1 The Chairman's Welcome

The Chairman, Councillor Mark Turner, welcomed everyone to the South West Chilterns Community Board and thanked The Methodist Church for the use as the venue.

As the new Chairman, Councillor Turner thanked Councillor Dominic Barnes who Chaired the Board from the beginning back in April 2020 along with Councillor Neil Marshall who was Vice Chairman. Cllr Turner thanked them both for the excellent work they had done in shaping the Community Board through its infancy.

The Chairman also introduced Councillor Carol Heap, Vice Chairman for the Community Board and stated that Carol brought a wealth of knowledge and experience and continued to chair the Community Engagement Action Group.

South West Chilterns Community Board was the local link between the council and the community and was there to take action on local issues. The theme of this meeting was on the local Environment.

Community boards were a way for us to work together to make a difference on the

things that mattered to the local area, with money to support local projects and ideas. Everyone was welcome and the Chairman stated that the community board was there to work together as communities did to make South West Chilterns a great place to live and work.

Representatives from Buckinghamshire Councillors, town council and parish councils and some statutory partners were in attendance and the Chairman stated he welcomed engagement from local business and community groups, and that he was pleased to have a number of local residents joining the meeting. The Chairman looked forward to the Board membership continuing to grow as the community board was promoted within the area.

The Chairman also welcomed Wendy Morgan-Brown, Head of Community Boards for Buckinghamshire Council.

4 Notes of the last meeting

The minutes of the meeting held on 8 February 2023 were agreed as an accurate record.

5 Marlow Flood Fayre

Presentation attached.

The presentation provided an overview of the research project underway which was looking at how flood water could be managed, it currently had 3.5 years left to run. Nationally there was a lack of data and investment, and little information to inform planning applications.

The project would support the development of national guidance and develop new ways of monitoring flood water levels. It would also consider the health impact on those affected by flooding.

It was confirmed the project was not being extended outside Marlow eg. to Medmenham or other surrounding villages, it did, however, cross over into various counties around Buckinghamshire.

This particular project would not offer solutions to current problems e.g., ground and surface water flooding but it could go into pilot work around housing. It was

suggested for current problems likely to need pumps, the Marlow Flood Fayre may be able to help with advice and finance options.

Marlow Flood Fayre was taking place, flood Fayres would be held on 19 and 20 September 2023 at Court Garden House and would include relevant partners and the mobile flood unit.

6 Eco Smart Show

Presentation attached.

A trade show for home owners was being arranged for 18 November 2023 at Court Garden. The show would exhibit changes householders could make to their home to improve their environmental outputs e.g., retrofit assessment, fabric insulation, efficient glazing, solar PV, home batteries, EV charging, heat pumps, mechanical ventilation, architectural design, smart energy management, infrared heat, time-of-use electricity tariffs, and eco-efficient appliances. Some 20 exhibitors were anticipated.

The show was aimed at householders within 10 miles of Marlow.

7 The Environment through Buckinghamshire Council's Eyes

Presentation attached.

An overview was provided of the current air quality monitor arrangements which mainly related to nitrogen oxide levels. The Council's air quality report to DEFRA should be available within the next few weeks.

The presentation covered the campaign and air quality project currently underway in conjunction with the Community Boards, which was being provided through a government grant. Monitoring levels were recorded on a national database so comparisons could be made.

The current action plan was going to be revoked and replaced with a more challenging plan which covered both climate and air pollution. The current plan aimed for readings below 40, the new plan would be below 36. Levels in Marlow have been worse in 22 cases.

The monitor currently sited at Holy Trinity School, Marlow, was working as anticipated taking account of prevailing winds to capture the pollution. It was hoped local community champions could be found to support further roll out of the project. Anyone interested to contact the Community Board.

The Travel to School and Parking teams were also available to help support changes in behaviour around schools, particularly at drop off/pick-up times.

8 Bourne End Academy Garden Project

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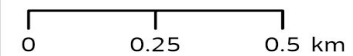
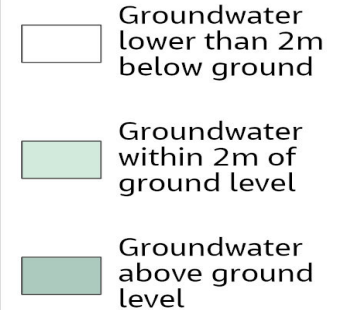
Flood Risk Maps



GIS GERMS Maximum Groundwater Depth (m)

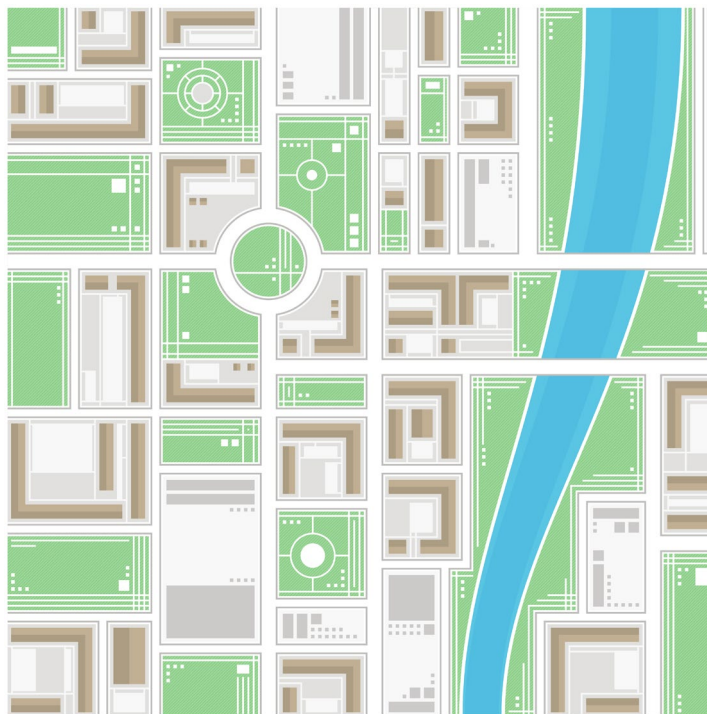


Groundwater Depth Below Ground Level

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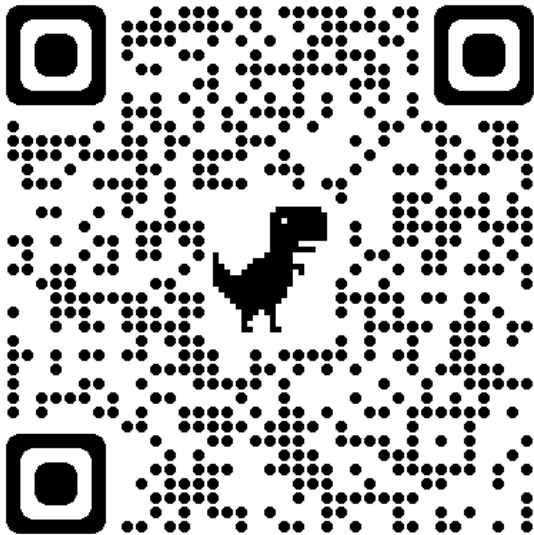

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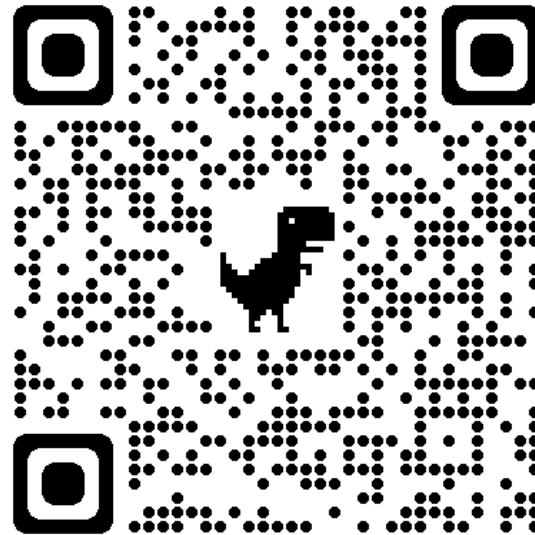

