Working with local organisations and partners, the board were instrumental in the creation of the Chiltern and South Bucks Food Group linking in with the Buckinghamshire Food Partnership.

The Lady Ryder All Abilities garden set within a walled haven will provide an area of tranquillity, learning and engagement for individuals of all abilities. The therapeutic benefits of horticulture, the opportunity for social interaction offers the chance to regain self confidence and self esteem and escape isolation in particular following the pandemic.



Transitions UK Aspire Project offers a mentoring and support service for young people at risk of offending or criminal exploitation or who have offended and are choosing to avoid a future of crime. 4 individuals in our board area will receive this mentoring and support for up to two years.
