Minutes of the meeting of the Haddenham & Waddesdon Community Board held on Thursday 16 February 2023 in Microsoft Teams Virtual Meeting., commencing at 6.30 pm and concluding at 8.10 pm.

#### Agenda Item

#### 1 Chairman's Welcome and introduction to the Community Board

The Chairman welcomed all to the Haddenham and Waddesdon Community Board meeting.

#### 2 Apologies for Absence

Apologies for absence were received from Buckinghamshire Councillors Phil Gomm, Jilly Jordan, Susan Lewin, Iain Macpherson and Michael Rand, Parish Councillors Ken Birkby, Fiona Payne, Jon Mole and Barbara Kolbert.

#### 3 Notes from the 27th September 2022 meeting

The minutes of the meeting held on 27<sup>th</sup> September 2022 were approved as a correct record.

#### 4 Declarations of Interest

Councillor Ashley Waite declared a personal interest in item 6, Spotlight on local charities, as consultant of the Bernwode Community Bus.

Councillor Paul Irwin declared a personal interest in item 6, Spotlight on local charities, as trustee of the Bernwode Community Bus.

Councillor Gregory Smith declared a personal interest In item 6, Haddenham Zero Carbon Haddenham – EV Car Club project, as Chair of the Zero Carbon Haddenham Group.

#### 5 Buckinghamshire Fire and Rescue Service

Group Commander Stuart Grosse, Buckinghamshire Fire and Rescue Service, gave a presentation, appended to the minutes.

Group Commander Stuart Grosse made the following points in the presentation:

- Buckinghamshire and Milton Keynes Fire Authority is made up of five councillors from Milton Keynes and twelve from Buckinghamshire. The Chair of the Fire Authority is Simon Rouse and the Chief Fire Officer is Jason Thelwell.
- The four community safety priorities are Safer Homes, Safer Neighbourhoods, Safer Roads and Safer Environment.
- The wholetime service delivery area for the Haddenham and Waddesdon Community Board Area is Aylesbury Fire Station.
- The majority of the finances for the service were from council tax and the remainder from business rates, revenue support grant and other specific grants.
- The community safety priorities for the Aylesbury service delivery area were Reduction in accidental dwelling fires, reduction in secondary fires, road safety and community engagement.
- The summer pressures included the highest temperatures and dry weather declaring two major incidents at Kiddi Caru Nursery in Milton Keynes and the other at Whitehouse Farm in Wooburn Green, High Wycombe.
- Future issues that may be a concern included HS2, climate change, development within Buckinghamshire and Milton Keynes and the Fire Reform White Paper.

A question was asked by a member of how the fire service would look like in the future and it seemed that discussions were currently being had that the future would be very much like the medical services, concentrating on more community engagement, safeguarding and working more within the community.

The Chairman thanked Group Commander Stuart Grosse for attending and providing a very informative presentation and suggested that any information and messages could be circulated through existing channels such as the Community Group Facebook page and through Parish and Town Councils.

#### Spotlight on local charities/projects Haddenham Zero Carbon Haddenham – EV Car Club project

Haddenham Parish Councillor, Alan Thawley, along with Ross and Rebecca Batting, Directors of 3B Vehicle Hire, gave a presentation to the Community Board on the EV Car Club Project, appended to the minutes. Haddenham had declared a Climate emergency with a 2030 net zero target for the whole community. Cutting transport emissions through adoption of EVs was a key part of the plan and a car club was a good way to introduce people to EVs.

Over the last two years, an initial survey was completed to gauge interest, decide on a model, bring on partners such as 3B and get agreement for chargers and installation. Zero-Carbon Haddenham is a four-way partnership; Xero Carbon Haddenham, Parish Council/Village Hall, 3B Vehicle Hire and Thame Green Living.

The points raised by the Community Board Members included:

- The car club would be non-profit making project for the near future but was not far off from paying for itself to run. The first year of the scheme would cover all costs.
- It was interesting to see that 50% of users were regular users and to date, 35 bookings had been made since the start of the scheme, in December 2022.
- Many other Parish and Town Councils had expressed an interest to expand the car club.
- Visibility for the car club was most important in the community to make everyone be aware of the facility available.
- The use of the cars was available for all to use via the 3B Vehicle Hire website, there was no fees to sign up to the car club.
- The promotional material would be circulated to Community Board Members.

