## 2 Minutes

### 3 Declarations of Interest

## 4 Chairman's Update

The Chairman detailed events that he had attended since the last Council meeting which had included a Family Drug and Alcohol seminar, 1<sup>st</sup> anniversary event on the invasion of Ukraine, Milton Keynes Mayor Civic Service and Awards ceremony, Bucks New University Chancellor day, High Sheriff Justice dinner, Gerrards Cross Town Civic Service, a number of citizenship ceremonies, Marlow Rugby Club concert featuring the Chiltern Music Academy, Buckinghamshire Council Annual Civic Service (High Wycombe), Aylesbury concert band, new High Sheriff of Buckinghamshire declaration of office event, a meeting with Honorary Alderman John Savage, Holi Festival (Aylesbury), Annual Scouts dinner, his Chairman's reception at The Gateway, Aston Clinton Community Centre opening ceremony, Amersham Community Board engagement event, Aylesbury Town Council St George's Day parade, and a British Empire Medal investiture ceremony. Mention was also made of the pin badges provided to Members that it was hoped they would wear with pride in the community.

The Vice Chairman of the Council also detailed events she had attended since the last Council meeting which included a number of citizenship ceremonies, the Chairman's Annual Civic Service in High Wycombe, the Chairman's reception at the Gateway, and in a private capacity the ceremony for the opening of the Aston Clinton Community Centre.

## 5 Petitions

There were none.

## 6 Presentation from the Buckinghamshire Fire & Rescue Service, Chief Fire Officer

Jason Thelwell, the Chief Fire Officer and Chief Executive of Bucks Fire and Rescue Service was in attendance to present to Members on the work of the Fire Service. Mr Thelwell was introduced by Councillor Rouse, Chairman of the Bucks Milton Keynes Fire Authority (BMKFA), who provided some context to the presentation. The BMKFA had set three priorities for the Fire Service over the last year, namely:

- To increase the whole establishment of the Service, thanks to additional funding obtained when ClIr L Clarke was Chairman of the BMKFA.
- To ensure that it moved to a sustainable financial footing, to enable it to invest and continue to transform the Service for the benefit of residents in Buckinghamshire and Milton Keynes.
- To demonstrate continued improvement in the protection and service provided to residents. This included addresses the areas of improvement that HM Inspectorate had set out in 2021.

The following key points were highlighted during the presentation:

- The Vision making Buckinghamshire and Milton Keynes the safest areas in England in which to live, work and travel.
- Incidents attended in Buckinghamshire (excluding co-responders) in 2022/23.

- Data on accidental dwelling fires per 1,000 dwellings, which was significantly below the England average.
- Data and information on fire related fatalities and injuries at accidental dwelling fires.
- Data on the Home Fire Safety Visits (HFSV) undertaken.
- Information on road traffic accidents attended.
- Information on the workforce, noting that it was the intention to have a wholetime strength of 300 staff within the next 2 months.
- Financial Information on the precept flexibility (which had allowed for a £5 per year increase in Council tax for a Band D property), Urban Search and Rescue team (USAR) team funding (which thanks to local MPs lobbying the Minister had seen funding agreed for the next 2 years with an additional bid made to the Treasury), on pay inflation and future issues which included that a White Paper for reform of the Fire Service was 'imminent', looking at the culture of the Fire Service, and on collaboration across the Thames Valley.

Thanks were expressed by Members for the hard work of the Fire Service and its staff for all that they did to protect and keep the public safe. Details of the question / answer session to the Chief Fire Officer and Councillor Rouse were as follows:

- (i) That the increase in Council tax would raise an additional £2-3m that would help to recruit more staff.
- (ii) Details were provided of how the Fire Service had responded to austerity and a reduction in staff numbers from 2010. Largely due to the positive approach, flexibility and different working practices adopted by staff, it had been possible to maintain the number of Fire Engines that the Service operated.
- (iii) Details were provided on apprenticeships that were offered in all departments of the Fire Service.
- (iv) That the Buckinghamshire and Milton Keynes Fire Service had one of the lowest precepts in the country (3<sup>rd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> lowest out of over 45 Fire Services).
- (v) That while the Fire Service regularly held exercises with HS2, e.g. for the USAR team to be able to respond to fire/safety emergencies in the long rail tunnels being built through the Chilterns, however, no additional funding was provided by HS2.
- (vi) That the Fire Service would be updating the Community Risk Management Plan to be able to respond to events such as 19 July last year (hottest day of the year) and was investing in equipment to be able to respond to events such as fighting wildfires.
- (vii) Information was provided on what the Fire Service was doing to identify and root out bullying, harassment, intimidation and other poor workplace practices and behaviours, including what was being done to respond to the recent HM Inspectorate of Constabulary and Fire & Rescue Services report. Anyone who had an issue was advised to report it to the Fire Service. The Deputy Chief Fire Officer had been fortnightly meetings over the past 5 years with the Head of HR to discuss every grievance and disciplinary issue that had been raised. If instances of bullying and harassment were found then staff

would be sacked, as had happened in the past, as it was stated that there was no place for such behaviours in the modern Fire Service or in any workplace. Enhance DBS checks were also made of all front-line staff, including fire fighters, which had resulted in some applications to join the Fire Service being rejected, or information reported to other Fire Services if it was felt that was required.

- (viii) That the public should contact their local Fire Station or Aylesbury if they were aware of a vulnerable resident who they believe would benefit from a HFSV.
- (ix) That it was likely that the White Paper would raise issues such as operational independence, a College of Fire for the advancement of staff and a Fire Standards Board to raise standards within Services, which were all seen as positive measures.
- (x) Councillor Rouse commented on a likely proposal in the White Paper for oversight of Fire Services to move from local Fire Authorities to Police and Crime Commissioners. The Fire Authority and the LGA had both responded to a consultation that the case for this change was not strong enough, and that oversight should remain locally with Fire Authorities.

The Chairman expressed thanks to the Chief Fire Officer for his presentation and responding to Members' questions. The Chief Fire Officer thanked Members for their continued support for the work of the Fire Service and his staff.

# 7 Electoral Review - response to consultation on four Wards in South Buckinghamshire

Council received a report that explained that it had been expected that, on 28 February 2023, the Local Government Boundary Commission would publish its final proposals for the pattern of wards for Buckinghamshire Council. Instead, the Commission had launched a limited further consultation on revised proposals for four wards in the south-east of the county. These amendments were made by the Commission in response to a significant number of objections to their previous proposals in this area. The Commission believed the revisions achieved the best balance of their criteria: community identity, acceptable electoral variance, effective local government and their wish to minimise the number of parishes that would be split across Buckinghamshire wards.

The Commission had not indicated what position it had taken on the remainder of the county. Instead, it now intended to publish the final recommendations on all wards on 30 May. The further consultation had officially ended on 11 April but the Commission had given the Council an extension to 26 April to enable it to consider the matter.

As in previous stages, the Standards and General Purposes Committee had received recommendations from the cross-party Electoral Review Working Group formed under the Committee. Drop-in sessions for Ward members had been arranged with

the Chairman and Deputy Chairman of the Working Group. The Working Group recommended acceptance of the Commission's proposals. On 13 April, the Committee had agreed likewise and this was the recommendation now before Council.

Annex 1 summarised the key changes envisaged by the Commission, that were:

- **A.** To reverse the proposed extension of Chalfont St Peter southwards into Gerrards Cross Parish: based on "strong community-based evidence"
- **B.** Consequently, to reduce the number of Chalfont St Peter councillors by one: to achieve acceptable electoral variance for that ward (10%)
- **C.** To restore New Denham from Iver to Gerrards Cross & Denham: based on feedback that there were no "strong community or geographic links" between New Denham and Iver Parish. (The revision now aligns with this Council's original submission)
- **D.** To place Hedgerley and Fulmer within Farnhams & Stoke Poges: restoring Denham wholly to Gerrards Cross & Denham would result in that ward being out of variance; however, placing Fulmer & Hedgerley within the Farnhams & Stoke Poges Ward would achieve balance for both wards but would do so by expanding the latter from two members to three.
- **E.** To pluralise 'Farnham' to demonstrate that both Farnham Royal and Farnham Common are included in the name "Farnhams & Stoke Poges".

These changes would result in one fewer councillor overall, 97 instead of the previously proposed 98. The Commission had indicated, throughout the review, that the "98" number may marginally increase or decrease depending on the final balance of criteria for each Ward.

It was notable, from A-E of the proposed changes, that the revised proposals were interlocked, with a decision for one Ward having some impact on another. This demonstrated the consideration at the heart of an electoral review: achieving a balance of the relevant criteria for each ward and for its neighbours.

The Commission considered their revisions achieve a working balance of the criteria: only one Ward would exceed the variance, others coming well within it or at the acceptable limit of it; only one parish (Chalfont St Peter) would cross a Buckinghamshire Ward boundary; and each reflected an acceptable balance of community identity.

During the debate, points highlighted included:

- One Councillor stated that the proposals would negatively impact the strong links between Fulmer and Gerrards Cross and cause harm to community cohesion and effective governance, although it was commented that the Ward boundaries were 'soft' boundaries for the purposes of electoral representation and would not stop communities from across the boundary from continuing to work with each other.
- That it was unfortunate that the latest consultation would mean there were 97

rather than 98 Councillors representing the Council from 2025, although it was highlighted that the Commission had stated that the final Councillor numbers would possibly be 98 but could be plus/minus one Councillor number depending on the outcomes of the Warding arrangements.

Councillor T Broom moved the two recommendations as noted in the report. These were seconded by Councillor B Chapple OBE.

#### **RESOLVED** –

- (1) That the Council's response to the Local Government Boundary Commission for England further consultation on warding arrangements be APPROVED, as summarized at paragraph 2.3 and in Annex 1 of the Council report, and as recommended by the Standards and General Purposes Committee.
- (2) That the Service Director for Legal and Democratic Services be authorized to submit the response to the Local Government Boundary Commission for England on behalf of the Council.

