Council response

The Council understands that the Inquiry's recommendation in relation to having a named social worker is about creating a single point of contact (SPOC) for PCNs into adult social care. Named social workers are being established for adult social care residents who live at home in the community.

The service understands the vital importance of a SPOC to facilitate effective working and the restructure of adult social care operations in June 2021 was designed to align the service more closely to PCNs in 4 geographical areas of Buckinghamshire - North, East, South and Central:
