
Spend Summary 2021-22

The Amersham & Villages Community Board had an allocation of £174,907 in the last financial year, and commitments of £39,940.22 carried over from the previous year. The remainder of the budget has been allocated fully (with some projects coming in slightly under budget leaving a small variance).

The total spend reflected below is £174,834.93 and the report details the projects which received allocations, and the amount of contributory funding which helped to add value to the projects.

The total contributory funding detailed below is £164,788.56 with some TBC as organisations are awaiting decisions following that of the Community Board and further conversations with external grant bodies are ongoing.

It served to engage school age children with their environment and address how we all have a part to play to combat climate change. Amersham (Chiltern) Youth Club	The Youth Club are being relocated but their new space requires some drastic improvement. The funding will help to make the space fit for purpose, including painting the outside of the building to make it modern and inviting, adding up to date equipment for the young people to use, create a new skill learning area in the kitchen to enable us to teach cooking and provide meals where necessary and much more. We would like to extend the reach of the youth service to more young people (currently around 80) but we know that one of the key things to this is getting the right environment and providing a place that young people like to visit, hang out, make their own and benefit from.	£2,100.00	£2,000.00
Amersham Museum	Shopping Before Plastic: The Retro Shop project will research and share how local people shopped and consumed sustainably in the past, before plastic packaging and pre-packaged food was commonplace. Amersham Youth Activities (Chiltern Youth Club)	Amersham Youth Summer Team: The project aims to provide a regular and constant presence in Amersham to support young people in the area. It will locate in key areas around Amersham and help ensure a safe and productive environment in the town that allows young people to play, socialise and gain support and advice where required. After the difficulties of the previous year, we believe this consistent presence will help to ensure young people do not drift into crime/ASB during the summer holiday weeks when there is no school. Their work with the children will discuss feelings, how to promote positive wellbeing and the importance of talking about our mental health in an engaging and ageappropriate way. Bucks Mind will also provide sessions for parents and school staff, considering how we can support children's and our own mental wellbeing.		
Bucks Mind	Mental Health First Aid Training Project: This is a cross-Board project being taken to all 16 Community Boards to provide Mental Health First Aid training to school staff, to enable them to support the mental wellbeing of young people. This training will be delivered by Bucks Mind. The course qualifies delegates as Youth Mental Health First Aiders and will give delegates the skills to identify, understand and help someone who may be experiencing a mental health issue.	£742.50	£0.00
Little Chalfont Parish Council	Movable Vehicle Activated Signs: Little Chalfont Parish Council are wanting to reduce the speed around the village to make it a safer on the roads for pedestrians and road users. They would like to purchase in total four MVAS units to be used in various locations around Little Chalfont to monitor and address speeding. A number of residents have raised concerns around speeding in the area and the Parish Council have acted quickly to order two MVAS but require two more and are requesting funding from the Community Board to support this.	£2,500.00	£2,500.00

	Educational Needs, Pupil Premium and looked after children, as well as those who have been identified as needing extra emotional or behavioural support in school. Funding is required to provide tools, labour and resources needed to develop and maintain. Work would be carried out by school members, staff and children, Chiltern Rangers and Stony Dean work experience students. The area is also used by Woodland Adventure Club and we would look to make further connections with the local community, for example by sharing tools and experience if another local school were looking to embark on a similar project or inviting local nurseries to use the area for their own Forest School.		
Little Chalfont Primary School	Little Chalfont Primary School have started the construction of an edible garden. Whilst we have funded the infrastructure, we are looking for funding for the plants and tools that the children will be putting into the garden. The children will be using the tools purchased to maintain the garden and harvest the fruit and vegetables. They will then be able to use those in cookery lessons and take the produce home. We want this project to run long-term, year on year, and have planned crop rotation to allow for this. We will also be starting an after-school gardening club in the Summer term for children we have identified as vulnerable or have been significantly affected by the lockdown periods (e.g. anxiety, SEND etc). All children in the school and their families will benefit from the project and we are also planning to distribute some of the produce to our local residents (particularly the elderly members of our community)	£1,632.35	£4,614.69