The Chairman thanked all for the presentation and for assisting all present to understand the way the car club worked.

#### **Update on Bernwode Community Bus (Bernie Bus projects)**

The Chairman, Councillor Ashley Waite, gave a presentation to the Community Board about all the minibuses acquired by the Bernie Bus Projects, appended to the minutes.

The project was launched in 2018 in Waddesdon, originally with a 16-seater minibus to serve the old people's groups in Waddesdon and Quainton. This has increased with the addition of Bernie, a 16-seater, Bella, another 16-seater and Bernadette, a wheelchair friendly car that can take three passengers plus a driver and a wheelchair. The vehicles are used by elderly day centres, sports clubs, Brownies, Wedding and other party groups and many other local groups.

Bernie was also running a Foodbank Collection Box, collecting every first Saturday of the month from 26 drop off points across the area. This has become key in helping people gain access to food. In December 2022, the 5000 Can Challenge was achieved with 8293 cans collected. The challenge was achieved by schools, pubs, gyms and events.

There are also the Bernie's Eco Warriors, a number of schools and litter picking groups, keeping the local area clean and tidy. Bernie transports the volunteers safely and gets rid of the bags afterwards.

Bernie's buddies are a social group who uses Bernie for trips to garden centres and local markets. Bernie has reduced social isolation in the local community. Bernie also took the Bernie Santa Float to four villages in the Waddesdon area. Cash Donations in excess of £1200 were collected to assist with trips to help with social isolation.

The Chair ended the presentation asking for more volunteers to drive the minibuses.

#### 7 Community Board and Funding update

The Community Board Manager introduced the Community Board area to all present and highlighted some of the exciting things achieved such as the 27 projects that had been funded to a value of £120,000, the playgrounds in Chearsley, Cuddington and Grendon Underwood had been refurbished, three health and wellbeing events had been launched in Haddenham, Berryfields and Waddesdon and community fridges and larders had been created in Grendon Underwood and Waddesdon. These were just a few of the projects.

The Chair reported that the Library of Things had taken longer than expected but was now ready, a request for volunteers would be sent round. It would be very helpful if the library could be filled with items that the community could borrow, use and return. Items such as fold up chairs, tables, gazebos, DIY equipment and other things that could be reused.

The following events were coming up:

Health and Wellbeing Fayre – Wednesday 22 February 2023 – 1-6pm at Roman Park Hall in Berryfields.

Quainton Showcase – Saturday 11 March 2023 – 2-4pm at Quainton Memorial Hall.

The finances were highlighted and that the Community Board had received £138,639.00 for 2022/23 budget allocation. Of that, £120,186 had been allocated to projects and £140,945.13 had been received through contributory funding resulting in total funds of £263, 302.00, amounting in contributing funding of £1.15 that was secured for every pound of CB investment.

A list of projects that the monies was spent on was shared with the Members, as part of the presentation.

There needed to be a more collaborate approach for the future where the

Community Board Manager be involved from an early stage to assist and plan and evenly spread the funding. It was requested that could communities that had received no funding be targeted and assisted to generate activity.

The Chair asked the Community Board what else could be done. The Cost-of-Living update would be appended to the minutes.

The Community Board Manager reminded all about the Proud of Bucks Award and informed them that 17 nominations had been received. These would be judged, and the announcement would be made in Spring 2023.

#### 8 Community Matters (opportunity for residents and members to raise presubmitted issues and public questions)

The Service Director for Resources, Business Operations, Buckinghamshire Council, Lloyd Jeffries, provided an update from the Council, note appended to minutes.