Smart Energy Show

Marlow Energy Group's plans for the Smart Energy Show

- The Smart Energy Show showcases smarter, more efficient, greener household energy
- Its goal is to stimulate as many people as possible to invest or make practical changes.
- The event rationale is that 17% of UK GHG emissions are from domestic space heating & hot water. Domestic appliances & lighting add to this.
- The show is called “smart” energy, not “eco” or “green” to emphasise people’s agency and personal as well as planetary benefits of acting. The strapline is cut bills, boost comfort, fight climate change.
- The show is aimed primarily at households; but also business.
- Location: Shelley Theatre in Court Garden Leisure Centre
- There’s a big opportunity to do the show in Bucks. Many changes require investment, and in Beaconsfield constituency household income is 34% above the GB average and 70% of the population is ABC1 vs GB 54%. Also, 15% of homes in Bucks are not on the gas grid so likely have an even stronger financial case to engage.
- There’s a big need to do the show in Buckinghamshire because domestic emissions are high. In Marlow average per-household electricity use is one-third higher than across England, and gas use two-fifths higher.
- We aim to attract households from the region, not just Marlow. This can drive higher visitor numbers, enabling a larger, better show for Marlovians while maximising overall impact..
- The target is 500 visitors over a full day. Quite ambitious. Though room capacity is greater. There is space for 20 exhibitors. Aiming for a broad spread of technologies to show visitors there are many more options than they probably realise.
- Key provider specialisms aiming to represent are retrofit assessment, fabric insulation, efficient glazing, solar PV, home batteries, EV charging, heat pumps, mechanical ventilation, architectural design, smart energy management, infrared heat, time-of-use electricity tariffs, and eco-efficient appliances.
- Financing is part grant funding and part commercial income. Confirmed grants from MET & TTM, and preparing requests to SWCCB & MTC.
- Buckinghamshire’s climate team is providing practical support, and we’re expecting Buckinghamshire “Energy Doctors” to take a stand.