Since Covid, the charity has seen a marked increase in referrals with 90% from families who have not used the service before and some parents are being turned away by Care agencies that have struggles through Covid times with furloughed staff and are now stretched to the limit as they return to work, coping with a high demand for their services. Funding will be used to support families with children who have special needs by providing in home care and respite for the parent(s). Families will receive 40 hours of support which can be taken in one instance or split in a way that works best for them. This is a cross board application and 3 families have been identified in the Amersham & Villages Community Board area.		
Stony Dean Special School	Pond and Wildlife Restoration: Revitalising an old disused pond and turning it into a teaching resource. Using The Green Gym and students to make this historic watering hole accessible for wildlife and students. We will be improving the green spaces, woodlands they remain attractive destinations that enhance our quality of life. Ponds are at the heart of bio-diversity and improving the fabric will help the local wildlife. As well as being an source of learning for the young people of Amersham. The majority of the work will be carried out by students and volunteers. The funds would be used to pay for a contract to secure the area with a fence (with gated access to allow use by other schools), and provide a pond dipping platform for learning.	£3,300.00	£2,850

Radio Christmas	The Radio Station is run entirely by volunteers of all ages from the local Amersham community - with regular hosts and one off shows hosted by anyone who wants to do it. We also offer opportunities for technical help, news reading, programme scheduling and much more. We have run since 2008 and are a much loved part of the Amersham Christmas calendar. The stations support the Street Kids Direct charity and this year is focusing more than ever on bringing our community together. We invite all charities, councillors, local businesses, local schools (with the daily schools hour), community groups and more to spend time on the radio promoting their services and enjoying being together in a fun and friendly way. This project runs every year - with a larger version every other year - we will have an FM license this year which will significantly increase our listener numbers. 	Water Fountain installation in the Old Town:		
Old	The existing fountain is no longer fit for purpose and is in such a bad state of repair that the water consistently leaks and requires refilling. As we approach colder months, it is anticipated that the low levels of water and old/warn out pipework could further damage the structure of the fountain and mean that any wildlife within it would perish.		
Amersham Revitalisation Group	The wildlife in the pond, frogs etc. are dying back because of the lack of clean water, the water in the pond will be recycled though a filtering system, it is essential to keep the balance of natural nutrients to encourage wildlife.	£3,500.00	£3,500.00

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Coleshill Common Management Committee	Coleshill Common Picnic Bench: The Common is a large natural area at the centre of Coleshill Village which is home to a diverse collection of plants and animals. By installing a picnic bench the Committee feel that it would encourage users to sit and enjoy the peace and tranquillity of the space, as well as allowing groups such as the Forest School to make use of it.	£447.94	£50.00
Cue34 Theatre Company	In-Tune: A play showcasing experiences of loneliness, the project as a whole will be broken down into stages: Stage 1 will involve the development of the play, whereby local actors and technicians will ensure the play is ready for an audience. Stage 2 will involve outreach work such as: • a well-being workshop that will provide a space for the local community to come together, socialise and build relationships: all elements are aimed at combating loneliness. • Q and A sessions to provide a platform for those interested in theatre and the arts to ask about the plays' development, the actor's process and their experience of the industry. • A networking session, bringing together key community partners and local residents. Various key players from the local Health and Well-Being Community and the Local Creative Arts community will be invited to attend, aiming to strengthen the local culture sector, link organisations and support initial topic-focused conversations to help create positive change. Amersham Museum	The Amersham Martyrs: This tells the story of Tudor Amersham and the persecution of local people, for their belief that they should access to the Bible in English. It is a community production involving over 100 people as performers and backstage support. Previous performances had a cast of 150 with audiences of over 200. The impact of Covid has resulted in a reduced cast and a new form to the performance, allowing for more distancing, a reduced set and a seated audience (it was previously a promenade through a crowded market scene). We have six performances planned in March 2002 and to make the performance more accessible we would like to introduce a signed version for the first time.	£240.00	£4,472.00
Old Hanging Wood	Providing opportunities to increase physical, mental and social wellbeing for villagers of all ages, and to reconnect with the environment and others, and overcome some of the challenges and impacts this pandemic has had on them, by delivering a combination of community conservation and activity days, within the surrounding woodlands consisting of bush craft sessions, wildlife planting, woodland walks and hedge laying, that will run throughout the year, with activities ranging from 12 weeks to 24 weeks. 	To celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, the Community Board are looking to install five '2022 Jubilee' benches, one in each of the five areas of the Community Board. We are reaching out to anyone from the local are to submit suggestions for their locations. There will be five in total, one in each of the following areas: Old Amersham, Coleshill, Little Chalfont, Amersham on the Hill and Chesham Bois.		
Amersham Action Group	Amersham on the Hill town map: The Amersham Action Group (AAG) would like to make both locals and visitors aware of what is available in AOTH, and they believe that the installation of an interesting map would help do this. AOTH is a big town with a lot to offer including several local heritage assets; buildings that are not nationally listed but are deemed to be architecturally and culturally important. There are also several walking trails within the town that would help people become more familiar with what is on offer. The suggestion is a theme in the style of "Metroland" that could fit with the personality of the town and other points of interest. The AAG will get several quotes for to ensure that we get the best value for money. Costs are estimates at this stage	£1,500.00	£3,000.00
Coleshill Parish Council	Coleshill Speed Assessment: The issues caused by speed in the village of Coleshill have been flagged over a number of years. The local councillors have done work to gather data and evidence of these issues, and this has included many instances of vehicles ending up in verges due to excessive speed round bends. Transport for Bucks produced a PID (which also included separate costs for the feasibility of looking at reducing the weight limit of the road, to reduce the number of HGVs which pass through, and destroy the verges and cause damage to the road). Health & Wellbeing with Treehouse Amersham	Initiated by the Community Board members, this project aims to work alongside students from the local secondary schools, Amersham Youth, and Treehouse Project to develop a health and wellbeing project, including first aid training and defibrillator use for the wider community, and students, as well as the installation of new defibrillators in the board area. As the project develops, match funding will be sought, however to give the students the confidence to continue in their work and develop this exciting new project further, the board would like to allocate funding from its remaining budget.	£15,000.00	TBC
Old Amersham Revitalisation Group	Old Amersham Artisan Market: Working closely with local retailers, the OAR are looking to support the setup of a regular market in Amersham Old Town (one Sunday each month). The funding requested is to support the cost of road closures and marketing. To make the project sustainable for the future, local market traders will be charged £45 per month for their stall, with an offer for the first three months of £20. Local Retailers in the immediate vicinity of the suggested road closure have been consulted and have agreed their support for the new monthly market to take place.	£5,000.00	£1,000.00

