Cabinet in February 2014, replacing the previous 2005 strategy.
- 2 At the 11th February Cabinet meeting, Members were supportive of adopting the Strategy but before doing so requested that the presented draft Strategy be re-circulated for final consultation to key partners including Town and Parish Councils, Councillors, the Council's Planning Department and local community groups. This was to confirm that its findings and recommendations accurately reflected existing provision and needs.

Updated Open Space and Recreational Strategy

3 Following the re-circulation of the draft strategy a diverse range of comments in relation to accuracy, the development of new facilities and new areas for considerations were received. These are set out in *Appendix 1* of this report together with the resultant changes (if any, to the Strategy). Whilst not changing the key findings of the Strategy the updated document will now more accurately reflect changes and improvements since 2005 and also confirms that Chiltern District through the work of its Town and Parish Councils and local community groups is continually improving open space and recreational facility provision.

Conclusion

- 4 The Chiltern Open Space and Recreational Strategy is a key document in helping inform the Council's Delivery Development Plan Document and Core Strategy. The Strategy consequently plays an important role in improving access and provision to open space and recreational facilities directly helping to improve health and wellbeing of residents. The document also enables Parish & Town Councils and local community groups to attract inward investment by providing robust evidence of existing shortfalls in provision. - 5 Following the consultation captured in *Appendix 1*, Chiltern's Strategy has been updated accordingly and is ready to be formally adopted by Cabinet as detailed in this report's formal recommendation.
