### Buckinghamshire Local Access Forum minutes

Minutes of the meeting of the Buckinghamshire Local Access Forum held on Wednesday 3 November 2021 in The Paralympic Room, Buckinghamshire Council, Gatehouse Road, HP19 8FF, commencing at 10.03 am and concluding at 12.00 pm.

### 3 Minutes of the previous meeting / matters arising

**Resolved:** That the minutes of the meeting held on Wednesday 14 July 2021 be approved as a correct record.

### 4 LAF site visit: Bridleway WEN/1/1, Bacombe Hill SSSI & Grangelands SSSI

Jonathan Clark, Strategic Access Officer, began by thanking members who attended the Local Access Forum site visit. Members' attention was drawn towards Appendix 1, displaying the resurfaced Ridgeway and Ridgeway Riding routes at Bacombe Hill, Wendover. The limestone surface was tested by a horse rider, walker, cyclist and user on a mobility scooter, and was found to be suitable for horse riding, cycling, and disabled use. A couple of issues included the downhill section causing cyclists to go too fast and horse riders unlikely to utilise the route as it leads out onto Ellesborough Road, which was too dangerous. Alternative routes were discussed and the possibility of links through to Bacombe Lane or a safer route into Wendover. To encourage good user etiquette, the Forum noted some examples of signage included in the report. Mr Clark welcomed any ideas or comments for signage that could be used on the Ridgeway. The Forum were then informed of the site visit to the Grangelands SSSI, where a member of the British Horse Society gave feedback on two gates. It was agreed that these need to be replaced with Worcester Gates. These gates contain a closing mechanism that shuts the gate in fourteen seconds, to allow a horse to move through. It was also decided to relocate signage that horses were banging their heads on.

In the discussion that followed, the following points were raised:

- Mr Clark informed members that Mr Rod Black has been looking into the possibility of receiving funding and support from HS2. This would go towards creating a link alongside the Ellesborough Road. Cllr Peter Martin suggested organising a conversation outside of the meeting to take this up directly with HS2.
- The site visit was extended to review Bacombe Hill, which identified more work that needed doing to improve accessibility. It was suggested that Bacombe Hill to Ellesborough Road footpath link be upgraded to bridleway so it doesn't have to go through the town. Mr Clark explained that this would be taken up with HS2.

#### 5 Buckinghamshire Cycleway

This item was presented by Ben Feeney-North, Transport Strategy Officer for Planning Growth and Sustainability. The Forum noted the development of active travel routes in Buckinghamshire and the progress towards the Buckinghamshire Greenway. The latter relates to the development of a continuous walking and cycling route running the length of the county from the Colne Valley, connecting to routes in Hillingdon, Oxfordshire and Northamptonshire. The aim was to achieve the same, if not similar, standard as the Waddesdon Greenway. The purpose of the Buckinghamshire Greenway was to improve connectivity between towns and villages, making it easier for people to make short trips as well as being an asset for leisure and tourism.

Mr Feeney-North referred to a presentation and the slides that would be appended to these minutes. Following the conclusion of the presentation, the following points were raised during the discussion:

- A new route from Winslow to Buckingham had been established. It had not yet been considered as part of the Buckinghamshire Greenway, but it was suggested that a route from Winslow to Aylesbury would be well used and sought after. Mr Feeney-North explained that the Greenway could be considered as a strategic spine that routes can be added to and they were keen to explore opportunities to incorporate other routes.
- It was mentioned that there was little consultation with horse riders in the development of the Waddesdon Greenway and it could be of great benefit to horse riders. It was emphasised to include horse riders in the development of

the Buckinghamshire Greenway. Mr Feeney-North explained that landowners generally only accept a permissive route and were sometimes not willing to allow riders to use it. It was noted that this was frustrating, but the aim was to have as much of the route as possible be a bridleway and accessible for all users. It was highlighted that a large section of the south route, such as the South Bucks Way, utilised existing rights of way. It was hoped that developing these southern sections will make it more accessible for horse riders.