### 8 Scrutiny Annual Report

Members considered the Annual reports authored by each of the 6 Chairmen of the Select Committees which reflected on the work and the outcomes achieved over the past year. The reports detailed and examined the role and the key areas of work undertaken by each of the Select Committees together with its future programmes of work. The information was provided at Appendix 1 to the Council report. The six Select Committees the Council operated were Children's and Education, Communities and Localism, Finance and Resources, Growth, Infrastructure and Housing, Health and Adult Social Care and Transport, Environment and Climate Change. In addition to reviewing key areas of work at each of their meetings, Committees responded to consultations, questioned external partners, and held a number of inquiries and rapid reviews to help drive improvements.

Councillor M Harker OBE, Chairman of the Communities and Localism Select Committee presented the report and highlighted a number of pieces of scrutiny work undertaken over the last year:

- The Communities and Localism SC and the Growth, Infrastructure and Housing SC held a joint meeting to look at the visitor economy.
- The Transport, Environment and Climate Change (TECC) SC and the Communities and Localism SC both held meetings where HS2 and East West Rail were held to account. The Communities and Localism SC had specifically looked at community engagement aspects, whilst the TECC SC continued to play a role in monitoring the projects.
- A comprehensive budget scrutiny exercise had been undertaken in January, making 9 recommendations to Cabinet on the budget.
- The Children's and Education SC had undertaken a review of SEND pathways, including talking to various stakeholders.

- The Health and Adult Social Care SC had recently completed a review looking at the dementia journey in Buckinghamshire.
- The review of pollution in rivers and chalk streams undertaken by the TECC SC last year had been recognised by the Centre for Governance and Scrutiny as an exemplar piece of work.

It was also commented that the Council operated a very robust scrutiny framework holding the Executive to account and that the process at Buckinghamshire was highly regarded by other councils, and by the LGA. The Member took the opportunity to express her thanks to the Cabinet Members and officers for their time and for answering, often challenging questions regarding the scrutiny function.

That the Annual Report of the Select Committees for 2022-2023 be noted.

## 9 Reports from Cabinet Members

This Members received reports from Cabinet Members. There was an opportunity for Members to ask questions of individual Cabinet Members about matters and issues affecting their portfolios.

## **Leader of the Council, Councillor Martin Tett**

The Leader reported that as well as the additional £5m released from General Fund Reserves for 2023/24 Highways road maintenance at the budget meeting, the Government had also now provided £2.3m for highways road maintenance. The Leader had written to the Government to lobby for further funding for road maintenance and had also lobbied local MPs. The Government had responded that they were in constant dialogue with the Treasury about the issue of funding for roads but there were no imminent plans to increase funding.

The Leader received comments and questions on highways road maintenance, levelling up, remuneration for teaching staff and on how the Council might generate additional income in the future. Members were informed:

- That it was a priority for the Council to deploy the additional £7.3m funding this year for additional highways road maintenance.
- That the 3 main priority areas for levelling up were central Aylesbury, central Wycombe, and parts of Chesham. This was led by the Place Based partnership that was chaired by the Chief Executive.
- That the money available for levelling up was as agreed at the budget meeting, although it would be important to leverage use of the funds to ensure that maximum benefits were achieved from that money.
- That the funding for teaching assistants was entirely done through schools, many of which were now academies, and it was up to them to determine what they paid staff from the funding provided from central Government.
- That a Member working party was being established to look at ideas for the Council to generate new income streams.

## Cabinet Member for Education and Children's Services – Councillor Anita Cranmer

The Cabinet Member received comments and questions on assisting young people, support for Head Teachers, waiting times for autism diagnoses, SEND provision, schools funding and on children's homes. Members were informed:

- On the ways that local Members could assist young people in their areas with issues such as employment opportunities and upskilling themselves, which would include introducing a Member shadowing scheme, a new skills programme, and ensuring that local Members were able to be a conduit between the Council and local businesses and schools.
- That a skills / careers fair would be held at the Elgiva theatre, Chesham on 23
  September. This would not only open up opportunities for young people but
  also for returners to work, re-skilling people, and for early retirees who might
  wish to come back to work.
- On what the Council was doing to support Head Teachers. This included increasing the number of educational psychologists employed from 12 to 20, who were available at all times to go in and advise head teachers and teaching staff with issues such as setting up counselling and trauma groups. The Council was also looking at what support could be provided from within local communities (collaborative working) and was ensuring that the Council maintained efforts to support families.
- That the Council would be working a lot more collaboratively with partners going forward to try to reduce waiting times for autism / ADHD diagnoses and had secured extra funding from partners to help deal with assessments and setting up treatments. An assurance had also been received that more staff would be recruited. An early help strategy would also assist in identifying issues earlier.
- Joint Care Quality Commission and Ofsted inspection of the local area SEND provision (in Scrutiny Annual Report) – it was confirmed that the Written Statement of Action (WSOA) had been submitted.
- On the work being done to recognise Bucks schools, teachers and everyone
  who worked in education in the county, which would include an inaugural
  School Awards held in June at Pinewood studios. There would be 12 award
  categories including new teacher of the year, teacher of the year, senior
  leadership head, health and wellbeing award, and a community award.
  Sponsorship had also been received from 12 sponsors to support the
  awards.
- That the Council was not able to provide additional monies to schools to assist
  for projects such as solar panels or heat pumps to help reduce energy costs.
  However, the Council would continue to lobby the DFE for extra funding for
  schools. Schools were also recommended to explore whether their local
  communities and Community Boards were able to support projects.
- That it was particularly pleasing that two of the children's homes set up by the Council had received an outstanding rating.
- That support could be provided to the Buckingham Town Council when they
  put together their next Neighbourhood Plan.

#### **Cabinet Member for Culture and Leisure – Councillor Clive Harriss**

The Cabinet Member received comments and questions on Little Marlow Lakes Country Park, Higginson Park, skills/training opportunities for prisoners and on the new Leisure Strategy. Members were informed:

- That there wasn't any particular update information to provide on the Officer
  Working party and the development of a viable business case for Little
  Marlow Lakes Country Park, although the CM would be happy to provide the
  Member with a written response.
- That the Member would be provided with information on when work would start to replace the play area in Higginson Park, Marlow.
- On what the Council was doing, primarily through the library service, to offer courses and skills training for prisoners.
- That a report on the pitch playing strategy and the new Leisure Strategy (Cabinet report) would both come forward in the next 3 months.

## **Cabinet Member for Transport – Councillor Steve Broadbent**

The Cabinet Member (CM) received comments and questions on a wide range of transport related issues. Members were informed:

- That the pothole pro (specialist) machine was now out on the network fixing potholes.
- That the CM was aware of the pavement "disrepair" issue raised by a Member and that it had been assessed by two technicians. All pavement repairs were made in line with the Highways Safety inspection policy which helped prioritise where the £2m annual funding for footway schemes/repairs would take place.
- On the issues that had delayed a repair of lighting in St Marys Square, Aylesbury. The Member was asked to contact the Cabinet Member about the gully clearing issues in Kingsbury.
- That big improvements had been made to the 'Fix My Street' system including better messaging for people who had reported issues. It was possible that the improvements work had removed some duplicate reports and Members were asked to contact the Cabinet Member if they had a particular issue.
- On an update on the A4010, and that the Council was still waiting for DFT guidance on the scope of Local Transport Plan 5. The work of the North West Chilterns Community Board working group on a locally inspired transport strategy for that area was welcomed and would be helpful in shaping the overall future vision.
- Thanks were given for the work of the Council in relation to schemes to reduce traffic speeding in Rutland Avenue, Castlefield.
- That updates and enhancements done to the 'Fix My Street' system would hopefully improve and making messaging more accurate, e.g. rather than stating that a job was done, it would report when temporary fixes/repairs had been done, which would later be re-visited to do a permanent repair.
- That work on developing the Parking Strategy was ongoing.

- On the work of the parking enforcement teams, including that there were a number of unfilled vacancies.
- That the Council had received Government funding for the on-street vehicle charging trial in Wendover, that would happen this year. A complication was that channels cut into footpaths and using existing structures such as lamp posts or bollards required planning permission. Members were encouraged to inform the team of any sites that thought suitable for on-street charging. The Council's EV Charging Plan was focussed on putting points into publicly available spaces rather than workplaces timescales, although employers were also encouraged to provide workplace vehicle charging for their employees.
- On the recent closures of Eastern Street and Swan car park due to anti-social behaviour.
- That the CM empathised with the Member about utility companies putting up too many traffic lights in some areas (vicinity of Cressex Business Park was mentioned) which then led traffic gridlock. It was stated that one of the biggest reasons, apart from safety, for revoking permits was traffic management concerns. The Council continued to monitor utility companies to ensure they complied with permit conditions.
- That any assessments looking at 20 m.p.h. speed limits would be undertaken according to DFT guidelines. If it met the guidelines, had local support, and had the necessary funding then it could proceed. The information for any application would be gathered in accordance with the Council's policy so would not be impacted by the change of contractor from TFB to Buckinghamshire Transport.
- That the CM shared the concerns of the Member about increased vehicle movements through Buckinghamshire due to drivers trying to avoid the expanded ULEZ zone. The Mayor of London had failed to share any traffic modelling data of any impacts in response to requests. The CM had written to the mayor objecting to the financial burdens that the scheme would impose on the people of Buckinghamshire and the disproportionate impact on those on lower incomes. Independent studies had found that the scheme would have negligible impact on vehicle emissions in the Greater London area. The Leader of the Council also stated that the Council strongly opposed the introduction of the new scheme and that he had instructed Officers that the Mayor of London would not be permitted to put any of his signage on Buckinghamshire Council owned property.
- With an update on the Active Travel Plan for Buckingham.
- That he would ask whether a review of the salting route for Tingewick Road was necessary due to changed circumstances.
- That he would check for the Member on the priority of the road in Hazlemere for Civil Enforcement Officer visits.
- With an update on EV charging in Marlow and some of the future plans for the county.

Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Health and Wellbeing – Councillor Angela Macpherson

The Cabinet Member received comments and questions on autism, the new CQC inspection regime and adult social care funding. Members were informed:

- That the integrated commissioning team were undertaking work looking an all-age autism strategy, which would look at a partnership approach to working. The CM would be mindful on how Members could be best involved to input local knowledge to this work and the strategy.
- With an update on what the Council was doing to ensure that services were operating at a level that would comply with the new CQC assurance/inspection regime. An all-Member briefing in July would focus on informing Members on the CQC inspection regime.
- With an update on adult social care funding, including that it had been examined as part of the budget scrutiny process earlier in the year.

## **Cabinet Member for Planning and Regeneration – Councillor Peter Strachan**

The Cabinet Member received comments and questions on local markets, the Buckinghamshire Local Plan, Neighbourhood Plans, Member call-ins and on 2 specific planning issues. Members were informed:

- The CM agreed that local markets had an important role to play in the post-Covid recovery and welcomed the news on the Gerrards Cross street market starting this month and that it would meet going forward on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of each month.
- That the Council's position was unchanged in using brown before green for developments. The Council was still waiting for future housing allocations information from Government and would continue to keep Members updated.
- With an update on the development of the Buckinghamshire Local Plan.
- That the Council was supportive of Parish Councils developing Neighbourhood Plans, which would help to protect them from speculative planning applications.
- That planning committee dates were place holders in the calendar of meetings, and it cost nothing to cancel a meeting if there was no business to transact. The CM would write to the Member with information about the number of Member call-ins that had been received.
- That if a Member wrote to him about a particular issue relating to hedgerows in lckford that he would respond.
- That if a Member wrote to him with a specific issue relating to sewage and drainage provision for new developments that he would respond.

There were no questions for the Cabinet Member for Accessible Housing and Resources – Councillor John Chilver

## **Cabinet Member for Communities – Councillor Steve Bowles**

The Cabinet Member received comments and questions on High Wycombe,

Community Board funding, the VCSE Resilience Fund, digital food vouchers, assets of community value and on the PSPO extension for Buckingham Town Centre. Members were informed:

- That the right time to consider any Community Governance Review relating to the unparished area in Wycombe could be following the local Government boundary review of Buckinghamshire that was currently being undertaken and would be known by the end of May 2023. It was stated that engagement with High Wycombe was often done through the High Wycombe Town Committee and the Community Board.
- That it would be appropriate for a Community Board to consider a grant application from a school for a project to help reduce energy costs.
- About the Community and Social Enterprise (VCSE) Sector Resilience Fund that could provide support and award grants to organisations suffering from increased operating costs due to cost-of-living pressures, with additional priority given to organisations aiming to reduce inequalities amongst residents living in the most disadvantaged areas of the county.
- That if a Member wrote to him about an area in a part of High Wycombe that would benefit from the Helping Hands scheme that he would refer it to the relevant team.
- That if a Member wrote to him about digital food vouchers, i.e. how many used/redeemed and their effectiveness, then he would respond.
- That if a Member wrote to him about assets of community value and the Council's role in issues such as the sale of pubs/community shops closing in villages, then he would respond.
- That he would be responding to Buckingham Town Council in relation to the Public Space Protection Order extension for Buckingham Town Centre.

# Cabinet Member for Homelessness and Regulatory Services – Councillor Mark Winn

The Cabinet Member updated Members on the actions being taken by the Council and the Environmental Health team regarding damp and mould in private rental and housing association accommodation. The team had dealt with 99 cases in 2021/22 which had risen to 211 cases in 2022/23. The EH team's plans for the forthcoming winter period would be discussed at a forthcoming Growth, Infrastructure and Housing Select Committee. The Cabinet Member received comments and questions on a wide range of issues. Members were informed:

- On what the Council was doing to ensure that taxi drivers were complying with the conditions of their licences and to ensure the safety of the general public travelling with them, particularly as they transported many vulnerable people.
- On the provision for the homeless in the Wycombe area, and that the Bridge Court development in Bridge Road (58 temporary places) would open very soon. An open day for Councillors to visit the development would be arranged.
- That the mention in his CM report of French travellers simply indicated where the people had travelled from. His report had also mentioned that the

- travellers had been very polite and had moved on quickly.
- On the current draft policy relating to licensed activities such as dog breeding and boarding kennels, and riding schools, and which set out the steps the Council would be taking to ensure that these businesses were run by fit and proper persons. Members and the public were encouraged to comment on the draft policy.
- That it was initially planned to use both Bridge Road and Saunderton Lodge for temporary accommodation, but the Lodge would be closing at some point in the future. A scheme had come forward for the Star Blocks, Castlefield (owned by the Red Kite Housing Association) but been found to be unaffordable. The Council was waiting for further plans from the Housing Association.
- That the majority of cases of damp / mould investigated by the Council related to housing association accommodation.
- That the best way for people to report damp / mould issues to the Council
  was via the Environmental Health team. The CM asked for Members to let
  him know of instances where people may have been referred back to their
  local Councillor.
- That one of the limiting factors of Bucks Home Choice was the lack of social housing. It was helpful if residents were as flexible as possible when offered social housing although it was appreciated this was not always possible. An update was provided on the work being done to provide more social housing, including that a Housing Strategy would be brought forward in the Summer.
- That the CM report had been referred more to regulating street trading in public accessible areas than to cold calling premises.
- On the once a weekly Registrar Service visits to Buckingham (held in the library), which had had to be discontinued during the pandemic. The Service was currently recruiting and was hopeful to reinstate the weekly visits to Buckingham later this year.

# Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Environment and Climate Change – Councillor Gareth Williams

The Cabinet Member received comments and questions on tree planting, Bledlow Ridge HRC and on waste collections. Members were informed:

- That 145,000 trees had been planted by the Council in the last planting season, with this being done with a variety of partners including local groups and with the Forestry Commission. The CM also mentioned how local groups and the community could get involved to support tree planting efforts and that he was supportive of a Chalfont St Giles community orchard.
- That the Council was committed to establishing the Wing Wood with the Forestry Commission on a 51 hectare site, that would include planting 132K trees (109K already planted), a couple of ponds, a community orchard, hazel coppicing and some latticing.
- On the Bledlow Ridge Household Recycling Centre that had re-opened after being closed for 4 years. The HRC was working well and being used by local Bucks residents. Some of the biodiversity offsets built included 150 metres

- of hedging put in, in partnership with Chiltern Rangers.
- That if a Member wrote to the CM about a persistent problem with waste collections in non-standards areas that he would respond.
- On some of the actions that the Council was undertaking to protect mature /
  established trees including placing a TPO on an ancient woodland that was
  threatened by HS2. Mention was also made of recent action taken at
  Hazlemere forest. It was explained that TPOs were the legal mechanism,
  subject to satisfying certain requirements, used by the Council to protect
  trees.

## **Background**

1.1 This report seeks approval to the proportionality arrangements for committees of

Buckinghamshire Council established in the constitution as follows:

- Strategic Sites Committee and the Area Planning Committees
- Licensing Committee
- the Pensions Committee
- the Senior Appointments and Pay Committee
- the Standards and General Purposes Committee
- the Audit and Governance Committee
- the Select Committees
- 1.2 The report also deals with:
  - the process for confirming lists of proposed substitute nominations for Committees.
  - the appointments made by the Leader for the municipal year 2023/24 of the chairmen of the Community Boards.

### **Political Proportionality**

- 1.3 The distribution of seats on Committees is governed by Section 15 of the Local Government and Housing Act 1989 and the Local Government (Committees and Political Groups) Regulations 1990, which require the allocation to accord with the rules on proportionality. The Regulations state that seats on Committees must be allocated to each political group in the same proportion to the number of seats held by each of those groups on the Council (rules of aggregation as well as being in the correct proportions on each Committee individually, in so far as this may be practicable).
- 1.4 The most recent proportionality review was considered at the Council meeting on 22 February 2023. Proportionality is unchanged since that review.
- 1.5 The political balance of the Council is currently 112 Conservatives, 16 Liberal Democrats, 6 Independents, 6 Labour, 4 Wycombe Independents, 2 Independent Network and 1 Green Party. There are 3 political groups comprising 112 (The Conservative Group), 20 (The Alliance Grouping) and 15 (IMPACT Alliance) Members. There are no ungrouped members. Following the agreement of all political groups the final allocations proposed are listed in Appendix 1.

1.6 The allocation of total seats in line with political proportionality is as set out in Table 1 below.

## **Appointments to Committees**

- 1.8 Group Leaders have appointed members to the committees according to these proportionality arrangements (Appendix 2 paper to be published at the Council meeting).
- 1.9 In the case of Community Boards, Buckinghamshire Council councillors from the respective area are eligible to be members of the Boards. Details of Board membership is included on the Council's website. A schedule setting out the Leader's appointments of Chairmen of the 16 Community Boards for 2023/24 will be published at the Council meeting.
- 1.10 In the case of the High Wycombe Town Committee, all Buckinghamshire Council councillors from the unparished area are appointed as members of the Committee (see Appendix 4).

#### **Substitutes**

- 1.11 The appointment of substitute Members on Committees and Sub-Committees is dealt with in the Committee Procedure Rules of the Constitution at paragraphs 2.76 to 2.80.
- 1.12 While all Members can substitute onto Committees, subject to requirements within the Constitution (e.g. the Audit and Governance Committee, Standards and General Purposes Committee and the Pension Fund Committee do not permit substitutes; in order to be eligible to sit as substitutes on regulatory or administrative committees or panels or staff appointments or disciplinary bodies established by the Council, councillors must have received formal training in relevant procedures and the law), it is proposed that authority is delegated to the Monitoring Officer, upon the written confirmation of a Group Leader, to agree or vary lists of proposed substitute nominations.