The four main points that were highlighted were:

- A local Heritage List had been created which identified locally significant heritage sites. These sites had been nominated by local communities and council staff and had been evaluated by the council's Heritage Team. The list would be recognised and considered in future planning applications, helping to protect local heritage assets for future generations to enjoy. The list of nominated sites can be seen at the link: Buckinghamshire Local Heritage List website.
- On-Street Charge Points Scheme After successfully securing £407K from the
  Office for Zero Emission Vehicles, the Council will be installing 128 new parking
  bays in 16 of its car parks across the county, by April 2023. Other places were
  being looked in to install more EV parking bays, especially within Town and
  Parish Council car parks. Further information about Buckinghamshire Council's 5year Action plan was available at Buckinghamshire Council's 5-year Action Plan.
- Local Plan Update Over 700 sites had been submitted for consideration as land for possible future development within Buckinghamshire. An interactive map was available on the Council website showing the Brownfield sites <u>Brownfield CFS 2021-22 (arcgis.com)</u>. Each of the sites were now being evaluated against the criteria of suitability for their chosen use, availability and deliverability over the plan period to 2040. They were currently setting the overarching vision and objectives for the Local Plan. The team were working on a forthcoming public consultation which would enable people to comment and give feedback on the draft Vision and Objectives.
  - Visitor Economy Survey A new Tourism Survey had been launched by the Council, which would help to shape the future of Buckinghamshire's visitor economy sector. The Council was looking for input from residents, businesses and key stakeholders, which would help identify new opportunities and to

support the future growth of the visitor economy across Buckinghamshire. Buckinghamshire residents, business owners and other tourism stakeholders can complete the survey <a href="here">here</a>.

#### 9 Topics for future consideration

The Community Board Manager reminded all that it had to be a joint effort and if anyone felt that a specialist group needed to be put together to understand and focus on, then it could be put together.

Topics suggested for future considerations included:








## **Record temperatures**

The months of July (16 - 19) and August (9 - 15) 2022, brought record high temperatures and dry weather that presented many challenges for Fire and Rescue Services (FRSs) and other emergency responders across the country.

The Met office issued its first red warning for heat affecting central and south England, which was in place for 18 & 19 July.

On the 19 July the UK recorded its highest ever temperature of 40.3°C.





## Major Incidents declared

By Buckinghamshire Fire & Rescue

On Tuesday 19 July two major incidents were declared, one in the north of the county at 13:05

Kiddi Caru Nursey Walnut Tree Milton Keynes

One in the south of the county at 14:37. Whitehouse Farm,

Wooburn Moor, High Wycombe

In the following three hours, BFRS supported by neighbouring FRS's were also mobilised to large scale, protracted incidents at Chearsley, Buckland and Denham resulting in resources being exceptionally stretched.



## Service Wide Major Incident

Servicing five major fires across our area, two of which were declared major incidents from the scene of operations, triggering the declaration of a Service wide major incident, supported by the Thames Valley Local Resilience Forum (TV LRF).

BFRS were ably assisted by many of our neighbouring Services including Oxfordshire, Northamptonshire, Bedfordshire, Royal Berkshire, Hertfordshire and a specialist water carrier from Dorset and Wiltshire, despite them all being under operational pressures themselves.



# Calls taken by Thames Valley Fire Control Service (only) for incidents in Bucks

Major incidents were declared by fifteen FRSs across the country including neighbouring services in London, Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire, as a result of the devastating outbreak of fires.

The Service attended an unprecedented number of calls, including many fires in the open / wildfires.

BFRS has debriefed, reviewed and collated the information from this period to improve our service delivery and staff welfare at future events.

## Background



- Haddenham declared a climate emergency with a 2030 net-zero target for the whole community
- Cutting transport emissions through adoption of EVs is a key part of the plan
- A car club is a good way to introduce people to Evs
- It also addresses the issue of embodied emissions from manufacturing
- And can help to reduce driving

## Journey



Over two-year process to get the club up and running

- Initial survey to gauge interest
- Deciding on model
- Bringing 3B onboard as a partner
- Lengthy process of getting agreement for chargers and installation

## Partnership

## ZERO-CARBON HADDENHAM

#### A four-way partnership

- Zero Carbon Haddenham developed the idea and promote the club
- Parish Council/Village Hall installed the chargers (one public, one dedicated to the Hire Club) at a cost of c. £11,000, with some support from our community board
- 3B Vehicle Hire provide the car and run the club, using the Hiya Car booking platform
- Thame Green Living our partner community group in Thame, which also has a car

### Initial results



We officially launched the Haddenham car on December 3<sup>rd</sup> (Thame car slightly earlier in September 2022

- Strong interest: mailing list of over 300 (three quarters in Haddenham), around 150 signed up to the club, 20 active users so far in Haddenham
- User base is expanding and hires are getting longer
- Haddenham car benefits from better visibility and also stronger community feel in the village.
- Aim is to convince households to give up a second car

#### Issues

ZERO-CARBON HADDENHAM

- Some people have found the tech (App plus EV) challenging
- Hiya Car insurance only covers 25-75 year-olds
- Occasional issues releasing the charging cable
- Users have sometimes failed to set the car charging after hire
- Publicity and getting people to try something new

Hiya Car have responsive online support for bookings, and 3B have also been excellent, providing alternative vehicles where necessary, for example.

#### Merging with Bart

- In 2020, we merged with BART, Buckingham area rural transport to offer two buses and a wider coverage area
- So we now cover from buckingham in the north to Haddenham and Princes
   Risborough in the south
- The new bernie is a 16 seater peugeot boxer minibus with a side door and loads of room inside for a variety of uses
- Bart has a 13 seater peugeot boxer minibus which is kitted to a high standard with a low user step, tail lift and a multitude of handrails making it ideal for the elderly

# Bernie's Food Appeal



#### **During Covid**

- During covid, Bernie and his team were key in supporting the work of the food banks by collecting across the Aylesbury Vale
- This process ran for close to 10 months and we collected over 2000 crates of food via a regular schedule
- We played music and collected in fancy dress to raise the mood at this difficult time
- We were also helping with the redistribution of government food boxes
- Bernie has become key in helping people gain access to food



#### Post Covid and the cost of living crisis

- Following covid, food sustainability has become a key issue as the country is locked in a cost of living crisis
- Bernie continues to collect on a monthly basis from 26 drop off points across the area.
- We regularly collect half a tonne of food each month which has become invaluable to the work of the food banks in Aylesbury and the surrounding area.





#### The 5000 Can Challenge

- As a result of a grant from the Haddenham & Waddesdon Community board we were able to launch the 5000 Can Challenge in October to December 2022.
- Simply put, We set a target of collecting 5000 cans of food before christmas through our existing network as well as new opportunities.
- 9 Schools, 3 pubs, 2 gyms and several one of events all contributed to smashing the target and achieving an end of year total of 8293 cans collected

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





## **Cost of Living Programme – Community Board Update February**

As a Council, we recognise the growing pressures being faced by our residents linked to the increases in the cost of living.

Buckinghamshire Council has made further provision to assist residents who are in need, which is especially important during the winter months, developed through close partnership working, particularly with the voluntary and community sector.

We are continuing to develop our offer of support to residents, which is summarised below, and further information and updates will be published on our website.

- Help with the cost of living council homepage Our updated website ensures people can access
  information about the range of support available, including: support with food, fuel and household
  bills, finding a place to keep warm, obtaining essential household items, support available from

- Welcoming Spaces Starting with council and community libraries, these locations will provide a
  warm, welcoming and supportive space for anyone who needs it. These are places where residents
  can come into safe and inclusive spaces, free of charge, to stay warm and enjoy a little company.
  Use of facilities, including free wifi, will also be available in these places along with information and
  support. Find a place to keep warm (Welcoming Spaces) | Buckinghamshire Council

Welcoming Spaces have started extending to some private and community venues. Information about these will be accessible through the Bucks Online Directory and <u>Find a Warm Welcome Space</u> Today.

If a community venue wishes to set up as a welcoming space, a toolkit with guidance is also provided in the cost of living section of the Council's website.

- Wycombe Wanderers Warm Hub Operating every Tuesday and Thursday from 5pm-8pm until 28th February, the Warm Hub is accessible to anyone aged over 65 and attendees can be accompanied by 1 guest (pre-booking is required to detail any access or dietary requirements). 4 family days, open to the entire community, will also be communicated in due course. - Warm Boxes We have launched a warm box offer for residents that will enable them to collect free essential items to help with keeping warm from selected welcoming spaces. For more bespoke help with essential items to keep warm, residents may contact the Helping Hand team.