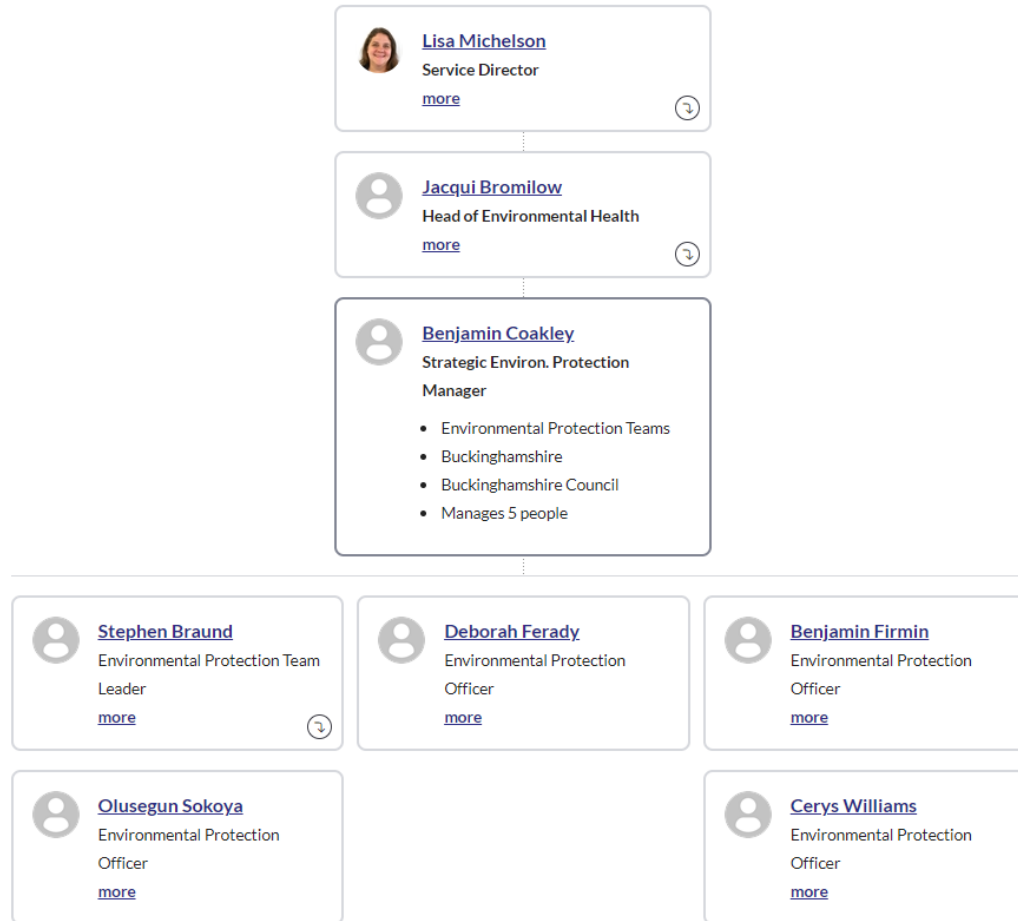

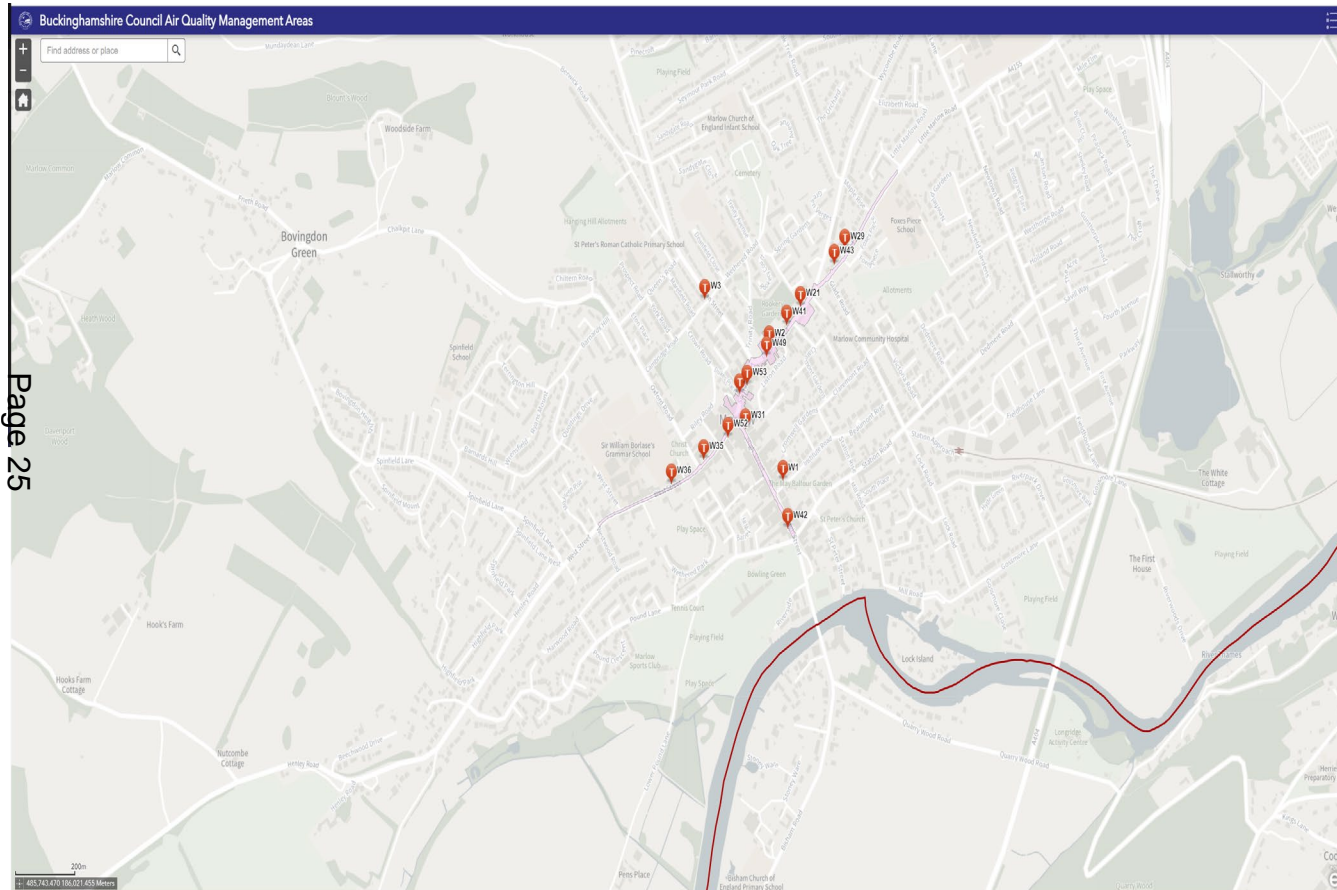


NO₂ Diffusion Tube

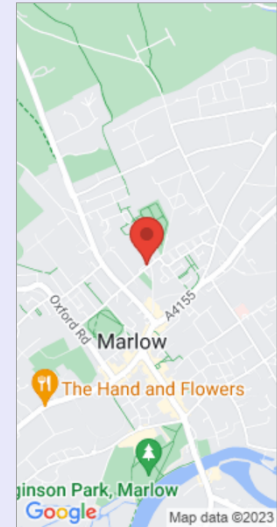

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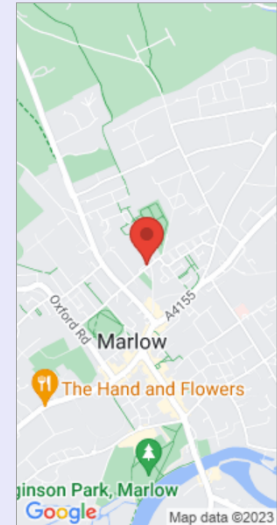
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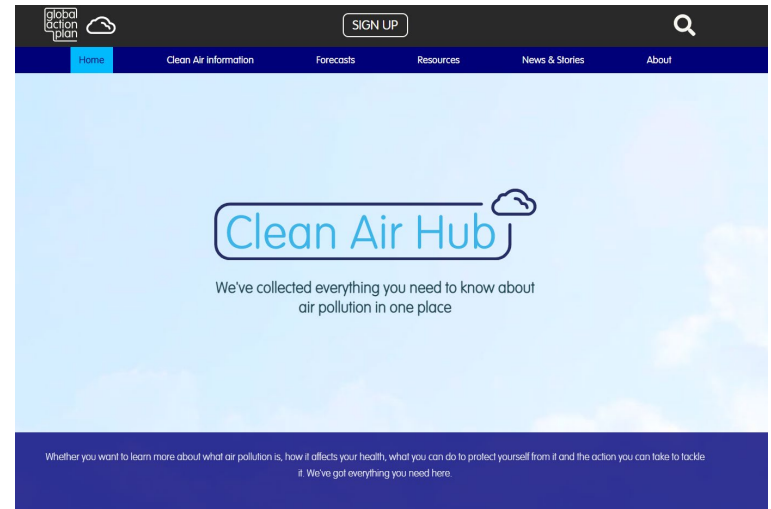

- In March 2020 we started a BEA after school Gardening club.
- With funding from British Science week and the local Rotary club

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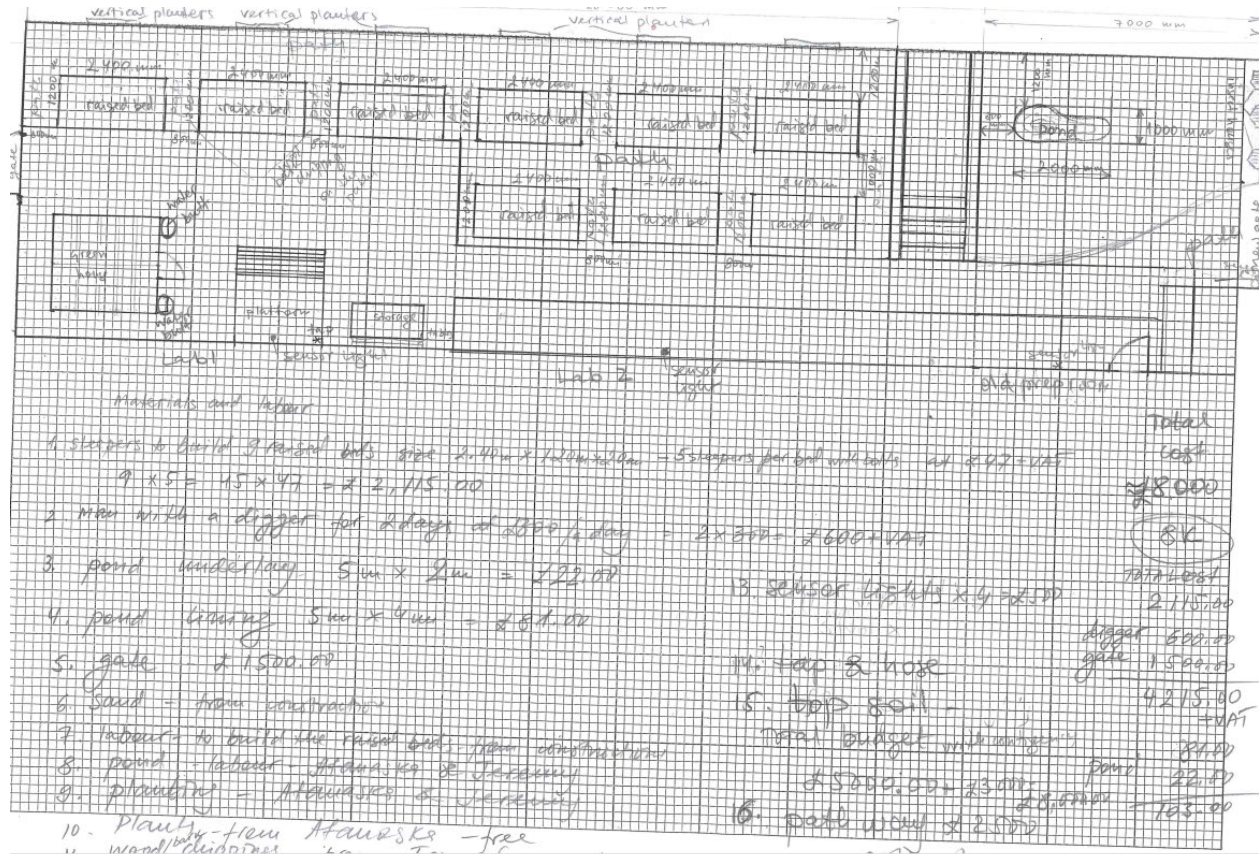

BEA Garden Project budget



List of Items needed for creating a gardening area behind Lab 1 & Lab 2 and estimated cost

1. Sleepers to build 9 raised beds size 2.40 m X 1.20 m X 0.40 cm and steps – total 45 sleepers and bolts for them priced at £47.00 + VAT –total £2,115
2. Membrane lining for the pond- size 5 m X 4 m - £ 81
3. Lining underlay for the pond- size 5 m X 2 m - £ 22
4. Digger and a man- hire cost for 2 days at £300 per day + VAT- total £600 + VAT
5. Bark chippings - free arranged by Ian Blazey
6. Sand, bricks and large stones to place at the bottom of the pond- free arranged by the constructions and the science technicians
7. Gate- to close the area between the existing fence and the chemical cupboard - £ 1,500
8. Labour to build the raised beds- from construction
9. Labour to build the pond- from the science technicians
10. Plants- free arranged by Atanaska Lindsay
11. Green house- free arranged by Ian Blazey
12. Paved path to access the area- £2,500 as per previous quote
13. Tap and hose- £100
14. 4 Sensor lights - £500
15. Topsoil- £300
16. Contingencies