## **Appointment of Councillors to Partnerships and Outside Bodies**

- 1.13 The Council is responsible for appointing members to a range of partnerships and outside bodies. These include national, regional, countywide and local bodies and partnerships. In some cases, these are strategic organisations where Members can shape and influence policy affecting Buckinghamshire. In others, the role of the appointed Member is important in promoting the relationship with the Council. The Leader is responsible for nominations to the appointments. Where political proportionality applies, nominations are made by the relevant Group Leader(s). In 2023/24, this applies to the Chiltern Conservation Board.
- 1.14 The Council is invited to approve the appointment of councillors to partnerships and outside bodies for 2023/2024 (Appendix 5 to be published at the Council meeting).
- 1.15 The schedule of appointments will be kept under review during the year and the Leader will notify the Monitoring Officer of any changes that arise.

## 1. Content of report

- 1.1 In accordance with the Council's Constitution (Part G), this report sets out the proposed structure of Select Committees for the forthcoming year. No changes are envisaged to the remits and number of the Council's Select Committees.
- 1.2 The Council will appoint six Select Committees to discharge the Council's statutory overview and scrutiny functions, each of which will comprise 15 Members. These shall be known as:
  - (i) Children's and Education Select Committee
  - (ii) Communities and Localism Select Committee
  - (iii) Finance and Resources Select Committee
  - (iv) Growth, Infrastructure and Housing Select Committee
  - (v) Health and Adult Social Care Select Committee
  - (vi) Transport, Environment and Climate Change Select Committee
- 1.3 Each Select Committee is anticipated to meet at least five times a year, in accordance with current practice. Formal meetings of Select Committees will be public meetings (except under specific confidential circumstances as set out in the Local Government Act 1972). Each Select Committee has the power to undertake scrutiny inquiries, to investigate issues and make recommendations to decision-makers for change in relation to areas within their remit. Evidence for these inquiries

- may be taken at Select Committee meetings or through additional informal inquiry sessions.
- 1.4 In addition to the general functions of the Select Committees set out in the Council's Constitution, the broad remits of the six Select Committees are set out in the table below. This information is intended as an indicative guide to the remits of the Select Committees, recognising that a number of potential topics could span at least one Select Committee.
- 1.5 Where the lead responsibility for scrutiny is unclear the relevant Chairmen, in consultation with the Scrutiny Manager, will agree how best to take forward the work, including agreeing one Select Committee to take lead responsibility for approving the set-up of any inquiry and monitoring implementation of agreed recommendations.
- 1.6 In addition to the six Select Committees, Council agreed on 21 April 2021 that the Council would participate in the joint health scrutiny committee for Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and Berkshire West Integrated Care System.
  Details of this Committee are also included in the table below for information.

### **Select Committee Remits**

#### Children's and Education Select Committee

The Children's and Education Select Committee holds decision makers to account for improving outcomes and services for children and young people in Buckinghamshire.

This will include, but not exclusively, responsibility for scrutinising issues in relation to:

- Early Help
- Education including early years, schools and further education
- Special Educational Needs & Disability (SEND)
- Adult learning
- Children's safeguarding
- Help and Protection
- Looked After Children
- Adoption and Fostering
- Leaving Care
- Youth Offending
- Youth provision

<sup>\*</sup> This Committee shall act as the designated Committee responsible for the scrutiny of Education matters.

#### Communities and Localism Select Committee

# Our Key **Priorities**

Buckinghamshire Council's Corporate Plan for 2020-25 sets out the key activities the Council planned to undertake over that period to achieve its strategic objectives and vision.

# Challenges 2022/2023

There have been many great achievements throughout 2022/23, however, we have had to overcome a few challenges along the way. Some of these are new challenges arising from situations such as the war in Ukraine and inflationary pressures; whilst others remain challenges following the impact of the pandemic or more long term factors. Many we will need to continue to address and overcome in future years. These challenges have included:

### Increased demand

- There is an increased demand for adult social care services and increasing complexity of care needs, for example
  Buckinghamshire's growth in demand is higher than other Local Authoritie's in the South-East. From 2020-21 to 202122 Buckinghamshire reported a 46% increase in people making contact for care needs compared to the regional
  average of 16% growth. (Comparative data for 2022-23 will be available in Nov).
- Challenges in the NHS translate into social care demand as a person's condition will usually deteriorate whilst waiting
  for health services and discharge from hospital.
- There is a growing demand for temporary accommodation and housing and homelessness services following the end
  of the pandemic related emergency accommodation provisions.
- The impact of the war in Ukraine and ongoing resettlement of eligible families from Afghanistan has led to an increase
  in refugees in the county which in turn has increased demand for housing across the county.
- The impact of housing growth places greater demand on services such as waste collection and household recycling centres.
- An increase in the number of referrals into children's social care where the primary concern is child and/or parent mental health difficulties

### **Infrastructure Pressures**

- National infrastructure projects such as HS2 and East West Rail continue to have an impact in Buckinghamshire though increased traffic, damage to the highways network and environmental impacts.
- The very cold weather that started in December, continued into January/February. This combined with very wet conditions, led to unprecedented levels of defects being reported which placed added pressure on our highways teams.

### Supply/Recruitment

There are national shortages of skills in a number of professions which have led to difficulties recruiting and retaining staff for some services, including Children's and Adult Social Care, planning, teachers and teaching assistants and HGV drivers for waste collection. For example, the vacancy rate in Adult Social Care is typically over 35%. Staff shortages within the wider care sector also places significant constraints on the supply and stability of both home and residential care.

### Impact of inflation

- Rising inflation is impacting the delivery of capital projects and programmes due to increase in cost of construction materials.
- More residents turning to the council for help and creating a pressure as resources have not increased to match demand.

### **Education and Skills**

- The attainment gap between disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged pupils post pandemic remains a challenge.
- The pressure on schools and local authority resources to meet the increasing volume and complexity of pupils' needs.



# Strengthening our communities

People in Buckinghamshire are living longer and healthier lives, with health outcomes better than the national average. We have strong communities and a thriving, dedicated not for profit sector.

Buckinghamshire is a healthy and inclusive place to live, work and visit, but we have a number of challenges. These include building more affordable homes now and for future generations, providing extra help and support for an increasingly older population and improving the health of people who live in the more deprived areas of Buckinghamshire.

Our key delivery programme to achieve this is Opportunity Bucks
– Succeeding for All, which will focus on 10 wards where residents
are experiencing the most hardships, to design and deliver targeted
interventions that support improvement in outcomes for our residents.



# Protecting the vulnerable

While most people in Buckinghamshire live independent and healthy lives, some need extra support and protection. We know that the number of children and adults who need this extra help is increasing and the impending social care reforms, set out in the 'People at the Heart of Care' White Paper, will have significant impacts for us as an authority. There are also rising numbers of people with mental health difficulties, special educational needs, disabilities, and complex needs.

We want to give everyone the best chances in life, so that – together with their families and carers - they are resilient and can identify their own solutions. We will continue to work with our partners and communities to innovate and improve our offer, helping people recover from illness sooner, promoting fostering, reducing social isolation and loneliness, and supporting our most vulnerable residents.

Our goal is to reduce inequalities and give everyone the support and skills they need to live independent, happy, and fulfilling lives.

Over a quarter of our county is within the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, a third is covered by the Metropolitan Green Belt and we have two National Trails (The Ridgeway and the Thames Path) running through the county.


Protection of the county's beautiful countryside, including areas of outstanding natural beauty and green belt will be achieved through the 'Brown before Green' principle.

We know we must deliver more homes and associated infrastructure for our growing population. By managing growth sensibly and responsibly (including identifying appropriate surplus public sector property and actively developing this for market, affordable housing, and key worker housing), we can protect and enhance our natural environment and the benefits it brings. Aylesbury Garden Town is an exciting example: putting green spaces and natural environments at the heart of future development.

### Increasing prosperity

Buckinghamshire is a prosperous county and a successful place to do business, contributing £18 billion to the UK economy and ranked as the fourth most productive area in England.

The county has low unemployment, higher than average household incomes, and boasts world-leading sectors. From Pinewood Studios in the south to Silverstone in the north, Buckinghamshire is a great success story.

We are also well placed to take advantage of emerging opportunities because of our proximity to London and Heathrow, and our location in the middle of a leading economic area with global strengths in science, technology, and high-value manufacturing.

However, the Covid-19 pandemic has impacted this and the national trend shows that high levels of productivity and growth are beginning to slow, and levels of unemployment are rising. Our High Streets have been badly affected and are still facing challenges, including the change in retail habits with increased online demand and falling footfall in Town Centres. Action is needed now to ensure our economy remains fit for the future.



# The next chapter

Reflecting on our achievements for 2022 we can be proud of all that's been achieved. Together with our partners we continue to deliver our ambitions and priorities to make Buckinghamshire the best place in which to live, raise a family, work, and do business.

Buckinghamshire is widely known as an affluent county with great outcomes. However, we know that this overall picture masks some significant variations in outcomes, with some areas experiencing significant hardship. 'Opportunity Bucks - Succeeding for All' provides a framework for bringing partners together to focus our collective resources on tackling those local priorities that will make a difference to the outcomes of residents. Moving forwards we will continue to deliver services and improvements for our residents, whilst addressing significant variations in outcomes and opportunities.

Our commitment to localism is a key strength that we can draw on. We recognise that our communities are distinct places, with their own local sense of identity, and their own definitions of success. Local residents need to be at the core of what we do. In developing levelling up plans, we will work with residents at a local level to ensure that action builds on local strengths and responds to the needs, ambitions and experiences of the specific individual communities.

As part of the new health and care integration arrangements for the Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and Berkshire Integrated Care System, we have worked with partners to establish a place based partnership for Buckinghamshire. Formalising existing informal arrangements, this will assist senior leaders across health and social care to oversee and tackle key strategic issues for health and care integration in Buckinghamshire and support the delivery of the Buckinghamshire Joint Local Health and Wellbeing Strategy. The place based partnership, known as the Buckinghamshire Executive Partnership, will start meeting in April 2023.

In February 2023, Cabinet agreed to establish a Place Based Growth Board which will ensure close working with some of our key partners towards an agreed vision for future economic growth and development in Buckinghamshire. This board will provide a more streamlined and integrated place based growth approach and furthers Buckinghamshire's ambition to lead the way in defining what best in class integration looks like for economic delivery. The areas of strategic focus, each with their own board sitting beneath the Growth Board, are: Place & Regeneration; Opportunity Bucks; Skills; Enterprise & Investment.

As we move to an integrated place based growth model it allows for a strategic review of our approach to economic prosperity across Buckinghamshire in which thematic activity including health, economy and physical environment may be coordinated to best effect. This will include the creation of a pooled investment fund to help catalyse investment linked to agreed priorities and following agreement of our regeneration framework and plans for Aylesbury, Chesham and High Wycombe, we have the foundations to regenerate these key towns within our county.

By using resources wisely, embracing new technology and working in collaboration with our partners we will continue to shape our services around people and communities.

Our local strategic partnerships continue to place us in the best possible position across the whole of Buckinghamshire to co-ordinate a strong response to whatever scenario presents. It means we can adapt quickly to situations and offer a warm welcome to people displaced from their homes through war or other factors, ensuring targeted wrap around support is available to ensuring that refugees are facilitated to set up a new life here in Buckinghamshire.

We want to ensure that all Buckinghamshire residents have the opportunity to succeed in life, to play their part in and share in the success of the county.

### 1. Community Boards 2022-23

- 1.1 This report provides a summary of the work and performance of the Community Boards during 2022-23 through funded projects and engagement work.
- 1.2 The Community Board Annual Report 2022-23 is attached at Appendix A.
- 1.3 During their third year, it is becoming evident the Boards have found their place in their respective areas and have begun working as originally planned, engaging with local communities to identify and deliver change and improvements for residents.
- 1.4 The Boards have made significant progress in collaborating with a wide range of partners and stakeholders through building relationships and networks, the Boards have helped to strengthen their communities and support them in achieving their aspirations.
- 1.5 Relationships with the majority of town and parish councils are good with real partnership working and engagement taking place. Many Board Managers operate from town and parish offices/facilities, ensuring their faces are known and providing opportunities for residents to come and speak with them. They have regular meetings with nearly all town/parishes, with open doors to others who may not have the time or wish to engage at present.

- 1.6 Face-to-face engagement has been made easier this year, with the Boards hosting their own engagement events and attending numerous local events. Through these interactions, the Boards have directly engaged with residents, listened to their concerns, and gained a deeper understanding of local issues. The recent Youth Summit provided a fantastic opportunity to engage with young people and the insight has been shared for Boards to consider locally.
- 1.7 Through engaging with a range of local partners and without providing funding, the Boards have played a crucial role in facilitating activities to improve the local community, including setting up a repair café, tree planting schemes, and a community hub to attract investment and provide facilities for groups. The amount of engagement work is high, and whilst not every piece of engagement can be recorded, a strong list of examples is included in the annual report.
- 1.8 Board's priorities have been aligned to those of the council but at a very local level. These have included improving health and wellbeing, supporting young people, enhancing the environment and communities. Additionally, the Boards have effectively responded to new areas of priority such as addressing the cost of living crisis, supporting Ukraine and Opportunity Bucks.
- 1.9 Three of the Boards cover the ward areas being focused on through the Opportunity Bucks programme. With oversight through the Community Board, Ward Partnerships have been established in these areas and these are identifying key local challenges and issues in these wards. In line with the aims of the Community Boards and the Opportunity Bucks programme, action plans are being developed to address these challenges. For all six Wycombe wards these action plans have been agreed and work has commenced. For the three Aylesbury wards and one Chesham ward work is continuing to develop these plans.
- 1.10 During 2021/22 a review of Community Bards was undertaken which involved a Member Task & Finish Group and a Scrutiny Review, a number of actions were identified which have now been delivered. The changes have seen quicker and clearer decision making across the service, provided stability across the function of the Boards and quicker funding decisions. A successful small grants process was also introduced which has seen much smaller organisations able to deliver Board priorities.
- 1.11 During 2022/23, the Boards begun to move away from what was perceived as grant giving Boards to focus on projects which are identified through the discussions at the Boards. The local priorities are identified through the Boards and a high number of projects to deliver the priorities are now being established and delivered through Board action groups.
- 1.12 Several Boards have taken the opportunity to deliver projects together to bring wider benefits to communities or secure better value for money. For example, the

Growing Hope clinic provided speech and language sessions for non-verbal children across two boards. Several Boards worked together to deliver a virtual dementia tour experience, and there was a lot of joint working on Christmas food hampers and Christmas gifts.

- 1.13 Boards continue to have the flexibility to work as they wish, using action or task/finish groups as required, and each Board works to suit their communities allowing for organic growth under the governance in place.
- 1.14 The overall management of the budgets and performance data has vastly improved, with clear and accurate record keeping. Value for money has continued to be a key challenge to the Boards with all projects over £1k now looking to attract contributory funding. For every £1 of Council money the Boards have been able to generate an average of £1.02 in contributory funding, with some individual Boards attracting over £2 per Council £1.
- 1.15 Whilst the above is important, the unseen added value from engagement work should also be highlighted and there not just be a focus on the project budgets and operational costs. Details of more substantial engagement work are included at the end of the report. Going forward it is important this work is showcased and credited to the Boards, as often it is a local conversation linking the right people together to discuss mutual issues which result in not just change, but ongoing relationships and partnerships.
- 1.16 Many board meetings are taking place in person and directly engaging with partners and residents. Attendance at these meetings is growing, and those attending are made to feel included and provided with an opportunity to ask questions, contribute or offer views and opinions.
- 1.17 With the proposed boundary changes to electoral wards, a review will be undertaken in 2023 to understand the impact of these changes on the Board geographies. The review will also consider the overheads attached to the Boards as well as understanding the social value of the Board's work.

### 2. Other options considered

2.1 Not to produce an annual report. This option doesn't provide the opportunity to reflect and share publicly the work that has been achieved over the last year.

#### **Introduction from Cabinet Member for Communities**

As the Community Boards enter their fourth year, it is evident that they have truly cemented their place in their respective areas and have begun working as originally planned, engaging with local communities to identify and deliver change and improvements for residents.

Working with a wide number of partners and stakeholders, the Boards have continued to make good progress with the Council's priorities. Through building relationships and networks, the Boards have continued to make our communities strong and to support them in their ambitions.

The Boards remain invaluable to the overall delivery of council services and priorities. They are now known in their communities as a place where residents can ask questions, share thoughts and see ideas come to fruition.

Face-to-face engagement has been made easier this year with the Boards being able to hold their own engagement events as well as attending many local events. They have been able to talk directly with residents, listen to their concerns and really understand local matters.

The extensive work being undertaken by the Council on a local level is evident through the impactful initiatives led by the Community Boards.

Through engaging a range of local partners, the Boards have played a crucial role in facilitating activities to improve the local community, including setting up a repair café, tree planting schemes, and a community hub to attract investment and provide facilities for groups looking for somewhere to meet. The Boards have been successful in bringing people and organisations together for discussion and awareness, supporting them to improve their communities themselves, create facilities for people to use and owning the catalyst for change.

I am delighted this year to include details of this engagement work in the report appendix, along with details of funded projects as well.

In supporting the Council's priorities, Board priorities have specifically focussed on improving health and wellbeing, young people, environment, community buildings and spaces and highways. As well, they have effectively delivered new areas of work the Council has prioritised - the cost of living crisis, Ukraine and Opportunity Bucks.

The Boards have worked closely with Helping Hand by supporting the community aspect to cost of living using their local knowledge and understanding of need. There was a fantastic response across the Christmas period to ensure people received food and goods, as well as supporting warm spaces, encouraging people to use them, and ensuring people knew how to access Helping Hand.

The Community Boards responded promptly to the needs of Ukrainian guests staying in the county by championing the Homes for Ukraine scheme and supporting local learning classes, gatherings and events.

The Opportunity Bucks programme comprises three of our Boards, all of which have supported ward visits and are currently establishing ward partnerships to align with the priority to improve the local community and promote residents' achievements.

As detailed in the last annual report, several reviews had identified areas of improvement for the next 12 months and beyond. Most of these improvements have been delivered including a new slimmed down management structure, the introduction of a funding team and improved funding processes. The changes have meant quicker and clearer decision making, and funding decisions have speeded up greatly. A very successful small grants process was also introduced to enable smaller organisations to deliver Board priorities.

Whilst overarching governance remains in place, Boards have the flexibility to work as they wish, using action or task/finish groups as required. Each Board works to suit their communities and allows for organic growth under the governance, making them truly responsive to their communities.

The Boards have continued to understand the need to provide value for money and have leveraged contributory funding to add more value to their community work. This year some 334 projects have received funding, and alongside c£3m of contributory funding has provided for c£4.8m value to Buckinghamshire communities.

Board meetings have also continued to develop and strengthen with many taking place face-to-face engaging directly with partners and residents. Meetings have received presentations from organisations who have received funding for projects or where facilitation and engagement has taken place to deliver a project. It has been inspiring to hear what a difference even a small amount of funding has made to many residents and communities.

The work of the Boards is clearly making an impact locally and bringing improvement to many residents' lives both during their day-to-day lives and leisure time. The small grants enabled very small organisations to work with the Boards to deliver very local priorities and improvements.

We are delighted to have the opportunity to organise the Proud of Bucks Awards for the third year running. This year, the Community Boards took full ownership and responsibility for the awards, and we received an incredible 397 nominations. We are currently in the process of presenting the awards to the deserving winners, and we plan to continue celebrating their achievements in person throughout the early summer.

My thanks go to all the Chairmen, Vice-Chairmen, and Board Managers who have continued to work closely together to deliver the priorities, as well as to the wider Community Board team.

I also extend my appreciation to my fellow Councillors for their involvement in leading action or working groups and supporting the wider engagement work.



#### **Featured projects**

- Quainton Community Heritage Orchard received a small grant to further develop work
  on a field for recreational purposes. The site had been regenerated into a community
  orchard and wildlife area in 2021 when the project was originally inspired by a discussion
  about the importance of Pocket Parks at the Haddenham & Waddesdon Community
  Board working group. Funding allowed for the purchase of a strimmer, accessible
  benches and a mixture of fruit trees. To mark this focal point, the local community has
  resurrected an old tradition and recently held its annual Wassailing event on the site.
- Supported by North West Chilterns Community Board, the Chiltern Conservation Board applied for funding to deliver specific hedgerow projects across three farms. The project will deliver many environmental objectives, which include a greater area of wildlife rich habitat, an increase in biodiversity and more carbon will be stored and/or sequestered. The project will also support farmers to encourage sustainable economic growth, and to maximise opportunities, through helping them to access additional resources for longer-term funding such as Countryside Stewardship schemes and upskilling farmers in practical land management.
- The Lace Hill Fruit Orchard was organised by the Lace Hill Residents Association in partnership with Buckingham Town Council, with funding from the Buckingham & Village Community Board. It involved the planting of several fruit trees on an open space field in the Lace Hill estate. The fruit will be available to the public for free and the maintenance will be carried out by the local residents association and volunteers living on the estate. The official launch was attended by Greg Smith MP and students from Lace Hill Academy.

- Schools eco project Chesham & Villages Community Board devised its own workshop on climate change and the environment for local schools. Pupils (Years 4, 5 & 6) were tasked with creating their own Eco-Charters, a set of promises they can stick to at school, home and in the community. The Eco-Charters were then presented to a panel, along with TV adverts, role-plays, and leaflets.
- Grow Wilder Aylesbury Community Board has been working with Oak Green School to explore opportunities to redevelop their green spaces to benefit the environment and provide education and skills opportunities for young people. Collaborative conversations were held on site to explore opportunities. BBOWT and Feedback Global were identified as key partners. Both partners have developed the Grow Wilder project to work with Year 5 students to provide environmental education to enable them to co-design each identified space and present back to the board- with a view that the winning idea will be implemented. A small grant has been allocated to enable this activity.
- Missendens Community Board funded a schools competition on the theme of 'Bee and Bug Friendly Gardens'. To facilitate the building of the winning gardens, the Board has linked up the organiser with the Walled Garden, a charity in Great Missenden who work with young people with learning disabilities, training them in horticulture and giving them experience of work, usually within the community. The charity will now undertake the building of the winning gardens, giving these young people additional and a different experience of working in the community.

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#### **Improving our Environment**

The number of highways projects funded this year is lower than usual. This due to a change in contractor in April 2024 and the existing contractor being able to complete projects, or complete to a suitable stage for handover.

Several projects were identified during the year and will be taken forward for consideration during 2023/24 with the new contractor.

The new contract will see a new way of working which will look at the root cause of issues and applying measures for a 12 month period before proceeding with an improvement scheme.

A dangerous crossroad in Longwick was highlighted by the Parish Council.
 It was agreed with Transport for Bucks to implement red high friction surfacing and install an 'Advanced Give Way' sign on its approach to the A4129 Thame Road.

 Funded by North West Chilterns Community Board, this provides a visible cue to motorists of the approaching junction and an improved surface to break on.

In addition, on the approach to this junction, the existing 30mph signs were replaced with yellow backed signs and dragons teeth road markings were also installed at the 30mph limit location.

 In a response to accessibility concerns for residents with mobility requirements, the Aylesbury Community Board sought local views on where dropped kerbs were required across the whole Community Board area. Funding was allocated for the installation of 10 pairs of dropped kerbs. The work was completed in February 2023.

- Working together, Beeches Community Board and Farnham Royal Parish Council funded TfB to design and construct an extension to the footway on Blackpond Lane to address local concerns and improve pedestrian safety.
- Brookmead School Road Safety was a large scheme, put together and jointly funded by two parishes and Wing and Ivinghoe Community Board to improve safety to the school drop off area, which is on a main road through their villages. The scheme introduced several new traffic calming measures and saw the use of pencil bollards being installed. This design reinforces to drivers that the area is heavily used by children/families.

#### **Projects achieved through engagement**

- Engagement between North West Chilterns Community Board with Thames Valley
  Police and Transport for Bucks arranged for regular speed enforcement by Thames
  Valley Police and an alternative way for TfB to deliver a new MVAS post on Cockpit
  Road, Great Kingshill due to speeding on the road.
- North West Chilterns Community Board engaged with Buckinghamshire Council to develop a North West Chilterns Cycling & Walking Plan which details the aspirations for the North West Chilterns. This will support and add significant value to the Council's countywide strategic LCWIP, by describing the opportunities and problems at a local detailed level in the area. This document was developed by the Board's Transport and Road Issues Action Group, at no cost, and is currently out in the Board area for consultation.

- The tree planting project in Knotty Green is a great example of how the **Beaconsfield**& Chepping Wye Community Board supported and worked with the community,
  the local parish council, and other BC services including the environment and climate
  team, highways and licensing. A small group of residents, both older and younger, from
  two streets in Knotty Green came together and planted 73 trees in their two roads
  and have taken 'ownership' the trees. The aim was not only to make the roads more
  aesthetically pleasing, but to improve air quality. This joined-up way of working has
  strengthened relations between the Community Board, residents and Parish Council.
  This is the first example of a group carrying out this type of project with support from
  Community Boards.
- Local residents and groups within the North West Chilterns Community Board
  Transport and Road Issues Action Group, requested support to implement air quality
  monitoring to collect baseline data in Princes Risborough, before the construction of the
  relief road and new housing developments. This would enable air quality comparisons
  before, during and after the work is completed. Regular meetings were held with the
  council who agreed to complete this work for the Board.
- The Colne Valley Regional Park is a resource for local residents but there are threats to the integrity and sustainability from HS2 and Heathrow expansion, potentially two motorway service areas, several data centres, warehousing and Slough Green Belt released for housing. The **Denham, Gerrards Cross & Chalfonts Community Board** Chairman attended a meeting to discuss these threats, along with Joy Morrisey MP, Boris Johnson MP, Lord Randall and local Buckinghamshire Councillors.



#### **Featured projects**

- The Risborough Area Community Bus (RACB) has provided much needed transport
  to the elderly, particularly those without their own transport and brought footfall and
  income to the town centre. Post covid restrictions saw passenger numbers drop
  affecting the viability of the bus and also the town centre. North West Chilterns
  Community Board supported a social media campaign to increase awareness,
  attract younger passengers and encourage people to leave their car at home. As a result,
  RACB has seen an increase in usage and new passengers.
- The monthly Artisan Market in Old Amersham has proven to be a huge success so far and Amersham & Villages Board were delighted to have been able to support its set-up. The market not only supports all locally based traders but also brings the community together on a regular basis to enjoy the historic market town.
- High Wycombe Community Board supported Shopmobility Scoot Further to purchase portable scooters to meet the needs of existing and new Shopmobility customers to enable them to go on overnight trips and attend appointments outside the town centre. During the first six months the scooters have generated £900 income which has almost covered the cost of one scooter, and have been hired out for 93 days to 18 individuals for family holidays, visiting craft fairs, music events and local visitor attractions and supporting family members visiting in the High Wycombe area.


#### **Increasing Prosperity**

#### Projects achieved through engagement

- Repair Café set up by the High Wycombe Community Board Environment and Climate Change action group. The project was delivered by volunteers for just over a year with All Saints Church providing the venue free of charge. No funding was required from the Community Board, but they worked with the Council's waste team who covered the cost of insurance and a toolkit.
- Wendover and Villages Community Board Health and Wellbeing Action Group, through working with Public Health, identified a high percentage of individuals with cardio-vascular problems and that a SmokeFree Playground initiative may help. Stoke Mandeville Parish Council offered their parish owned playgrounds to be part of this project and the Community Board Manager engaged directly with the local school to discuss the initiative and a poster competition idea. Over 50 designs were received followed by an awards ceremony. Runner-up designs were part of the social media campaign, displayed on Facebook and Instagram. The winning designs were made into signs and are now proudly installed and displayed at Eskdale Park, Stoke Mandeville.

This was a great example of working with the service area, parish, local school and Councillors to deliver something for the local community that they can relate to as their children and families have been involved and can physically see the outcome.

#### **Featured projects**

- The village of Cuddington had outdated and inaccessible play equipment at the heart of the village. Parents asked for more age appropriate and accessible equipment. The Haddenham & Waddesdon Community Board helped fund new weather resistant equipment and flooring for the playground.
- Chesham & Villages Community Board collaborated with Mama Bee on a
  detached youth project aimed at addressing the needs of young people. A report
  highlighted challenges facing young people and proposed proactive solutions. The
  recommendation was to trial a pop-up youth cafe in Chesham. The cafe will be a safe
  and supportive space for young people to engage in open discussions on important
  topics such as education, healthy relationships, drugs, money etc.
- Helping vulnerable and at-risk young people was a priority for Winslow & Villages
   Community Board and they supported a project delivered by Action4Youth through
   mentoring, outdoor education, and group sessions with the aim of reducing gang
   and knife crime.
- Chesham & Villages Community Board works closely with the Chesham Youth Council to ensure that the voices and perspectives of young people in the community are heard. This includes regular discussions with the Youth Council to understand what matters to them and how CVCB can work with them to produce the best outcomes.

Last year, CVCB gave them the opportunity to run their own youth awards, empowering them to take a leading role in promoting the interests and achievements of young people in the community.