- **Library Fines Amnesty Jan & Feb** There will be a fines amnesty in all <u>Bucks Libraries</u> during January and February. Residents can just drop into one of the libraries during this time and ask a team member to have all historic fines on their accounts cleared. Any fines on items returned late during these months will also be waived.
- Better Housing Better Health Better Housing, Better Health (previously called the Affordable Warmth Helpline) helps Buckinghamshire residents keep warm and well at home and improve the energy efficiency of their homes.

For self-referrals residents may visit the <u>Better Housing</u>, <u>Better Health website</u> or call <u>0800 107 0044</u>.

We also offer guidance for <u>saving energy and tackling climate change at home and in other</u> buildings.

- **Get around for £2 on the bus scheme** From 1st January to 31st March a single bus journey within the Arriva bus zone will cost no more than £2. This includes Buckinghamshire and cross-county routes with some exclusions. More details are available at: <u>Get around for £2 | Help for Households | Arriva Bus UK</u>, where residents may check if their local bus route is included in the scheme.
- Pay council tax over 12 months instead of 10 Residents now have the option of paying council tax evenly across the year instead of 10 months with a two month break in February and March.
   This should spread out the cost of an annual Council Tax bill into 12 smaller, monthly payments.

- Resident Support Leaflet A printed Resident Support Leaflet summarising available cost of living support will soon be available in libraries and from partner organisations such as Citizens Advice Bucks and food banks. These will also be distributed directly to vulnerable residents by partner organisations.

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# **Local Heritage Listing**

- Using government funding, the council has developed a Local Heritage List to protect some of the most important heritage sites in the county that contribute to the local character of Buckinghamshire.
- The Local Heritage List identifies locally significant heritage sites and celebrates their contribution to local identity and character.
- Sites were nominated by local communities and council staff and evaluated by the council's heritage team with volunteers also working on the project.
- Assets on the Local Heritage List will be recognised and considered in any future planning applications, helping to protect local heritage assets for future generations to enjoy.
- There have been more than 2,653 nominations for inclusion on the list and 771 of these sites are now being brought forward for adoption in Phase 1, with the rest being assessed for Phase 2.

# On street residential chargepoint scheme funding for EV charge locations

- After successfully securing £407k from the Office for Zero Emission Vehicles via their On-Street Residential Chargepoint Scheme, the council will now be installing 128 new EV parking bays in 16 of its car parks across the county with work being completed by April 2023.
- We are now looking for other opportunities to broaden the public charging network in local town and village community car parks in Buckinghamshire.
  - Our aim is to submit a combined bid to the On-Street Residential Chargepoint Scheme in March 2023, to provide the funding for this initiative. We will work alongside town and parish councils to assess what type of chargepoint might be suitable for each site, calculate the cost of installation and the power connection costs, and liaise with EV chargepoint suppliers on behalf of town and parish councils. We can also help to procure and manage the installation.
- Find out more about <u>Buckinghamshire Council's 5-year Action Plan</u> to support the transition of the county to EVs.

# **Local Plan update**

- Over 700 sites have been submitted for consideration as land for possible future development within Buckinghamshire. Our previous calls for brownfield sites resulted in 300 sites being suggested. An interactive map showing these has now been published. <u>Brownfield</u> <u>CFS 2021-22 (arcgis.com)</u>
- Officers have now started the process of evaluating each of the sites against the criteria of suitability for their chosen use, availability and deliverability over the plan period to 2040.
- We are currently working to set out the overarching vision and objectives for the Local Plan for Buckinghamshire which will shape our work going forwards. In accordance with good practice on community engagement, the team is working on a forthcoming public consultation which will enable people to comment and give feedback on the draft Vision and Objectives.

# **Visitor Economy survey**

- Buckinghamshire Council has launched a new Tourism Survey which will help to shape the future of Buckinghamshire's visitor economy sector. The council is inviting input from residents, businesses and key stakeholders which it will use to help identify new opportunities and to support the future growth of the visitor economy across Buckinghamshire.
- The survey will be an important contributor to a Visitor Economy Strategy currently being developed by Buckinghamshire Council and its partners. The strategy itself will aim to identify how Buckinghamshire can build on the opportunities within its visitor economy with a view to supporting businesses and creating jobs.