- The Planning Growth and Sustainability team were working on links with Hertfordshire. One such being the Grand Union Canal Triangle. The Aylesbury Arm had received funding to upgrade sections up to the border with Hertfordshire. Mr Feeney-North stated that they were keen to engage with Hertfordshire to continue to improve the Aylesbury Arm. Regarding the Wendover Arm, Buckinghamshire was working with the Wendover Arm Trust to get the path upgraded.
- The issue was raised of heavy traffic deterring cyclists on the A4010, between Aylesbury and High Wycombe via Prices Risborough. Members were informed that the team were working on the county-wide local cycling and walking infrastructure plan. This would be developed at a strategic level, with the Buckinghamshire Greenway at the heart of it. It was hoped that problems would be captured and highlighted for future development.
- Regarding the consultation process, Mr Feeney-North explained that the route between Wendover and Missenden was led by Sustrans. The main consultation had been completed through them, working with the Chiltern Society. To develop routes moving forward, it was stated that the Council were looking to develop more detailed consultation. A Regional Access Field Officer for the British Horse Society was present and offered their help in the consultation process, as they could provide more of a national perspective building from their experiences working with other authorities. In particular, their experience with advising on controlled crossings was highlighted.
- The timescale of the Buckinghamshire Greenway was reliant on factors, including financial support from the government and developers, landowner consent, and HS2. There were locations of the Greenway which intersect with HS2. It had been agreed with HS2 and the Department of Transport that at those locations, the HS2 design would incorporate the Greenway. However, this would be reliant on the timescales of HS2.
- A forum had been established to help develop the northern routes with two Northamptonshire authorities, Oxfordshire, and England's Economic Heartland. This is to ensure that the routes were connecting outside of Buckinghamshire. England's Economic Heartland were looking at what interventions could be made to the Varsity Way from Oxford to Cambridge.

### 6 ROWIP Action Plan Year-1 Report (Themes 3 – 6)

The Forum were informed by Mr Clark that the Rights of Way Improvement Plan (ROWIP) Action Plan Year-1 Report would be available for March 2022.

#### 7 Rights of way group report

Mr Clark presented the Rights of Way Group Report, to summarise progress on the Gardenway. A final report, expected in December 2021, would give a design specification and detail of the route. The team were beginning to parcel up the routes around Aylesbury and had put in funding bids to deliver a new bridleway. It was expected to be completed in 2030.

A planning application had been submitted to the Aylesbury Area Planning Team for the Quarrendon Path through Berryfields and Buckingham Park. Mr Clark informed the Forum that the application was live and available for comments. The Buckinghamshire Local Access Forum would be consulted on the High Wycombe Cycling, Walking Infrastructure Plan.

Ms Taylor updated members on the Rights of Way (RoW) operations over the previous six months. The team was comprised of one RoW Team Leader, two RoW Officers, 1.6 Assistant RoW Officers, and 1.5 Bridge Structure Inspectors.

The BVPI Condition Survey was carried out largely using volunteer effort during February / March 2021. The results were that 75% of paths were easy to use. The RoW Team were looking to carry out the 5% survey later in the year, due to the additional workload from COVID restrictions. Ms Taylor explained the importance of the condition survey, as it provides a benchmark on the state of the network against previous years. Ms Taylor invited members to give feedback on the survey.

The Forum were informed of the ongoing capital projects. Ms Taylor highlighted the work regarding bridge improvements and surface work that had been completed. This included Fawley Bridge and Ms Taylor explained that the team were still in negotiation of the replacement of the bridge structure and the annual clearance. The summer clearance had been completed, using two additional clearance crews for twelve weeks. Autumn clearance of bramble and side growth would be completed. Several projects would run through the winter, as it cannot be achieved in summer due to the nesting season.

In reference to Appendix 5 on the Rights of Way Group Report item, Ms Taylor welcomed comments from members and explained that it showed an average for April to October in comparison to previous years. The results for the last financial year were quite low, due to the limited work that could be achieved during COVID lockdowns.

Ms Taylor gave feedback on the priority matrix, on how issues were categorised into priority A, B, C, and D to work out a target time. Figures were also provided for the beginning of the 2021 Condition Survey. Ms Taylor welcomed comments on whether

they should continue the Condition Survey or postpone the survey for a year. The reasoning provided was that the team had a large backlog of issues, as a result of increasing usage on the network over the pervious two years. More individuals were reporting issues, as people were using the network for recreation during lockdown.

