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An Introduction to Arif Hussain: Cabinet Member for Communities.

I was delighted to be appointed as Cabinet Member for Communities in May, having previously been Deputy Cabinet Member. I was also Chairman of the High Wycombe Community Board, so have a good understanding of the Boards and their function.



Whilst the Boards had a challenging start for the first two years of their life, they have very much found their feet and I see them embedded in their local communities, bringing change and real improvement to local place.

Whilst funding is available for projects to deliver the annual priorities agreed by the Board, the focus now is on engagement and facilitation – bringing people, organisations and business together to talk about local issues and how improvements can be made where needed. We are seeing great success in this area now.

Every Community Board is different, and so they should be to reflect their local communities. Each Board has their own priorities which in turn deliver the overarching corporate priorities for Buckinghamshire Council. The funding which is available should be used to deliver projects, in partnership with local organisations, to deliver those Board priorities – and that in turn, these projects deliver a wide community benefit and improve the local place.

Dementia Awareness Training

During the months of May and June, the Community Board successfully delivered 6 immersive training sessions to members of our community.

The sessions were delivered during <u>Dementia Action</u> week and <u>Carers Week</u>.

Dementia and associated conditions can impact so many in a variety of ways, so it was good to have an



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eclectic mix of attendees, participating.

Thames Valley Police officers, Ambulance staff, care nurses and social prescribers were able to access the training, along with local residents. All of whom have different interactions and experiences with Dementia and those affected.

The training provider was able to answer questions that were provoked by the curiosities of those who took part. The understanding of behaviours and making small changes to the environment can make huge differences to perception. Some detail of which can be found <u>here</u>.

Wing & Ivinghoe Community Board minutes

1 Chairman's Welcome

The Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting.

2 Apologies

3 Minutes

The Minutes of the meeting held on 6th December 2022 were agreed as a correct record.

4 Declarations of Interest

There were none.

5 Funded Project Updates

Representatives from two projects that had received funding from the community board were invited to give a brief presentation to highlight the impact of their respective projects on their local areas.

Repair Café (Alex Razak)

The repair café had launched in February 2022 and alternated between Pitstone Pavilion and Ivinghoe Hub every 4th Saturday morning, to repair electrical items that would otherwise be thrown away and contribute to electronic waste and pollution. Alex was extremely grateful for the volunteers who have given up their time to support the café by lending their expertise or providing food. The turnaround for funding from the community board had been less than two months, which had played a part in ensuring that the services

of those volunteering could be kept. Savoury food and cakes were provided, and the café served a double purpose as a nice place for the community to socialise while they waited for their turn at one of the repairing tables. They were then asked if they would like to make a donation, which was used to maintain the café. The next meeting would take place on 25th March between 9:30am to 12:30pm at the Pitstone Pavillion.

Alex confirmed that she was aware of at least three other repair cafés across the country that were able to continue to operate through donations exclusively, and this is what was intended for this project. The community board funding was put towards initial start-up costs including insurance and training courses for repair volunteers, however this was not expected to be a recurring cost moving forward.

Orchard Ground (Martyn Waters)

Community board funding had assisted in a wider project to renovate the recreational site and the surrounding area. This included efforts to restore previously waterlogged areas and helped to increase general accessibility to the site and allotments. The site played host to a number of community activities including the local cricket and tennis clubs, which were now better able to provide coached activities for young people around the Cublington area and further afield.

Following a survey of those in the community, the neighbouring North Field site was successful in acquiring planning permission for a change of use from agricultural land to public amenity. 2,500 tree whips from the Woodland Trust had since been planted at the site by a team of volunteers. Heart of Bucks had also provided a grant for a community orchard with 60 fruit trees, and a blossom circle to commemorate the impact of the covid-19 pandemic in the village. More mature trees had been integrated into the new woodland area following a donation from the Tree Council. Future plans for the site included a hard surface footpath and a fresh air fitness trail.