Rough estimate- £8,000

Bourne End Academy Gardening Club



- The project was proposed to the school, but unfortunately no major school funding was available for the project.
- We appealed to parents, local residents and organisations for donations.



Bourne End Academy Gardening Club



- A greenhouse was donated by a local resident.
- The construction department dismantled and transported it to site.
- Construction students repaired the woodwork, varnished it and replaced the broken glazed panes with polythene.



Bourne End Academy Gardening Club



- Wooburn and Bourne End Parish council donated £4,000 towards the costs.
- The site needed to be secured to protect the plants grown from the local muntjac population



Bourne End Academy Gardening Club



- The palisade fence was extended to enclose the plot, and a lockable gate was installed.



Bourne End Academy Gardening Club



- A smooth pavement was constructed so deliveries and students could access the site safely.



Bourne End Academy Gardening Club



- Eighty wooden sleepers were sourced and built into raised beds.



Bourne End Academy Gardening Club



- Retaining walls have been built to support a walkway above the beds.
- The design had to change as shallow gas pipes and water mains were found.



Bourne End Academy Gardening Club



- Plants were started as seedlings in the Spring, transplanted into pots and grown on in the greenhouse and then planted into the raised beds in the Summer term.



Bourne End Academy Gardening Club



- A rotating composter was donated to encourage the production of our own compost.



Bourne End Academy Gardening Club



- Water butts were also donated by local residents.
- Additional butts have been bought to allow the collection of rainwater from the roof run off.



Bourne End Academy Gardening Club



- The students are now taking responsibility for weeding, pruning and watering the tomatoes, peppers, chillies, aubergines and herbs planted



Bourne End Academy Gardening Club



- The Gardening club runs every Thursday after school.
 - There are also Gardening Societies run on Wednesday lunchtimes with rotating lists of students choosing to attend.

- Students are delighted when the first crops are forming

- In the ARP (Additional Support Department) students have produced painted stones and asked if they could be displayed in the Garden

The Next Phases

- The soil is very poor quality.
- The students are weeding the beds, covering with cardboard and planting green manures.
- Two tonnes of topsoil and well-rotted manure is on order to improve the fertility of the beds.



Bourne End Academy Gardening Club



The Next Phases

- The entrance area is to be planned as a Biodiverse and Wellbeing garden
- A pond will, be dug and planted with water plants, to encourage invertebrates and amphibians.
- Wildflower areas will be planted and paths and seating areas for some of our students to have quiet zones, away from the stimulation of the school playgrounds.