In the discussion that followed, the following points were raised:

- Ms Taylor explained that the workload was due to it being easier for people to report issues through the reporting website. Moreover, volunteers were unable to work due to restrictions. Staff were also redeployed to community work to cover the pandemic and there were restrictions on site visits. In combination, this had resulted in a backlog.
- Feedback from members regarding the Condition Survey was that it should continue, without the year break. This would avoid issues mounting up and the importance of knowing the state of the network was emphasised.
- Concerns were raised over the RoW Team being under resourced. Cllr Peter Martin said he would speak to Cllr Steve Broadbent on this concern.
- The target times of resolving issues were published online, on the same pages as the Report It page. This allows individuals to see how their issue is prioritised.
- There was a set of core issues that may be difficult to resolve due to an enforcement issues, for example. The effort to resolve them might be quite intensive so one solution was to put a notice or informative on the land charge layer. Therefore, if the property is sold, it notifies the potential purchaser that there is a defect on the land. This had resulted in a history of problems left unresolved, but they would be monitored and reviewed.
- Parish surveys were useful in enabling volunteers to go out in the field and check to see what is outstanding in their parish against the database. This aids in clearing out old data.

### 8 LAF members' report

Neil Harris, National Trust, informed members on ash dieback and clearance. The work had been prioritised by usage, to combat issues with potential risk to ash trees dying and falling. The focus had been on medium to very high usage zones. Ash dieback is a fungal disease causing the timber to become brittle. The longer the tree has the disease, the more brittle they become and more likely to fall over. To avoid this risk when clearing, the National Trust had used a contractor with mechanical equipment, such as a walking excavator, to clear the edges of the footpath. This is safer than manual clearing and the timber is turned into wood or chipped for wildlife. Roughly £160,000 was spent in the last year to clear sites including Pulpit Hill and Aston Wood. The next site to be looked at is Hughenden, which would be closed for two weeks to clear diseased ash trees on the main visitor route. Work was also planned for Coombe Hill this winter 2021/22, which was delayed due to the

nesting season. Where there was a lot of felling, the National Trust were also replanting, particularly at Bradenham. About 11,500 trees would be planted this winter. Funding had been provided by the National Trust Plant a Tree Campaign. £60,000 had been granted for the replanting, about six hectares of ash dieback. A large proportion of the money would go towards on-site preparation, such as deer fencing.

In response to this update, the following points were mentioned:

- The main issue of ash dieback is that the trees become unpredictable. The National Trust review their trees in June and assess them on a percentage of crown die back. 50% and greater crown dieback signals for the tree to be removed the following winter. Less than 50% dieback could mean that the tree can recover.
- To avoid ground shrinkage, the National Trust were replanting and replace with hedges and shrub layers.
- At Pulpit Hill on the edge of the Byway GLK/40A, a tree stump in the middle of the byway had been removed.
- Landowners had a duty of care to anyone on their property. Mr Harris suggested prioritising trees based on usage and the target, e.g. the target is greater if the tree is next to a house rather than a field.
- Trees in the Hughenden Valley were raised as a concern near the highway. Mr Clark requested details on the site so it can be inspected. The Forum were informed of a regular programme of inspection for trees in the county that should pick up any issues.
- Regarding the work on Naphill Common, Mr Harris explained that a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) would be protected by Natural England and the Forestry Commission. To apply to do work on a SSSI, you have to give a statutory notice of operations (SNO).
- Mr Clark informed the Forum that the Council RoW Team could organise free RoW closures for charities.

The Forum noted the letters on the Wayside Farm and Chawley Manor Farm Open Access Restriction consultation and the 2026 cut-off date introduced by the Countryside & Rights of Way Act 2000.

Mr Brian Worrell, British Driving Society Beds, Bucks and Herts, gave an update from the Ridgeway Delivery Group. The report would be appended to the minutes of this meeting.

### 9 Any other business

Mr Clark informed members that John Elfes has offered his resignation and Mr Clark would draft a letter of thanks for his long service as former chairman and more

recent member on behalf of the LAF. Mr Roy Johnson, Ramblers Association, has been offered and has accepted an invitation to join the Forum in his place.

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### Buckinghamshire Greenway





### Notes from Ridgeway Delivery Group Zoom meeting 13<sup>th</sup> September 2021

### 1. Managing vehicles on the Trail

Discussion on Poacher Blocks recognised that landowners required effective barriers to illegal use by motorised vehicles. However, there was real nervousness in their use on the Trail. There is the danger of walkers tripping and possibly injury from the solid and sharp edges of the concrete. Interestingly this hazard is on of the key reasons that the Kent Gap is now not recommended. It seems people don't look where they put their feet these days.