	The cost estimates from Transport for Buckinghamshire include the implementation of double yellow lines, but the advice from engineers is to prioritise the bollards, and therefore the cost of the yellow lines has been removed from the suggested allocation at this stage.		
Parking Bollards	There have been three near misses and the Community Board would like to prevent a serious incident occurring due to these issues. The school have been continuously reminding parents of the dangers, and have agreement with the local pub for the use of parking spaces, but the situation is continuing to worsen.

What is Making Every Contact Count (MECC)?



Why does MECC make a difference?



MECC is an approach to behaviour change that can be used in the millions of day-to-day interactions that organisations and individuals have with the public to support them in making positive changes to their physical health, mental health, and wellbeing.

MECC can help sow the seeds of change to prevent, reduce or delay the onset of ill health and need for care and support.

MECC focuses on the strengths and abilities of the person; it's not about telling them what they should do.



Who can MECC?



How do you MECC?

Everyone can take a MECC approach; by working together we can achieve a greater impact.

The central idea underpinning the MECC approach is simple. It recognises that staff and volunteers across health, local authority and voluntary sectors have thousands of interactions every day with individuals and are well placed to have supportive conversations to promote health and healthy lifestyles.

MECC is a brief conversation that involves asking questions, listening, and supporting a person to make informed decisions about their own health and wellbeing.

MECC is not about providing expert advice or telling people what to do.

MECC training can develop or sharpen conversational skills and knowledge of basic health and wellbeing guidance.

We offer **FREE** 1 hour Introduction to MECC training to everyone working or volunteering in the voluntary, community and social enterprise sector, council and health care partners who are in the Buckinghamshire area.

The training will help you to identify opportunities to have MECC conversations within your existing day to day work or interactions with the public.

The training will develop MECC conversation skills including:

- Confidence on what types of questions to ask
- Understand the person: Are they ready to change, do they have the opportunity to change and are they capable of change?
- Knowledge of what is available to assist them in making those healthy lifestyle choices

1 Chairman's Welcome

The Chairman welcomed attendees to the meeting.

The Chairman informed the community board name has changed from Amersham to Amersham & Villages to correctly reflect the area.

Ms L Wright, Community Board Co-ordinator gave a refresher presentation on the focus areas of spend and minimum spends. These include Economic Regeneration and Recovery minimum 15% spend or £26k, Improving our Environment minimum 15% spend or £26k, Health and Wellbeing and Transport maximum 25% spend or £43k.

2 Notes from the last meeting

3 Declarations of Interest

There were no declarations of interest.