Collaboration with Mama Bee

- Amersham & Villages Community Board launched the Bright Ideas Competition
  for local schools, giving pupils from reception age up to sixth form the opportunity to
  think creatively about a project that the school could deliver within a budget of up to
  £1,500 to meet local priorities and make a difference to the wider community.
  Since launch, the Board have been busy visiting schools across the area to talk to
  them about the competition.
- High Wycombe and North West Chilterns Community Boards funded the first Growing Hope High Wycombe clinic providing free therapy for children and young people with additional needs. Parents of children with additional needs can feel isolated and overwhelmed and Growing Hope provides speech and language and occupational therapy. Children have come in completely non-verbal and by the end of their sessions have been able to start using words and communicating their needs.
- North West Chilterns Board awarded funding to Active in the Community to run
  their "Forever Cycling" sessions in six venues across the North West Chilterns, a
  programme which aims to get older adults physically, mentally and socially active by
  combining a cycling element, using floor pedals, with a virtual route projected onto
  a screen. The project addresses social isolation and develops healthier lifestyles to
  improve mental wellbeing and strengthen a sense of community among participants,
  particularly among older residents.
- The **Wexham and Ivers Community Board** supported 1st Iver Heath Scouts to make their hut a flexible and usable space for scout activities. It included a paved area to the rear of the hut with firepits built into the area, and an area bordering the village hall car park was extended to create a ramp to access the firepit area.

- Denham, Gerrards Cross and the Chalfonts Community Board supported and
  attended a Silver Sunday event, held in Denham Garden Village, a development of
  retirement apartments, houses and bungalows situated in south Buckinghamshire.
  Silver Sunday is a national event, designed to celebrate older people's lives, to bring
  people together, to enjoy each other's company and to make new friends. The event
  was organised by and for all residents, was free and provided a variety of entertainment
  along with afternoon tea. Around 200 people attended the event across the weekend.
- High Wycombe and North West Chilterns Community Boards funded the expansion
  of the Wycombe Mind Free Space project for 30 individuals and families.
  Social workers and NHS Mental Health teams refer clients to the hoarding support
  service and support workers use a person-centred approach to assist with the practical
  and emotional consequences of hoarding and neglect of homes and gardens.
  The holistic support approach results in sustainable improvements to the person's
  mental health and living conditions and reduces health and safety risks and
  maintenance requirements in homes.
- High Wycombe Community Board supported Chiltern Rangers working in partnership
  with the Stroke Unit at Wycombe Hospital in creating a tranquil garden area for rest,
  recouperation and relaxtion for residents, as well as for friends and patients who may
  be offering support or visiting family and friends who may be receiving treatment.
  Many ex-patients, residents, community groups, businesses and hospital staff have
  donated furniture and garden equipment to support the garden and hospital staff
  prepared the garden in their own time in spring ready for the year ahead.

- Wing & Ivinghoe Community Board supported Slapton in their recreation ground improvements. This included park surface changes to meet safety regulations and cutting back overgrowth. The main part of the project was the installation of outdoor exercise equipment. In addition to a big rig, there is also apparatus that is accessible to wheelchair users. This has opened up opportunities to further develop the area and they are now going to install a walk/run track to surround the recreation park which will offer an accessible route, which can be measured should residents wish to use it as part of their exercise routines. It also allows for families/individuals to access the area at all times of the year.
- Black Park Model Boat Club is a friendly, non-competitive club, with membership open to all ages and abilities. The club covers all aspects of model boating, ranging from yachts to scale models on an informal basis. Interested non-members are also encouraged to turn up and try out the hobby using the club's "Have A Go" boats which are used to raise money for charity. Wexham and Ivers Community Board provided funding to refurbish the club's six radio-controlled "Have A Go" boats, which were constructed over 30 years ago by members. The boats are essential to the promotion of the club and require complete refurbishment to make them reliable enough to be used more frequently and consistently by members of the public.
- Covid highlighted the need for Oakley to have its own village store and café, having
  nowhere for local residents to go without travelling. A project was set up to establish a
  Community Benefit Society. With over 190 members the project is nearing completion
  and volunteers and local suppliers are being sought. Haddenham & Waddesdon
  Board were proud to offer funding towards the start-up costs of the project.

- After the success of last year's event, Beeches Community Board collaborated with South West Chilterns, North West Chilterns and Beaconsfield & Chepping Wye Community Boards to deliver the Virtual Dementia Tour experience. Designed to provide an immersive experience of what the challenges of dementia can feel like, it gave dozens of residents and representatives of local organisations an opportunity to not only take part in the session but also to meet others impacted by dementia or working to improve the lives of those living with it. In addition, Beeches Community Board worked with Wexham & The Ivers Community Board to provide seed funding towards new dementia friendly seated exercise sessions in Stoke Poges and Iver, which have successfully provided healthy, tailored activities along with opportunities for social interaction.
- North Bucks Breathe Easy Group were awarded funding from Winslow & Villages
  Community Board to run Pulmonary Rehab Maintenance Exercise Classes, aimed
  at people who have recently completed sessions with the local respiratory team.
  Feedback from a participant: "The classes are beneficial to me for several reasons.
  It makes me breathe easier, has helped me to walk further. To exercise is to strengthen
  my whole body, easier to climb stairs, to garden to do housework. I can actually walk
  further, may take time to get there, but without these exercises I wouldn't be able to
  achieve most of these things. Plus meeting other people in a similar situation, we help
  each other."

- Chesham & Villages Community Board provided funding to the Chesham Society
  who are launching a visitor/tourism website for Chesham and Villages in Spring 2023.
  The website will promote the rural villages such as The Lee, Cholesbury, and Ashley
  Green. It will highlight the country walks, places of interest, local pubs and cafes.
  The website is a co-production project with the Community Board as there will be a
  section of the site dedicated to the Board to promote activity and engagement.
- Bourne End Junior Sports Club sits in the heart of the community and provides a
  facility that benefits the local area and for people of all ages, both young and old.
  The lighting affected the health and safety of those attending and prevented many
  activities from operating. South West Chilterns Community Board provided funding
  towards the new lighting. The replacement lighting has been installed and the club
  continues to use the facilities, including the pupils from the adjoining Bourne End
  Academy.
- The Lady Ryder Memorial Garden is a secret haven enclosed by a brick wall providing endless opportunities of support for anyone with special needs, mental health issues or just someone wanting to make a difference volunteering to restore the area back to its former glory. The all abilities garden was designed and created with the support of South West Chilterns Community Board. Through action group networking and having an understanding of what materials were required, the Board was able to link the applicant up with a building firm who provided the materials at a cost saving thousands of pounds.

- Winslow and District Fishing Club were awarded funding from Winslow & Villages Community Board to purchase equipment that will enable them to keep the lake clear from weeds and to help control lilies. A water quality meter has been installed to enable monitoring of the oxygen level in the water, so they know exactly when to use the water pump to increase the oxygen and thereby protect the fish in the lake, an increasing necessity due to global warming. The lake is open for all the public to access and there are benches to encourage walks or people can sit and enjoy. The Club also host non-members using the water for a charity competition in aid of "Help for Heroes".
- Buckingham and Villages Community Board were pleased to support the Buckingham Swan Trail, a temporary public sculpture project which will take place throughout the summer holidays of 2023. Buckingham Town Council will collaborate with local schools, artists, groups, businesses, and organisations by helping them design, paint and sponsor a swan sculpture. The aim is to increase footfall in the town centre through the exploration of the Buckingham town's heritage.

- All Saints Church is restoring the churchyard as a place to remember through the care and conservation of historic tombstones and monuments, as well as making a safe, clean and welcoming place for visitors. It will include social spaces, spaces for remembrance, and spaces where wildlife and biodiversity can be encouraged through the creation of a green space, combining architecture, history, landscape, and wildlife, which will complement both the natural and historic environment of the town. The High Wycombe Community Board funding contributed to a substantial project which will have a positive impact on the town centre appearance and improved access for the community.
- Wing & Ivinghoe Community Board supported the Whistle Brook renovation and clearance project. This involved clearance of dead hedgerow/trees and litter to open up the brook between Pitstone and Ivinghoe, offering opportunities for regrowth and improved biodiversity in the area. The school will be maintaining the area as things progress and there will be scope for environmental projects to take place here.
- Beaconsfield & Chepping Wye Community Board worked with Beaconsfield Town
  Council, Chiltern Rangers and local volunteers to create a Community Garden for all
  at the Ivins Road allotments in Holtspur. This Community Garden is used by the local
  community who can come and relax and enjoy the garden. The Community Garden
  benefits those who are socially isolated and lonely, those who do not have an outdoor
  space to garden, the disabled and school groups and gardening/older groups, and is
  a great way for people to skill-share.

Prestwood Colts and Girls Football Club applied to Missendens Community Board
for funding to convert some of the unused changing room space into a kitchen
allowing them to open a café for everyone. Alongside fundraising, the café will provide
a steady income to replace equipment and families less able to afford fees and kit.

The Club has around 220 players aged 5 to 16 with the younger age groups at full capacity, supported by a great network of volunteers. As Great Missenden football closed their services to younger age groups, Prestwood Colts have taken an influx of those children and given them the opportunity to play grass roots football. Over 36 dads volunteer every Saturday and Sunday as coaches and 10 committee members also volunteer to assist with running the club, including maintenance, finance, purchasing, fixtures, welfare officer etc.

• Missendens Community Board commissioned a youth survey with the creation of podcasts by young people for young people being put forward. The Community Board funded a radio presenter training day, delivered by two experienced and award winning radio presenters on BFBS, the Forces' Station. The day was a great success with the young people learning interview and research skills, and some mock interviews. There are already plans to open an after school space for young people and a link with the Misbourne School is being developed for the creation of 'Ted Talk' style podcasts.

#### Projects achieved through engagement

- After a community presentation, Beeches Community Board was approached about a new local partnership seeking to provide employment advice and opportunities to pupils with special educational needs. An invitation to address a Board action group led to a range of offers of support, including from an Ambassador from one local school and the Chair of Governors of another, and a link with Buckinghamshire Business First which generated a meeting for the partnership with a local employers group.
- Wendover and Villages Community Board worked with Wendover Youth Centre who delivered two youth festivals during the summer of 2022, alongside running workshops to provide opportunities for young people to continue their engagement through activities they want to do. The project consisted of two youth festivals and summer workshops in art, baking, gardening and music as well as football sessions. The projects engaged with a total of 368 young people with an average age of 13 from the HP22 postcode area.
- A Teddy Bears' Picnic and Storytime was run by Ivers Hive. It was a free activity for children and their parents, and provided an opportunity to gather for story time, to colour, and to win a teddy bear from the Wexham & Ivers Community Board.
   The Board took the opportunity to discuss what priorities parents were interested in for their area.

