Minutes of the meeting of the Buckingham & Villages Community Board held on Thursday 2 February 2023 via MS Teams commencing at 6.30 pm and concluding at 7.53 pm

1 Chairman's Welcome

The Chairman welcomed all those present and thanked them for their attendance.

2 Apologies for Absence

Apologies for absence were received from T Lightfoot, Ms Cornell, Mr Chilver and Mr Harvey and Mr Whyte.

3 Declarations of Interest

There were no declarations of interest

4 Minutes/Actions from Previous Meeting

At the previous meeting of the Board Members had wished to establish how the change in Transport for Buckinghamshire (TfB) contractors would affect the ways of working with the community board. Alice Williams, Community Board Manager confirmed that although the contractors had been appointed, it had not yet been confirmed how they would work with the community boards going forwards. The board would be updated once the official process had been formally confirmed.

RESOLVED: That the minutes of the previous meeting be approved.

5 Buckingham Banking Hub Update

A presentation was delivered on the Banking Hub by Cash Access UK. Positive discussions were currently underway with the landlord regards a suitable property located in the area of Market Square. The Hub opening timeline would be subject to a number of further activities and actions and it was anticipated that the Hub would be functional within about 9 months.

Members were encouraged to get in contact if they were aware of any other suitable properties.

Members emphasised that they would like to be involved within the preparation for the launch of the new Banking Hub and that relevant Cllrs, the Mayor of Buckingham and MP should be invited to the event. It was also suggested that the university be consulted and liaised with as the service would be of considerable benefit to students.

ACTION: Alice Williams to act as the point of contact for the board regarding banking hub updates and liaise with Cash Access UK directly.

RESOLVED: That the report be noted and the officer presenter be thanked for attendance.

6 BART Bus Presentation

A presentation was delivered by Ashley Waite on the Bernwode Community Bus initiative which had been launched in 2018 in Waddesdon and Quainton with the primary objective of serving the elderly in the community. The project had gone from strength to strength and had merged with Buckingham Area Rural Transport (BART) in 2020. This meant that the service was able to offer 2 buses with wider coverage.

Members were informed that it was hoped that the same level of coverage could now be provided in the Buckinghamshire area but that assistance was required in order to make this happen. Mr Waite advised that more volunteer drivers were now needed to cater for the growing client group, in addition to help to publicise the service being offered.

All those present agreed that this was a fantastic initiative for the local community.

7 Corporate Update

Sara Turnbull, Service Director for Adult Social Care Operations highlighted points from the corporate update as circulated with the minutes.

Ms Turnbull also highlighted the press release issued on 2 February 2023 which highlighted the road repairs scheduled to be carried out by East West Rail in the community board area. The board asked for reassurance that the work would be monitored and for clarification of the

payment arrangements.

8 Community Board Action Plan

The Community Board Action plan for 2022/23 was summarised on pages 13-19 of the agenda pack. Its priorities fall within the areas of economic recovery, green spaces and communities, road safety and youth.

9 Reflection of the year 2022/23

Alice Williams, Community Board Manager detailed all the main events, highlights and achievements of the year to date. As part of the presentation the Board Manager gave mention to the priorities which had been established for the year and the Task and Finish Groups which had developed as a consequence of the further work undertaken.

Reference was also made to the budget allocated to date, a total of £67,361 with a total of £49,665 remaining. However it was highlighted that this was not the final figure as the deadlines would not elapse until the following week. It was confirmed that the Board would be updated on the final budget status for the year end following the final budget meeting.

Ms Williams emphasised the positive work that had taken place over the past year and gave an overview of the events that would take place in 2023-24. She also commented that she was very much looking forward to further success of the board which she anticipated would go from strength to strength.