4 Chiltern Youth Club

Mr O O'Neil, Youth Worker for Amersham Youth gave an update on the activities

and services they provided young people over the summer to increase youth engagement.

The proposals for future actions were outlined including a Buckinghamshire Council run positive relationships course after half term, Red Box project, encouraging talking to each other in a positive way and soapbox racer partnership.

The Chairman reiterated the Community Board was available to help Amersham Youth financially in the future if the funding was available.

There was an open day at the new Amersham Youth Centre on Saturday 2nd October.

5 Chilterns Lifestyle Centre

Mr S Salwa Contract Manager for Everyone Active provided an update on the new Chiltern Lifestyle Centre a copy of which was appended to these minutes.

It was confirmed the new centre was on track to open on the scheduled date.

ACTION Mr S Salwa to add the opening date of the new centre to the minutes once confirmed.

A question was raised concerning the safety of fencing between the demolition site and the new lifestyle centre site.

ACTION Ms L Wright to raise the issue with the relevant service area in Buckinghamshire Council.

A question was raised regarding parking and if the first hour of parking will be refunded if using the centre.

ACTION Mr S Salwa to check with the relevant service area at Buckinghamshire Council as the car park is council owned.

6 Board activity and updates

Ms L Wright, Mr M Dormer and Ms R Matthews gave a presentation providing updates on the four focus areas.

Vice Chairman Ms R Matthews provided an update on ongoing proposals for Economic Regeneration.

- Increasing footfall and improving accessibility with the following proposals; cycle racks in key areas, increased signage to highlight areas of interest and benches along areas of interest. Visit Bucks to promote events and engagement online.
- Artistry and murals to brighten up areas of town, potential for local artist Dan Wilson to paint the wall by Royal Mail sorting office. Local schools could have input into murals.
- Bucks Business First have put forward proposals for local businesses including a net zero initiative to reduce carbon footprint, raising awareness and accessibility for those with disabilities, a voucher scheme to support businesses with digital skills and a be your own boss scheme.

Community Board Co-ordinator Ms L Wright provided an update on ongoing proposals for Environmental projects.

• Innovative projects include bee bus stops, biodiversity study for the local area, restoration of local wildlife hubs, community grow and share and reducing single use plastic.

There was a call for volunteers to help with improving the local environment.

Vice Chairman Mr R Matthews provided an update on ongoing proposals for Health and Wellbeing.

• Mapping of defibrillators in the local area underway, Bucks Mind to attend school assemblies, mental health training for secondary school teachers, Chiltern Open Air Museum to offer accompanied walks for adults with learning disabilities, dementia friendly initiative and more exercise equipment in play areas.

Mark Flys was in discussions with JCDecaux regarding advertising boards with defibrillators included for free, further discussions with Buckinghamshire Council were required as to locations.

Chairman Mr M Dormer provided an update on proposals for Transport.

- The focus of spending would be on danger hotspots and the prevention of accidents. Wooden bollards would be placed on Stanley Hill by St George's School to stop dangerous parking.
- Parking restrictions would be enforced near the Amersham industrial estate and Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign would be used in certain hotspots to tackle speeding and to collect speeding data. A full parking review would be undertaken in 2023.
- Projects in the pipeline included Roughwood Lane feasibility study to make it a one-way street, reduce speed advisory to 20mph outside Dr Challoner's School and wider parking review.

The Chairman requested more volunteers participate in the working groups and highlighted the new ideas form available online.

Ms L Wright encouraged more people to sign up to the community board newsletter. There had been an increase in followers and daily reach of the board on Facebook. There was a request to advise the co-ordinator of any community events which can be promoted on the Facebook page.

The Chairman reported £14k of the budget spent so far, with approx. £97k provisionally allocated which was over half of the total budget

7 Community Matters

Little Chalfont Primary School had requested support to develop an area of the playing fields into forestry so pupils can learn about conservation.

The Chairman requested help from any volunteer groups.

Chiltern Food Bank was looking for a new premise and requested if anyone knew of

a suitable site which was close to public transport, on one level and had sufficient parking to contact Ms L Wright the Board Co-ordinator.

Ms L Wright notified the board that local voluntary organisations could now manage their own listings on the Bucks online directory and there were a number of Consultations that residents could take part in on the Your Voice Bucks website.

There was a Big Bucks Tidy-Up organised by the Council for the end of October and start of November to target grotspots for litter picks and street cleansing. If there were any areas of concern contact Ms L Wright by 18th October who could inform the team.