- Chesham & Villages Community Board meets regularly with the six parishes through the Villages Forum meeting. This forum provides an opportunity for the parishes to work together, collaborate on ideas, and receive regular updates and presentations from different services within the Council. The Villages Forum is an important platform for fostering collaboration and cooperation between the Community Board, the parishes, and the Council, and is critical to the success of the Board.
- Wexham & Ivers Community Board attended an evening at Iver Environment Centre.
   There was a small event to showcase the centre to members of the Board who had previously awarded the centre funding for restoration of their bridge, but wanted to show the educational facilities for those with extra needs.
- Amersham & Villages Community Board linked a local restaurant looking to give back to the community with Community Impact Bucks to set up a new lunch club.
- A health and wellbeing event organised by Haddenham and Waddesdon Community
  Board brought partners and the local community together. Outcomes included Simply
  Walks identifying a new walk, Haddenham car club gained volunteer drivers, the
  Family Information Service engaged with a young family in crisis, and Bucks Fire &
  Rescue received referrals to their 80+ fire safety check service.

#### **Featured projects**

- The North West Chilterns Board were proud to support the Princes Risborough Charity who provided 91 Christmas hampers, which included both basic and luxury food items, to individuals, couples and families that had been identified as being in need in the town of Princes Risborough and the surrounding area. This project brought together many local organisations to provide additional support to those in need and contributed to the overall resilience of the local community, including signposting additional resources to people most at need.
- The Amersham & Villages Community Board partnered with the Denham, Gerrards Cross & Chalfonts, Missendens, Beaconsfield and Chesham Community Boards as well as Helping Hand, in supporting the King's Church Christmas Lunch Hamper Project. They provided 221 hampers and delivered them across the region helping to make Christmas Day lunch that bit more special for over 700 people. As an extra this year the King's Church also provided 240 stockings with 3360 items. All the toys were donated from a local retailer and another provided the stockings.
- Following on from the success of St Thomas' Church 'food larder' during the pandemic, it was recognised that there was an ongoing desire to continue to be a resource for the people of Beaconsfield. This culminated in plans for the buildings of St Thomas' to be accessible seven days a week by opening a café at the back of the church to become the heart and hub of the community. Beaconsfield & Chepping Wye Community Board funding supported this development, and now called the Dove Café, is a successful hub that supports local groups and projects and has a wonderful bank of volunteers. The Community Board continues to work closely with the Dove Café, supporting non-funded projects, as well as those supported through funding.

#### Projects achieved through engagement

- North West Chilterns Community Board linked together Helping Hand and Princes Risborough Charity and they delivered a project which provided hot meal vouchers for those struggling during the cost of living crisis.
- Chesham & Villages Community Board has been collaborating with the Chesham
  Asian Welfare Society and the Mayor of Chesham to expand the reach of the
  Welcoming Spaces initiative, providing much-needed support to the community
  during the winter months.
- Beeches Community Board was very pleased to provide funding towards Burnham
  Beeches Rotary Club's Christmas Parcels project. Working with five local schools and
  the Burnham Care & Share foodbank to identify those in need, the project delivered
  317 parcels to families in the Farnhams and Burnham area. As well as food and
  Christmas treats, the parcels included educational resources and information about
  sources of support.
- Supported by the Buckingham & Village Community Board, the Westbury
  Welcoming Space has been set up to allow local residents to come and have a
  warm and welcoming place of refuge during the cost of living crisis. Not only does it
  provide a warm space but also provides social opportunities through activities such
  as board games.

- South West Chilterns Board discussed a community fridge with Lane End Youth &
  Community Centre. This led on to further ideas which would involve collaborative
  working with other council services and outside providers. They linked in with the
  Helping Hand team to establish the community fridge and signposting to the local
  senior social prescriber so the centre can extend their service offer to other areas.
- Wing & Ivinghoe Community Board provided a small grant to Wing market to
  provide meal boxes for families to collect with a voucher from their children's centre.
  The first recipe was a scotch broth and all packs were successfully distributed.
  This project was a pilot scheme due to the cost of living crisis. A Board member
  co-ordinated with the fruit and veg stallholders to complete the pilot, and from
  learning and feedback the Board will be able to identify opportunities for the future
  where cost of living continues to impact on the lives of local people.

Supporting the county's Ukraine guests has been important to the Boards as well. Whilst funding for events has in the main been from the Council's support for Ukraine fund, Community Boards have also played their part.

North West Chilterns Community Board linked up Ukraine to Chilterns with the
Council's Ukraine support team who funded Christmas gifts to Ukrainian children
in the Chilterns area. The project aimed to bring people together and celebrate
community cohesion after almost a year of displacement and trauma for these
families. Christmas presents included toys, cookie kits, coloured pencils and colouring
books, slipper socks and toiletries for 78 Ukrainian children, aged 1-17.

- Wexham and Ivers Community Board worked with the Mehiel Foundation & The
  Ivers Hive on the Christmas Sacks of Hope project. The project supported families identified via the Ivers Hive and schools through the provision of healthy food (such
  as fruit and vegetables), as well as other items (biscuits, custard, washing up liquid).
  A supermarket voucher was also included to cover the cost of purchasing meat for
  Christmas Day. The aim was that by distributing Christmas Sacks of Hope to families
  experiencing financial hardship, the project would alleviate some of the worry of being
  able to afford food over the festive period.
- Chesham & Villages Community Board demonstrated their responsiveness and
  commitment to supporting the Ukrainian community by quickly reacting to the
  implementation of the Homes for Ukraine scheme in Spring 2022. They offered
  assistance to set up two support groups the Chiltern Sunflower, serving central
  Chesham, and the Hilltops Ukrainian Support Group for the villages. These support
  groups provide crucial support and resources for members of the Ukrainian
  community and demonstrate the Board's commitment to promoting inclusivity
  within the community, and support for the Ukrainian guests.
- Amersham & Villages Community Board also held a welcome event for Ukraine guests and their hosts, to provide information from services such as Bucks Adult Learning, Universal Credit, and the Family Information Service.

#### **Community Board Engagement Activity**

Following the pandemic and various covid restrictions, this year saw the Boards to really get into their communities to meet people face to face, have valuable discussions and gain better insight.

Community Boards held their own engagement events to connect with partners and stakeholders, but also to engage with members of the public to promote the Boards, explain how they can get involved and check out what they see as the priorities for their local areas.

- Amersham & Villages Community Board invited key partners along to the local artisan market to share their gazebo and promote their services (Social Prescribers from Mid-Chiltern PCN and Thames Valley Neighbourhood Policing team).
- Aylesbury Community Board and Wendover & Villages Community Board have held a monthly engagement stall in Hale Leys shopping centre to talk to residents and understand their views about where they live. Residents have shared many views including about travelling around the area to support the Board's work around Active Travel. Residents were encouraged to hang a t-shirt on a washing line to share changes they have made to support themselves and their families with the cost of living.

 South West Chilterns Community Board community engagement event celebrated work supported by the Board, the success of local businesses, volunteer engagement and community initiatives.



The Community Boards were very honoured to deliver the Council's Proud of Bucks Awards for a third year. The awards were kindly sponsored again by the Clare Foundation and provided an opportunity for each Board to celebrate those who go the extra mile for their community.

This year a small team from the Boards and communications designed and delivered the awards which saw some 397 nominations, 46 winners and 48 commended.

There were some fantastic nominations and the awards recognised people and organisations across Buckinghamshire who have made a positive impact on their local area.

With so many exceptional and worthy nominations, judging was a tough job for the Boards. Whilst not everyone can win it was inspirational to read how many people are going above and beyond to help others, so it is very pleasing to see some many people formally commended.

The awards will be presented from April onwards at events organised by each Board and celebrated in the community.

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## The next steps

As the Community Boards continue to undertake great work, deliver very local change and make a positive impact locally, there is still work to do to further embed their role but also to continue to respond to the cost of living crisis, Ukraine and Opportunity Bucks.

This year will also see a focus on the Boards operating as a partnership and developing priorities to improve local place, moving away from some current views of the Boards being grant givers. Now is the time for the Boards to begin to shape their place and for the funding aspect to be a minority activity in what they do.

Alongside this, there will be an ongoing drive to increase the amount of contributory funding the Boards generate when funding projects. It is important this continues to increase to provide value for money where projects are funded, but also to add value across all communities from these projects. This will include delivery partners being encouraged to secure funding from other sources available to them.

Face to face engagement and facilitation has increased greatly this year and is evidenced in the appendix at the end of this report. Much of this work is often unseen with focus on funded projects and contributory funding. The Boards will build on this aspect of work to deliver their priorities and improving the local place.

The Boards will continue to respond to key priorities such as cost of living and Ukraine, as well as delivery of the Opportunity Bucks programme.

After the late start due to covid and various changes required, it's important the Boards are now able to have a good period of time to embed and grow their value. Relationships with key stakeholders, particularly town and parish councils and the VCSE, are further developed, and this is now the opportunity to work more closely together for our communities.

This year will see the new the highways contract come into place, with new processes and ways of working which will need to be embedded with the Boards. This will see a root cause and action solution approach in the first instance, before finances are sought, as well as a menu of off-the-shelf projects Boards may wish to consider.

During the year a review will take place to consider how the Boards operate and costs to ensure there is value for money. The review will also consider whether the geographical boundaries are still appropriate given proposed changes by the Boundary Commission.

It's important the Community Board work is seen as widely as possible, so focus will take place on ensuring their contributions are shown through branding (where appropriate) and through social media and other communications with residents and partners.

2023-24 will continue to build on the success of the Board work undertaken so far and ensure they remain the local face of the council.

### 1. Executive summary