# **Haddenham and Waddesdon Community Board Report**

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#### Introduction

Welcome to our September 2023 Community Board meeting update.

At our Proud of Bucks awards and Building a Community Vision meeting on 7<sup>th</sup> June at Waddesdon Community Centre, we handed round a short survey asking people to revisit our current priorities and let us know if these should still be relevant. From responses received at that event and at events attended elsewhere (such as the Platinum Jubilee cycleway launch and a community safety event held at Hartwell Nurseries), the result was to keep with our existing broad priorities of:

#### Health and Wellbeing, The Environment and Road Safety.

With Health and Wellbeing, it was commented that we should incorporate cost of living. It was felt that the Environment should encompass ideas around cost savings as well as environmental impact and benefits and that Road Safety should look at active travel as well road safety concerns.

Our emphasis this year has been around collaboration and working with communities and partners to identify needs that align with our CB priorities and working together to achieve them. By close working with partners internally and externally, we can also signpost communities to solutions already out there rather than reinventing the wheel!

Here's just some examples of interactions that the Community Board Manager has had:

Road safety: Meeting up with the local Member and representatives from Worminghall Parish Council to consider how to enhance verge entrances to the village to alert drivers that they were entering a village. Rather than resort to costly and evasive hard landscaping which can spoil the very nature of what the intervention is intended to safeguard, low-cost solutions like adding seasonal interest like wildflowers and bulbs can make drivers slow down and realise they are entering a residential area.

Health & Wellbeing and cost of living: Chatting to residents of the Quainton Alms Houses about life in one of these historical dwellings meant they were able to refer the Winwood Almshouses Trust to the Council's Energy Doctor scheme. Now retrofit insulation measures will enable those tenants to enjoy much warmer homes this winter.

The Environment: Our Proud of Bucks awards and in person events provided opportunities for Zero Carbon Haddenham and the Quainton Wildlife and Heritage Orchard to promote their projects to the wider Community Board and encourage others to follow suit.

# **Parish Workshops**

In response to our parishes requesting a dedicated workshop where they could discuss day to day topics of common interest, we put together Parish Workshops. Due to the size of the Community Board, we split the Board into two groups, aligning parishes with their neighbours as best as possible. We then invited the Parishes to put forward 3 topics of interest. We received the following topics and hope to provide an update at our Community Board meeting on 14<sup>th</sup> September:

- Grass Cutting protocol: to adopt whether to go wild or keep tidy.
- Discussion around the role of parishes and how we need more residents to get involved in parish life.
- Speeding any new ideas to reduce speeding traffic in our villages.
- How we can help support rural GP surgeries.
- Warm hubs feedback on those that have taken place.

## **Update on our Action Groups**

Our action groups have taken a break during the summer, and we hope to reconvene in the autumn. We acknowledge that people live busy lives, but we would like to see if relevant groups might like to host these meetings either in person or via MS teams to showcase projects and pass on their knowledge and lessons learnt. It would be great to identify a Community Board led project and create a task and finish group to progress it.

# Project update

### Library of things

The library had a slow start but is gathering momentum quickly with our dedicated Co-ordinator Katie-Louise Collier. We now have a Facebook page and website and items are arriving at the store based at Quainton Railway Centre. A new repair café will also be on site to support the Library of Things. We have also linked in with the repair cafes and recycle shops around the county as we envisage the library as being county-wide where hives or hubs can be created around Bucks to hold and/or repair items. Cages will soon be appearing at household waste sites where items can be donated which are on the Library's wish list. We are focussing on event kits which small local groups or PTA's can use as well as home DIY tools.

The aim is that this will be a resource accessible to anyone in Bucks linking up all the repair cafes and recycle shops and where we can promote craft workshops and open days. The opportunities are endless.

#### **Haddenham Community Shop**

Cllr Greg Smith provided the following update:

The Community Board Grant awarded in January 2023 allowed the Haddenham Community the opportunity to develop a community ownership scheme for the much-loved local greengrocer, 'Blooming Fruity'. The Community Board is aware that when the current owner decided to sell, the Community expressed a strong interest in maintaining the shop as a community owned business if a private enterprise did not come forward.