Martyn confirmed that he was happy to provide advice to other Parish Councils regarding the process by which planning permission was sought and granted for developments like the Orchard Ground site, in order to facilitate similar renovation efforts elsewhere.

6 Community Board Update Engagement & Funding Update

Katrina reminded attendees that the budget for the 2022/23 fiscal year stood at £99,040 of which £58,501.93 had been allocated. £40,122.54 was awaiting allocation to pending projects. It was explained that 50% of grant and small grants applications had been received between December and January, creating a bottleneck in applications processing, and explaining the large amount of money awaiting allocation.

Twenty projects had been funded in the 2022-23 fiscal year, double that of the 2020-21 fiscal year.

Of the four priority areas established by the community board (Economic Recovery, Environment, Health and Wellbeing, and Highways), 75% of funding had been allocated to projects related to health and wellbeing, identifying this as the top priority area for the community board by a significant margin.

Working Practices 23/24

Katrina also invited feedback on potential improvements to the funding application process into the next fiscal year. The responses were given in writing and would be collated and considered for implementation. A particular query concerned a digital means of applying for funding, which would allow applicants to track their application through various stages. It was explained that this was a good idea but might not be feasible to create an implement in time for the next fiscal year.

In the Patch

Katrina had been out and about much more over recent months and had enjoyed meeting people and taking feedback on the community board and its work. 7 Youth Council

David Kellner (Wing Parish Chairman) gave an update to the community board to highlight project ideas that had been identified by the Wing Youth Council (comprised of eight pupils from The Cottesloe School, and four from Overstone School). The Youth Council's Chairman had attended the last Wing Parish Council meeting to highlight their work and seek support from the Parish Council where suitable. A refurbishment the Jubilee green play area had been identified as the Youth Council's first project. The Wing Allotment Society had also provided an allotment for the Youth Council to use to grow vegetables.

David would endeavour to arrange someone from the Youth Council to come along to a future community board meeting.

8 Community Matters Proud of Bucks Awards

Winners had been selected in all three categories (Young Community Champion, Local Community Champion, and Community Group Contribution). Congratulations were given to all those nominated. The awards ceremony would take place in June 2023 once a venue was confirmed. The date for the ceremony would be communicated in due course. The awards would be a community board event, so all parishes and residents were welcome to attend. Anyone with suggestions of who could be invited to speak or attend the ceremony (including representatives from local charities or community groups) was advised to notify Katrina.

Community News

Wing Market had invested in social media to boost local awareness. It was hoped that the community board would have a presence there once a month moving forward.

Attendees were asked to promote the Great British Spring Clean in their areas.

A huge congratulations was given to Wing Belles Girls Football Team on their U18s Berks and Bucks FA County Cup win.

Dementia Awareness Training

A training provider for the Dementia Awareness Training had now been booked. Sessions were free to access but would require advanced booking via Eventbrite due to limited spaces (108 in total). There would be three sessions per day (9:30am-12pm, 12:15pm – 2:45pm, 3pm – 5:30pm) on the following dates:



Who we are

This document has been written by people in Buckinghamshire Council's Children's Department.

"We aim to build a better future for all children and young people in Buckinghamshire so that they realise their potential, whatever their starting point is."

What does youth participation mean?

Youth participation is all about listening to young people's voices and acting on them to make things better.

We want to listen to what young people have to say because we believe your experiences and ideas can help us make Buckinghamshire the best place to live.

We listen to young people in lots of different ways. These include events, fun days out, group conversations, youth councils, surveys, and more.



What is the Youth Participation Strategy?

The Youth Participation Strategy is a written document. It talks about how professionals in Buckinghamshire plan to listen to young people, take action in response to what you tell us, and then tell you what difference you've made.

The Strategy promises to create opportunities for you to talk about the things that matter to you. Its ambition is that these opportunities are easy and fun, and that they ultimately help us to make our services better for young people.

The Strategy also makes a promise that if you share your ideas and experiences with us, we will try to take action in response to what you say, and we will let you know after we have tried whether we changed something or not.