Bernie's Food Appeal



During Covid

- During covid, Bernie and his team were key in supporting the work of the food banks by collecting across the aylesbury vale
- This process ran for close to 10 months and we collected over 2000 crates of food via a regular schedule
- We played music and collected in fancy dress to raise the mood at this difficult time
- We were also helping with the redistribution of government food boxes
- Bernie has become key in helping people gain access to food



Post Covid and the cost of living crisis

- Following covid, food sustainability has become a key issue as the country is locked in a cost of living crisis
- Bernie continues to collect on a monthly basis from
 26 drop off points across the area.
- We regularly collect half a tonne of food each month which has become invaluable to the work of the food banks in Aylesbury and the surrounding area.





The 5000 Can Challenge

- As a result of a grant from the Waddesdon & Stone Community board we were able to launch the 5000 Can Challenge in October to December 2022.
- Simply put, We set a target of collecting 5000 cans of food before christmas through our existing network as well as new opportunities.
- 9 Schools, 3 pubs, 2 gyms and several one of events all contributed to smashing the target and achieving an end of year total of 8293 cans collected

An update for Community Boards from Buckinghamshire Council

(Issue 1 2023 – January 2023)

Local Heritage Listing

Using government funding, the council has developed a Local Heritage List to protect some of the most important heritage sites in the county that contribute to the local character of Buckinghamshire.

The Local Heritage List identifies locally significant heritage sites and celebrates their contribution to local identity and character. These sites include historic buildings (houses, chapels, agricultural and industrial buildings), archaeological sites (upstanding earthwork remains and buried sites), formal gardens, public open spaces, public works of art, monuments and street furniture.

Sites were nominated by local communities and council staff and evaluated by the council's heritage and archaeology team with volunteers also working on the project.

The Local Heritage List is different to statutory listing and designations (e.g. Grade I, II and II* Listed Buildings, Scheduled Monuments, and Registered Parks and Gardens), which are assessed nationally by Historic England.

Assets on the Local Heritage List will be recognised and considered in any future planning applications, helping to protect local heritage assets for future generations to enjoy. There have been more than 2,653 nominations for inclusion on the list and 771 of these sites are now being brought forward for adoption in Phase 1, with the rest being assessed for Phase 2.

Local Plan update – sites to be published following call for sites

Following the 'Wider' call for sites last year, over 700 sites have been submitted for consideration as land for possible future development within Buckinghamshire. Our previous calls for brownfield sites resulted in 300 sites being suggested. An interactive map showing these has now been published at Brownfield CFS 2021-22 (arcgis.com)

A list of other sites which have been submitted as part of our wider call for sites will be available in the coming weeks. Officers have now started the process of evaluating each of the sites against the criteria of suitability for their chosen use, availability and deliverability over the plan period to 2040.

Work has commenced on an Employment and Retail Evidence Study and a Sustainability Appraisal Scoping Report (we expect to consult with the relevant statutory bodies on this shortly). We are in the process of appointing consultants for several other studies which are needed to inform the plan.

We are currently working to set out the overarching vision and objectives for the Local Plan for Buckinghamshire which will shape our work going forwards. In accordance with good practice on community engagement, the team is working on a forthcoming public consultation which will enable people to comment and give feedback on the draft Vision and Objectives.

Visitor Economy survey

Buckinghamshire Council has launched a new Tourism Survey which will help to shape the future of Buckinghamshire's visitor economy sector. The council is inviting input from residents, businesses and key stakeholders which it will use to help identify new opportunities and to support the future growth of the visitor economy across Buckinghamshire.

The survey will be an important contributor to a Visitor Economy Strategy currently being developed by Buckinghamshire Council and its partners. The strategy itself will aim to identify how Buckinghamshire can build on the opportunities within its visitor economy with a view to supporting businesses and creating jobs.

The survey findings will be used to get a better understanding of where to focus support for the sector and explore what tourism businesses see as their main challenges and opportunities now and in the future.

Tourism is an important part of our local economy, as visitors spending their time and money in Buckinghamshire support more than 13,000 local jobs and over 2,000 small businesses. Responses from the survey will used to develop a strategy and action plan which will help the tourism sector in Buckinghamshire to flourish and grow, supporting local jobs, workers and industries into the future.

The survey is live now and will be running until 17 February 2023. Buckinghamshire residents, business owners and other tourism stakeholders can complete the survey here.