For equestrians the issues are similar, plus the reluctance of some horses not wishing to cross the concrete. For the carriage driver, the concrete poses an unwelcome 'bump' in the surface as well as the height of the central blocks. The BHS is very much against them on a public Right of Way used by ridden or driven horses.

### 2. Ridgeway Driving Leaflet

The final version was discussed and approved. It is aimed at the motorised user and provides best practice. Printed copies will be used by the police to hand out. However the general consensus was that whilst having a leaflet was better than nothing, it is unlikely to have a great impact as the irresponsible won't read it. The Ridgeway Delivery Group will distribute it to trail rider organisations etc. PDFs for electronic distribution is favoured as the leaflet can then be attached to electronic communications across several social media platforms. One thought was the leaflet itself should be bigger than the folded A4 version.

### 3. Ridgeway Riding Route and Wendover HS2 re-surfacing issues.

The discussion was in praise of the work being done and moved to signage to mitigate against poor behaviour on the steep hill and blind bend, particularly by speeding cyclists and their lack of consideration of other users. A number of signs were reviewed and a number chosen to take forward. This page is intentionally left blank

Many aims of Buckinghamshire's Green Infrastructure Strategies cross-over with those in the Rights of Way Improvement Plan, such as access to nature, recreation, health & wellbeing, supporting the volunteer network and sustainable development; not least ensuring the county's environment is continually recorded, protected and enhanced.

The NEP is engaged in influencing local decision-making on behalf of the partnership to ensure the environment is appropriately taken into account, as well as ensuring its partners work collaboratively towards common agreed environmental goals for the area. For example, the NEP has recently released a new <u>Biodiversity Action Plan</u> which sets collectively the partnership's priorities for biodiversity; it will also be a key player in producing the newly-mandated Local Nature Recovery Strategy, the detailed requirements for which the Government is due to release in Spring. The NEP also speaks collectively for its partners in calling for strong Local Plan policies around green infrastructure and biodiversity. It has, for example, successfully engaged Local Plans to commit to a biodiversity net gain and explicitly support the NEP's Green Infrastructure Vision and Principles document, which is linked to its Green <u>Infrastructure Opportunity</u> <u>mapping</u>, in the hope that this influences developers. The NEP also aims to encourage community involvement in the maintenance of wilder green spaces, for health and recreation, including in areas of deprivation.

While the Local Access Forum doesn't cover Milton Keynes Council area, which the NEP does, members are invited to provide advice and feedback on how the group might usefully engage with the NEP in future to deliver shared aims. Indeed, some of those groups representing the NEP are also members of the Local Access Forum, such as the NFU, Chiltern Society and Buckinghamshire Council.

Local Transport Plan 4 outlines the council's high-level approach to transport provision in Buckinghamshire between 2016 and 2036. The council is now in the initial scoping stages for LTP 5.

A local transport plan aims to encourage walking and cycling for short journeys, leisure and exercise, seeking to improve infrastructure and opportunities to use more sustainable modes of transport.

While the LTP seeks increased use of trains and buses, many of the aims and objectives of a rights of way improvement plan for walking and cycling are shared, including opportunities to improve health, safety and quality of life. This includes horse riders when improving road safety and supporting the local economy. In this way the plans complement each other and provide the framework in which transport improvements are delivered for residents.

LTP 5 will include a public consultation, to which the Local Access Forum are encouraged to take part.

#### E. Strategic Access Update

- 5. The **Aylesbury Gardenway** is a proposed orbital park and cycleway around Aylesbury, to include landscape enhancements, surfacing, greater public access, community benefits and environmental improvements knitting together existing and emerging communities around the town. A report and design brief of the nine delivery parcels is due to be completed imminently. It is expected that several of the Gardenway parcels will come forward through negotiations with developers and landowners. In addition, the government's 'levelling up' agenda is identified as a potential funding source as new bidding rounds open. The LAF will continue to be consulted and updated on this route. - 6. The **Buckinghamshire Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan** (LCWIP) will be a county-wide walking and cycling strategy, developed by the Transport Strategy Team. It will establish a high-level walking and cycling network across the Council area and identify future investment priorities for walking and cycling infrastructure in Buckinghamshire. Engagement activities will be undertaken as part of the development of the LCWIP. It is anticipated that public consultation on a draft version of the LCWIP will be undertaken later in 2022/2023.
- 7. The **High Wycombe Local Cycling & Walking Infrastructure Plan** (LCWIP) focuses on High Wycombe and its links to surrounding settlements and is also being developed by the Transport Strategy Team. The LCWIP is intended to form a supporting plan to the High Wycombe Transport Strategy. The draft High Wycombe LCWIP and Transport Strategy will be consulted upon before being put forward for adoption as Council policy. Consultation timescales are currently being confirmed.
- The Chiltern Society's Donate-a-Gate partnership scheme with the council has seen 6 new donors since the 3<sup>rd</sup> November 2021 LAF meeting, bringing the total to 470 donors and 619 gates. The first tranche of Gift Aid money has been used to fund 5 new gates east of Amersham College.