Our mission

- We have a mission to listen, act and respond to the views of all young people in Buckinghamshire.
- This includes listening to young people with special educational needs and disabilities, young people who are LGBT+, young people from under-represented or marginalised communities, and those with experiences such as care and trauma.









Our mission - broken down

Listen:

We will listen to the views of young people in Buckinghamshire in ways that are interesting, respectful and accessible.

Act:

We will work with young people to create opportunities, improve our services, and build a better future which meets young people's needs

Respond:

We promise to get back to the young people we listen to, to let them know what difference they've helped to make after we've had time to act.

Repeat:

We promise to keep reviewing what we're doing and trying to improve.


Our 3 Rules of Engagement

Our 3 Rules of Engagement

Rule 1:

We don't ask young people to do something we would not do ourselves.

Rule 2:

When engaging young people in service development, we provide them with development opportunities to ensure they have the skills to do so.

Rule 3:

When we work with young people, we make sure we have a clear strategy about how we will listen, act and respond in a timely, transparent manner that maximises young people's ownership.

These are the top actions that we will take to make sure that participation is the best it can be.




Re-brand our participation activity

Re-launch the Youth Voice forum

Youth Voice is a space for young people aged 11-19, and up to 25 if they have a Special Educational Need or Disability, to speak about issues that are important for young people. The group is led by young people in the Youth Voice Executive Committee.

We are re-investing in the Youth Voice Forum to increase its membership and power. We are also focusing on increasing representation of young people from all over Buckinghamshire, including rural areas, and partnering with Buckinghamshire's Community Boards.

Change our culture

We are making sure that youth participation opportunities exist across the whole council and county by working with other people, running training, and launching a Youth Participation Champions programme.

Participation Champions are professionals who volunteer to create and run youth participation opportunities.

Governance

We have assembled a team of people who monitor progress against our targets and make sure we are following our rules of engagement. This team is called the Youth Participation Planning Group.

The Youth Participation Planning group will get updates from the Youth Participation Champions and the Youth Voice Executive Committee.

The Youth Participation Planning Group will provide updates to the Children's Partnership Board. The Children's Partnership Board is a group of very important people who are in charge of children's wellbeing in Buckinghamshire.

The village parishes are regular attendees to the community board meetings and are keen to discuss matters related to highways, village events, the visitor economy, community resilience, and more.









Project Showcase: Environment Ivinghoe, Pitstone and Brookmead

lvinghoe, Pitstone and their local primary school are a great example of partnership working. They are keen on attending board action groups and where possible, join together to support community needs. Especially where young people are involved. Teaching young people about environment and safety are two key areas of focus.

Working alongside the school, two projects have been completed that has brought with it better traffic management and environmental improvements. These projects have been 'home-grown' and look to improve the quality of the public realm.

Together, following varying traffic issues outside the school. Both lvinghoe and Pitstone contributed alongside the Community Board to implement a highways project. The objectives were to highlight to road users that the area was very close to a school. This has been really well received. The added pencil bollards certainly meet the objective.



Whistle Brook clearance and renovations have been carried out along the side of the school grounds. This area is now clear of litter, dead wood other finds. The light that can now enter the area has created a fresh habitat for native plants to grow once more. This now also give opportunities for the school to learn more about the environment with their pupils as they can conduct lessons based around the biodiversity of the area.

Dementia Training

- The Board agreed to contribute £3,689 towards Dementia Awareness Training sessions
- The sessions ran in three separate villages across the board Spring/Summer 2023.
- Thanks to the Board's contribution, it has meant that the training was free for residents, businesses and volunteers that reside or work in the board areas to attend
- 58 people locally gained a better understanding of Dementia
 - This will give individuals the confidence to support others in the community who have Dementia or are caring for someone else.
 - It will support people with Dementia to live more independently, if their communities are understanding and confident when interacting

Dementia Awareness Training

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


©ommunity Engagement

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September 2023 Update from BC for CBs

Share your views and help us keep Buckinghamshire safe

The Safer Buckinghamshire Board is a local Community Safety Partnership that brings together experts from the police, fire service, probation, health and social care services. The board develops an annual action plan to reduce crime and anti-social behaviour in Buckinghamshire and help keep it a safe place to live and work.