A broad-based team of residents came together to work on the project. Additional funding has been secured from the Haddenham Beer Festival Committee and considerable progress has been made over the last seven months.

The community Board grant funded membership of The Plunket Foundation, who provide professional advice and support to community ownership schemes. This support has been invaluable. A Community Benefit Society (CBS) was registered, a type of cooperative society regulated by the FCA. Some considerable time, professional expertise and legal advice was secured to ensure that a reasonable valuation of the business was established. This provided assurance for the business going forward.

The CBS conducted a few surveys of the community to gauge the real level of support. This included Radio interviews (which credited the CB) and house to house delivery of over 2000 leaflets, also crediting the Community Board. In addition, a number of community engagement events were run to raise awareness of the project and promote the CBS.

This activity enabled the business, formally known as Haddenham Community Enterprise Ltd(HCEL), to Launch a share offer on 12<sup>th</sup> July 2023. The offer closed in August 2023 having raised around £120 000. An offer has been made for the shop and has been accepted. Solicitors are engaged in the transfer of ownership which is planned for 25<sup>th</sup> September 2023. Currently an advert is out for a full time (job share) manager and the shop will maintain two current part time staff members with the intention to recruit volunteers to help develop the shop further.

HCEL will arrange a launch gathering/ party around the transfer of ownership and will send an invitation to the Community Board. The real work starts at the end of September!

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# Local Plan – progress and next steps

The Local Plan for Buckinghamshire (LP4B) provides a major opportunity to shape the growth of Buckinghamshire over the next 15 years and beyond. It will identify areas for new housing and employment, while also designating areas for protection and enhancement, such as our valued landscapes, natural habitats and heritage.

Earlier this year we carried out a public engagement survey on the draft vision and objectives for the LP4B. We received about 700 responses to the Local Plan for Buckinghamshire Vision and Objectives which we are in the process of analysing and considering.

We have now published an <u>interactive map and basic details</u> of the 1,000 or so sites which were submitted in response to our two Calls for Brownfield Sites and our Wider Call for Sites. We are assessing these sites for their suitability, availability and achievability

(including viability) to accommodate development. This work will help us to shape the first Buckinghamshire Housing and Economic Land Availability Assessment (HELAA).

Our next local plan public engagement work is likely to take place in early 2024, subject to Cabinet approval. This will be on possible high-level growth scenarios for the spatial distribution of new development to meet assessed levels of housing and employment need.

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# PickMeUp expands to Flackwell Heath

Wycombe's PickMeUp on-demand bus service, introduced by Buckinghamshire Council to reach residents not serviced by regular bus routes, has expanded to include Flackwell Heath. The expansion will help improve links from Flackwell Heath to Loudwater, Cressex, Booker and other parts of town.

Launched as a pilot in September 2022, it is funded by a three-year, central Government Rural Mobility Fund grant. It has proved popular, providing 1,500 rides per week and running Monday to Friday from 6am to 7pm.

Now after reviewing how the service is being used, and in response to requests from the local community, the council and operator Carousel Buses are pleased to extend the benefits of the service to many more potential passengers.

An additional vehicle will now operate at the morning and afternoon peak to keep up with demand. Fares reflect other local bus services and bus tickets such as Wycombe Smart Zone tickets and Concessionary Bus Passes are valid.

#### **Energy Doctor**

Buckinghamshire Council has introduced a new Energy Doctor scheme as one of the initiatives funded by its allocation of the Government's UK Shared Prosperity Fund.

Under the scheme, domestic resource efficiency officers are visiting qualifying homes to assess and advise on measures that can reduce energy consumption and costs.

The team also installs suitable low-cost measures in homes such as draught proofing, hot water cylinder insulation jackets, reflective radiator panels, secondary glazing film and LED lights.

To qualify for an Energy Doctor visit, applicants must meet all of the following criteria:

- They rent the property through a private rental agreement, or own and live in the property
- The household has an income of £30,000 or less (before tax), is in receipt of meanstested benefits such as Universal Credit and Council Tax Support, or a member of the household is disabled
- The domestic property has an energy performance certificate (EPC) rating of D, E, F or G, or does not legally require an EPC