1. CROW Act Open Access consultation on 5-year review proposing to maintain restrictions for shooting (Wayside Farm, Bledlow Ridge) and restricting walkers to a fenced, permissive path when grazing with cattle & calves (Chawley Manor Farm, West Wycombe).

In September 2021 Natural England sought Local Access Forum comments regarding the existing land management restrictions on two parcels of land along Bledlow Ridge and whether they were still necessary. These included Wayside Farm and Chawley Manor Farm and in reply the chairman wrote to Natural England [Appendix 2]. The Wayside Farm restriction has now been granted. However, a second consultation commenced on 18<sup>th</sup> January 2022, with a closing date of 23<sup>rd</sup> February 2022, for Chawley Manor Farm only [Appendix 3]. The LAF have secured a response deadline extension to 4<sup>th</sup> March 2022 and additional comments are sought. The consultation map is enclosed in Appendix 4, but for clarity, it has been requested the 'marked route' is moved off the scrub corridor and relocated slightly south-west of the road.

The second consultation is an improvement on the former proposal and takes into account the LAF's September 2021 comments. Should the current proposal be acceptable, walkers generally would have unrestricted access to thew whole open access parcel and would not be required to stick within the fenced-off corridor of scrub when cows were present. However, walkers with dogs should, all all times keep dogs on a lead and stick to the marked route. This simplifies the restriction and reflects the unmanageable situation keeping on top of the scrub growth.

Following members resolution in July 2021 to make representation regarding the 2021 cut-off date and concerns regarding resources with the Planning Inspectorate to deal with outstanding DMMO's, a letter was sent to Rt Hon Michael Gove MP, Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (Appendix 4). The Secretary of State's reply is included in Appendix 5.

## 3. National Trust Open access works

Neil Harris is managing Ash dieback works on open access land. Their teams are currently working behind the Manor at Bradenham, then moving back to areas at Small Dean, Wendover. The felling works at West Wycombe have been completed, short of chipping brash piles and hauling timber away.

## Wayside Farm and Chawley Manor Farm Open Access Restriction consultation

Thank you for inviting comments from the Buckinghamshire Local Access Forum on the above restrictions. This response is a summary of members' written representations as our meeting schedule falls outside Natural England's consultation period.

Members' concerns relate to: 1) overgrowth along the fenced-off permissive footpath; and 2) the necessity to segregate cows from the public.

We acknowledge the site's remoteness which reflects the relatively low public use. However, there seems no sense applying a restriction to use the permissive path while it remains overgrown and inaccessible. It would only be viable if the landowner agrees to mow it regularly, otherwise there is no reason for it.


The cows and calves are only likely to be grazed for part of the year and their presence shouldn't be a reason to deter or restrict public access, just for people to be aware of their presence. It seems unlikely people will use the site for open access purposes when cows are grazing as they are a natural deterrent, and we believe the vast majority of the site's use is as a through-route between roads. For these reasons we disagree there is a need to segregate cows and public from sharing the same space.

Members certainly accept they do not want the public on the land when there is a shoot in progress.

# The 2026 cut-off date introduced by the Countryside & Rights of Way Act 2000; and Definitive Map Modification Orders determined by the Planning Inspectorate under the Wildlife & Countryside Act 1980.

At the 14<sup>th</sup> July 2021 meeting of Buckinghamshire Local Access Forum (LAF) members discussed the current situation regarding the 2026 cut-off date for historical evidence to determine Definitive Map Modification Orders (DMMO's).

In 2015/16 the Buckinghamshire LAF co-ordinated the training of over 100 volunteers to investigate evidence in advance of the 2026 cut-off, but the vast majority were intimidated by the complexity of the process and time commitments, so relatively few applications have materialised. The eventual number of applications submitted before the 2026 cut-off could be insufficient to address the number of valid claims in the county, at least at current rates. With this in mind, we believe the 2026 cut-off should be reviewed with a view to being extended, as we understand the legislation allows.