To help develop this plan, we want to hear from local residents to understand:

- the impact of crime and anti-social behaviour in their local area
- their experience of reporting crimes
- how safe or unsafe they feel in Buckinghamshire

<u>The survey</u> is open to anyone living, working and/or studying in Buckinghamshire and will be open from 11 September until 29 October.

The results of the survey will be combined with an analysis of all crimes that happen in the county to help develop partnership activities for the following year.

Residents can complete the survey on <u>Your Voice Bucks</u> and enter into our prize draw to win one of three £100 leisure vouchers*.

A communications toolkit including newsletter copy, social media copy/graphics and a digital poster will be provided before the survey launches so you can share with your local communities.

Local Plan – progress and next steps

The Local Plan for Buckinghamshire (LP4B) provides a major opportunity to shape the growth of Buckinghamshire over the next 15 years and beyond. It will identify areas for new housing and employment, while also designating areas for protection and enhancement, such as our valued landscapes, natural habitats and heritage.

Earlier this year we carried out a public engagement survey on the draft vision and objectives for the LP4B. We received about 700 responses to the Local Plan for Buckinghamshire Vision and Objectives which we are in the process of analysing and considering.

We have now published an <u>interactive map and basic details</u> of the 1,000 or so sites which were submitted in response to our two Calls for Brownfield Sites and our Wider Call for Sites. We are assessing these sites for their suitability, availability and achievability

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(including viability) to accommodate development. This work will help us to shape the first Buckinghamshire Housing and Economic Land Availability Assessment (HELAA).

Our next local plan public engagement work is likely to take place in early 2024, subject to Cabinet approval. This will be on possible high-level growth scenarios for the spatial distribution of new development to meet assessed levels of housing and employment need.

PickMeUp expands to Flackwell Heath

Wycombe's PickMeUp on-demand bus service, introduced by Buckinghamshire Council to reach residents not serviced by regular bus routes, has expanded to include Flackwell Heath. The expansion will help improve links from Flackwell Heath to Loudwater, Cressex, Booker and other parts of town.

Launched as a pilot in September 2022, it is funded by a three-year, central Government Rural Mobility Fund grant. It has proved popular, providing 1,500 rides per week and running Monday to Friday from 6am to 7pm.

Now after reviewing how the service is being used, and in response to requests from the local community, the council and operator Carousel Buses are pleased to extend the benefits of the service to many more potential passengers.

An additional vehicle will now operate at the morning and afternoon peak to keep up with demand. Fares reflect other local bus services and bus tickets such as Wycombe Smart Zone tickets and Concessionary Bus Passes are valid.

There are locations throughout the county, including Buckinghamshire libraries and community venues such as churches and halls, that have continued to offer a Welcoming Space to residents throughout the summer months.

Now that we are moving into autumn we are looking at ways in which Welcoming Spaces can again offer residents warm and friendly places to go and meet with others this coming winter. More information on resources and guidance for setting up a Welcoming Space will be available shortly.

Energy Doctor

Buckinghamshire Council has introduced a new Energy Doctor scheme as one of the initiatives funded by its allocation of the Government's UK Shared Prosperity Fund.

Under the scheme, domestic resource efficiency officers are visiting qualifying homes to assess and advise on measures that can reduce energy consumption and costs.

The team also installs suitable low-cost measures in homes such as draught proofing, hot water cylinder insulation jackets, reflective radiator panels, secondary glazing film and LED lights.

To qualify for an Energy Doctor visit, applicants must meet all of the following criteria:

- They rent the property through a private rental agreement, or own and live in the property
- The household has an income of £30,000 or less (before tax), is in receipt of meanstested benefits such as Universal Credit and Council Tax Support, or a member of the household is disabled
- The domestic property has an energy performance certificate (EPC) rating of D, E, F or G, or does not legally require an EPC