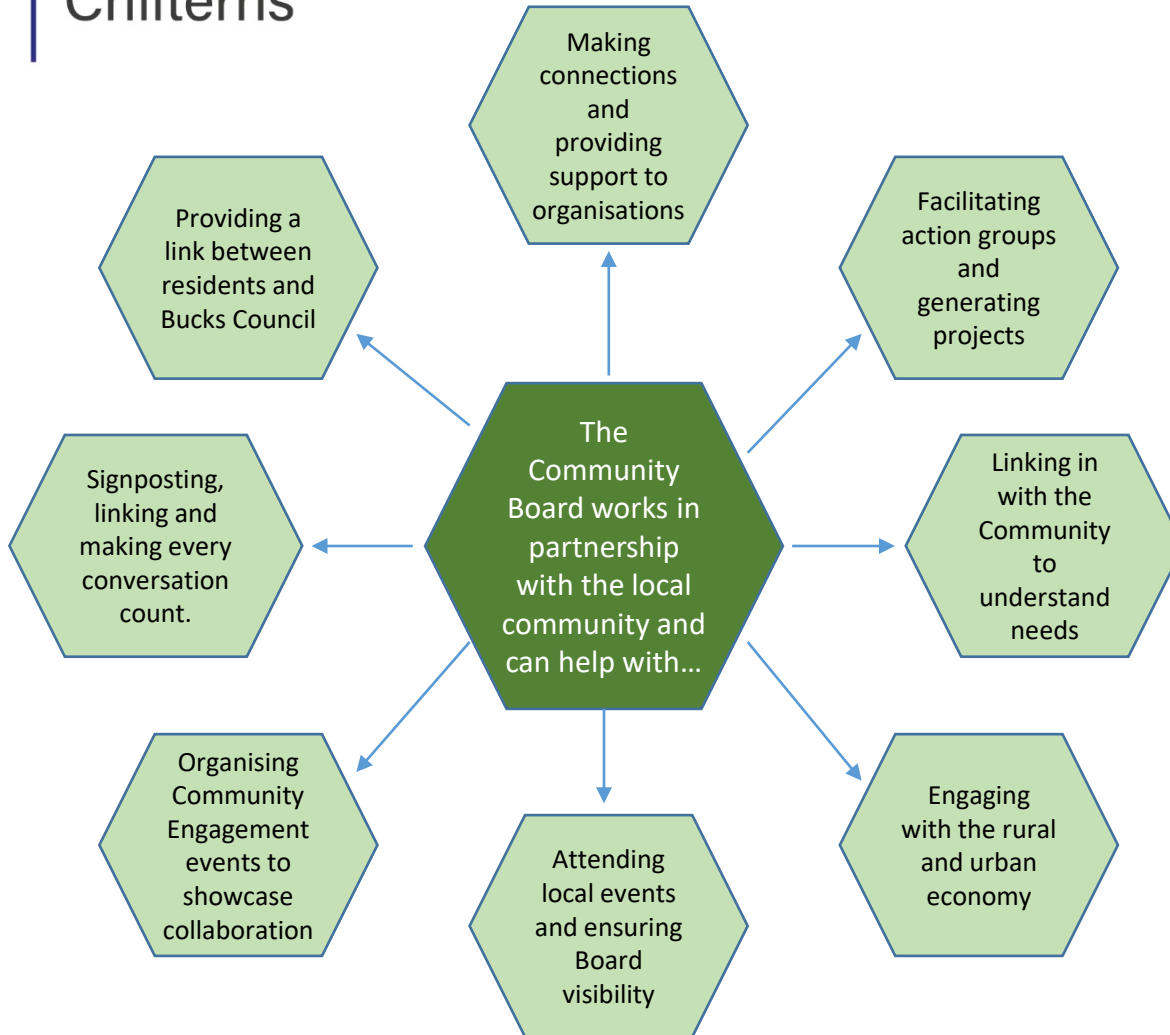
Community Board South West Chilterns

Local Community Champion – Winner

Robert Rendal - The winner is a volunteer with a dedicated heart of gold who tirelessly coordinates, volunteers, fundraises and champions the ethos that is behind the Lady Ryder Memorial Gardens in Parmoor near Frieth. For anyone who hasn't visited there, you really should to have an understanding on the impact this amazing walled garden has amongst the communities of South West Chilterns and attracts others from further afield.

This is a walled garden of tranquillity providing a haven of peace, thought and space to reflect on life, learn new skills within the garden and above all relax.

This individual is deserving as his selfless pursuit of securing this facility for the disadvantaged and people suffering and living with mental health and other issues



Local Community Champion – Highly Commended

Phil Laybourne - recognised for going out in all weathers both during and post covered with his camera taking photographs to show people who could not get out who live in the Bourne End and Wooburn Green whilst raising money for Thames Hospice to a total of well over £10,000 in memory of his late wife who had a short stay at the hospice. Corrine Hinch - has been making poppies for charity during the remembrance time. 5,000 were attached to park and church railings in Marlow and encourages others to join her putting them up and taking them down.