It also came to light that a DMMO's referred to PINS by Buckinghamshire Council was submitted over 12 months ago, with no indication when it might be addressed. While we are reassured DMMO's submitted to local authorities prior to the 2026 cut-off date will be valid, there is a concern resources at national level may be insufficient to address DMMO's when referred to PINS for a decision.

Byways and bridleways in Buckinghamshire are particularly fragmented and one of the main tools for reconnecting the network for cyclists and equestrians is through the DMMO process. Any delays in the DMMO process lengthens the time the network is disconnected, which is a concern to the LAF.

Some applicants in Buckinghamshire have applied for a Schedule 14 direction from the Secretary of State when no decision has been made by the local authority for over 12 months, but no process is in place for delays at national level. We therefore seek reassurance that resources are in place at PINS to address DMMO cases in the coming years, otherwise there is a risk the public's confidence in the system will be eroded.

#### Dear Richard

Thank you for your letter of 18 October 2021 to the Right Honourable Michael Gove MP, regarding the 2026 cut-off date introduced by the Countryside & Rights of Way Act 2000 and Definitive Map Modification Orders and schedule 14 directions determined by the Planning Inspectorate. As my team deal with opposed orders and schedule 14 appeals and directions your letter has been passed to me for reply.

The Planning Inspectorate determines public rights of way orders, schedule 14 appeals and requests for directions under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 on behalf of the Department of Environment Food, and Rural Affaires (Defra). Whilst I can appreciate why you have requested that the cut-off date be extended, this is not within the remit of the Department of levelling Up, Housing and Communities and you should put your request to Defra. I am sorry there has been a delay in processing and determining the order and schedule 14 direction you refer to. As a result of the national restrictions during the past 18 months to control the pandemic we have been able to process and decide fewer orders and schedule 14 direction cases. We now have more cases waiting for a decision than before the pandemic and recognise that some customers are waiting longer for their decision than we would like. We have put measures in place to deal with the current delays and we are working hard to decide more cases and reduce the length of time it takes to make decisions.

We keep the number of orders and schedule 14 cases we receive under review and liaise with Defra over expected forecasts, so we can try and ensure resources are in place to process cases within target. We have recently trained more Inspectors to undertake Definitive Map Modification Orders and schedule 14 appeals and directions and are hoping to undertake a recruitment of Inspectors who will specialise in this area of casework in the spring.

We are therefore hopeful that we will have cleared most of the backlog by early summer and be in a good position to deal with any orders and schedule 14

appeals & directions we receive as a result of the pending 2026 cut-off date in line with our targets.

# Impact of Covid-19

Due to Covid-related meeting restrictions, the 15<sup>th</sup> July 2020 meeting was postponed to 23<sup>rd</sup> September 2020 and held a virtual format. With the 4<sup>th</sup> November 2020 meeting following so closely it was cancelled. The 3<sup>rd</sup> March 2021 meeting was also held virtually.

While members found it useful to maintain continuity of LAF business and scrutiny of the council, many felt the virtual format was no substitute for meeting in person, with some unfamiliar with the technology or unable to join the meeting. Normal, pre-Covid arrangements therefore resumed at a new venue in the council's Gateway offices in Aylesbury on 14<sup>th</sup> July 2021.

#### Improving public access: making a difference

The LAF member for the British Driving Society met regularly with the Ridgeway Delivery Group to support and coordinate improvements along the National Trail.

The LAF member for the Chiltern Society helped design the diversion route for the Chiltern Way through the HS2 works south of Wendover in consultation with the contractor EKFB.

LAF members for cycling, horse riding and disabled users wrote to The Department for Transport in reply to the govenment's review of The Highway Code to improve road safety for cyclists, pedestrians and horse riders.

The LAF member for the British Horse Society and Regional BHS Officer [who attends LAF meets as a guest], met with HS2 to discuss continued, long-term bridleway provision around Calvert landfill. Discussions were also held regarding bridleway widths and surfaces and alterations to the design of HS2 bridge parapet.

The LAF member for the British Horse Society and Regional BHS Officer lobby Sustrans and the council to ensure equestrian users are accommodated in all new cycleway routes and landowner negotiations, including the proposed new cycleway by HS2 through the Chilterns, between Frith Hill, Great Missenden and Nash Lee Lane, Wendover.

