Agenda Item

1 Chairman's Welcome

The Chairman, Councillor Wendy Matthews welcomed the Community Board to the meeting.

2 Apologies for Absence

Apologies had been received from Peter Kinson and Alan Wilson.

3 Declarations of Interest

There were no declarations of interest.

4 Action Notes

The Chairman updated the Board on the outstanding actions from the previous meeting.

- Item 5, a presentation from Colne Valley Park was provided as part of the meeting.

5 Colne Valley Park

The Community Board received a presentation from Martin Kennedy, Colne Valley Park.

- The work of the Green Team was highlighted, the green team consisted of , individuals currently on Universal Credit. There were 10 individuals, with 5 more being recruited. 4500 hours of conservation work had been completed across the Colne Valley.
- The board was set to receive a funding application from Colne Valley Park in the next round of funding applications.

6 Air Quality Action Plan

The Community Board received a report on the Air Quality Action Plan. Comments made by the community Board were as follows:

- The statistics used to create the AQMA were perceived to be based on older inappropriate data.
- There was criticism that the AQMA was stated to be successful due to the reduction in recent emissions. However this failed to take into account effect of pandemic on traffic.
- Disappointment was expressed that the officer was unable to attend and present the report.
- Feedback and comments which had been submitted were not listed in the plan, and the perception was it had not been taken into account.
- Reference was made to a 2021 EU air pollution study Long term exposure to low level air pollution and mortality. There was concern that levels measured were still at dangerous levels risking increased mortality.

7 Formal Community Board updates

The Community Board co-ordinator, and sub-group leads presented the Community Board Updates.

- Successes in the previous year were highlighted, this included the Active Travel strategies and the development of project plans which were now being modelled in other boards. The Community Board was on target to allocate its full budget for 2021/22. It was recommend that applicants for funding should consult with the Community Board Co-ordinator prior to applying due to this.
- Discussion took place on possible pub lunch clubs being widened to 'open table' events, allowing further engagement. An inter-generational approach was to be encouraged to allow generations to exchange insight at community events.
- Highways & Infrastructure sub-group. A report had been received for the costing of the cycle path from Pinewood to the station. Comments were being submitted.
- Environment and Green Spaces sub-group. The children's poster design campaign for littering should be ready for the spring. Work was being done

for signage to go up around proposed wildflower areas.

- Economic Recovery sub-group. On Covid recovery applications, organisations hadn't come forth with developed proposals as wider schemes were available. Cross board projects were being pursued.

Action:

8 Community Matters

The Chairman gave an update on Community Matters.

- An update from Buckinghamshire Council was attached to the minutes.
- Working group meetings were open to all, and everyone was welcome to join these.
- The Denham Dementia Café was now up and running and a number of residents from Iver were attending

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Buckinghamshire Council Updates for Community Boards Jan – Feb 2022

1. 98 councillors proposed for Buckinghamshire

A public consultation completed by the Local Government Boundary Commission (LGBC) on proposed council size for the authority, has decided that the number of councillors in Buckinghamshire should be **98**.

A consultation is now open for residents to provide information on local areas to help the LGBC complete proposals for new ward boundaries – it closes on 4 April.

We are preparing a new Local Plan for Buckinghamshire. A Local Plan sets out where new development will be located and what we will need to protect within Buckinghamshire.

4. Children's Service updates

Ofsted reinspection

At the end of 2020, Ofsted conducted their reinspection of services for children in need of help and protection, children looked after and care leavers. As part of the inspection, inspectors will make the following graded judgements:

- overall effectiveness

- the experiences and progress of children in need of help and protection
- the experiences and progress of children in care and care leavers
- the impact of leaders on social work practice with children and families

Inspectors will make their graded judgements on a 4-point scale:

- outstanding
- good
- requires improvement to be good
- inadequate

The findings and outcome of the inspection will be published on Ofsted's website on Friday 11 February 2022.

6. Community Cafes

One of the underlying principles we have in adult social care is working with our residents and partners close to where they live. *Community Cafes* was an idea developed by staff which means that adult social care is more visible in the community. We hold 8 *Community Cafes* a week in council-run day opportunity centres across the county. The aim is to provide a space for people to come to a booked appointment to meet with social care face to face in a warm and friendly environment. Other partners have joined us such as Occupational Therapists and One Recovery Bucks to help where people have other areas of support that they want to discuss. We hope that this will grow and that other partners will join the *Community Café* approach.

Adult social care uses *Community Cafes* if, after an initial phone discussion, the resident feels they need further information, advice or signposting. Booked appointments are used to have meaningful discussions with the person and their family which can prevent, reduce, delay the need for specialised care. They are also used to undertake care act assessments for social care and for carer assessments.

7. Jubilee Celebrations

There are many different ways in which everyone can mark the Jubilee and we'd like to encourage people of all ages across Buckinghamshire to come together and make it a special event that is remembered for years to come.

Communities can get involved in the Big Jubilee lunch or hold their own celebration event on/ around 5 June to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

Grow it Cook it Eat it: Project overview



- **Project focus:** Setting up community growing sites across the County in areas within deprivation quintiles 4 and 5.
- **Aim:** To support communities to set up and sustain communal growing sites which they will take ownership of in the long-term.
- **Where:** Currently there are 4 sites up and running, 1 in Aylesbury, 2 in High Wycombe and 1 in Chesham



Grow it Cook it Eat it: Project update

- Our 4 existing sites are going into year 2, focusing on community engagement
- We have located a new community growing site in Iver next to the Scout Hut near to Iver Health Junior School
- We have identified our Expert Gardeners, currently lead on one of the High Wycombe sites they will now also lead on developing and overseeing the new site, as well as driving community engagement
- The Expert Gardeners are due to visit the site April 2022 to start the planning and development of the site.
- Year 1 plans for the site will focus on the development and promotion of the site

This is what the area currently looks like in Iver. The development of the site will be kept updated in a site diary on the Buckinghamshire Health and Wellbeing webpage.



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