## The Rights of Way Improvement Plan 2020-2030

Buckinghamshire's Rights of Way Improvement Plan (ROWIP) was adopted in April 2020. A priority for 2020/21 was to shape production of the ROWIP Action Plan; one of the LAF's statutory roles. This document translates the aims and objectives of the main ROWIP into a timetabled list of delivery targets. The LAF contributed positively by advising the council on reporting timescales; a list of priorities; and likely delivery partners, including from those organisations represented on the Forum. The council's highways board approved the 2020 and 2030 ROWIP Action Plan in December 2020

## Scrutiny

Local Access Forum's comments and advice were sought on the evolving Gardenway Project, part of the Aylesbury Garden Town initiative. The Gardenway will be a circular, 18km-long liner park of connected green spaces around Aylesbury, aiming to encourage play, active travel, healthier lifestyles and outdoor leisure, as well as attracting wildlife. Two LAF members joined the Gardenway advisory group to input on route choice and design. Members stressed that bridleway status should be designated where possible along the Gardenway to accommodate horse riders, which should then inform surface choice and widths.

The LAF commented upon a renewal application for a Public Spaces Protection Order in Desborough Road, High Wycombe and wrote to the council expressing their views following a 6-1 vote in favour of renewing the order.

A standing item for Definitive Map team updates allow members to monitor progress and provide advice on workloads and priorities. This year members were apprasied of significant temporary East West Rail and HS2 closures lasting respectively to 2023 and 2025.

The LAF sought reassurances regarding changes following the council becoming a unitary authority, such as the continued support of the LAF and the dissolution of the Rights of Way Committee. The LAF would continue as normal and Officers were confident that delegated powers, which replaced the Rights of Way Committee, would result in greater efficiency in determining Definitive Map Modification Orders. Options and the Service Director would oversee decision-making in many cases.

Concerns were raised regarding the apparent slow turnover in determining Definitive Map Modification Orders and the backlog which included applications from 2016. This was due to staff shortages, but in any case, a new method of tracking progress of applications would be reported at each LAF meeting.

A standing item for Maintenance & Enforcement allows members to oversee capital project delivery such as major bridge construction and surfacing schemes. Results are also presented on the bi-annual 'easy to use' volunteer survey results, undertaken using Best Value Performance Indicator [BVPI] methodology. A maintenance and improvement summary is also presented allowing members to monitor progress on items such as signpost and gate installations and enforcement issues resolved or outstanding.

This year also saw an increase in reported issues following the launch of the new, easier to use, online reporting system, on which the LAF provided useful

feedback. When combined with significant increases rights of way use and loss of volunteers during lockdown, this led to pressures on resources and increases in enforcement related issues..

## Priorities for the year ahead

- Oversee the ROWIP Action Plan Year-1 report;
- Provide input on the increased number of proposed cycleways; and
- Continue to maintain partnerships with the outside groups maintaining our access networks

# **Comments from the appointing authority**

There remains a well-balanced and well-informed membership to make good decisions and provide valuable advice to the council. There is broad range of skills and knowledge on countryside matters.

Members hold the council to account, challenging priorities and decisionmaking. Meeting attendance is generally good and supported by cabinet members and committee staff, but there was an inevitable drop off with members unfamiliar with Microsoft Teams technology.

The LAF have been supportive and positive to the rights of way teams when commenting on the pressures resulting from increased use during Covid and reduced staff and volunteers involved in maintenance.

We continue to enjoy use of a 'speech to text' reporter to support members hard of hearing and ensure accurate minutes.

# **Comments from the Chairman**

This concludes my fourth year as chairman and a great many thanks to members for their continued support. The COVID-19 pandemic resulted in virtual meetings and few were comfortable using the technology, but we were pleased to keep the show on the road.

While an increase in number of users on the rights of way network in 2020 was welcome, it had to be balanced against reports of misuse, impacting negatively on those working on the land. The Chiltern Society and Ramblers volunteer effort ceased during the main pandemic restrictions, but we were able to welcome them back in 2021. The result of their absence was a noticeable difference on the ground with lack of maintenance. However, I am

confident ground can be made-up next year due to their excellent work and commitment.

The main work of the Forum this year oversaw the production of the ROWIP 2020-2030 Action Plan, which I'm delighted to say has been published. We look forward in the coming years to overseeing delivery and recommending priorities throughout the 10-year lifetime of the Action Plan.

We enjoy good support within the council's committee structure for administration, and cabinet member attendance is both reassuring and welcome.
