

National Policy Context - Local Nature Recovery Strategies

National Policy Context for the LNRS



Local Nature Recovery Strategies: a new system of spatial strategies for nature

- Required by the Environment Act 2021
- Agree priorities for nature's recovery and wider environment
- Mapped "opportunities"
- 48 LNRSs will cover the whole of England
- Locally-led
- "Responsible Authorities" will lead their production
- Updates every 5 years



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LNRSs will identify both nature and wider environmental priorities

- LNRSs will identify areas of potential importance for biodiversity as well as other environmental benefits
- To better align efforts to address all environmental issues e.g.
 - Climate change mitigation through tree planting and peat restoration
 - Natural flood management
 - Improved water quality
- LNRSs will identify the places where, once action has been taken on the ground, will support the Nature Recovery Network to grow over time

How does government intend LNRSs to be used?


- A shared creation encouraging local organisations and individuals interested in nature recovery to work together
- Guide mandatory biodiversity net gain investments. Uplift in biodiversity units created on sites identified by LNRSs
- Strengthened biodiversity duty on public authorities
- Channel investment into local priorities for protection and enhancement e.g. nature for climate
- Planning White Paper: planning system will play a proactive role in environmental enhancement
- Help local planning authorities understand locations important for conserving and enhancing biodiversity.

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Statutory Guidance and process of producing a LNRS

What will the Local Nature Recovery Strategy consist off?



LNRS Regulations

Powers come from Section 105 of the Environment Act, which is what creates the role of the Responsible Authority

Creation of 'Supporting Authorities'

Establishing the role of Supporting Authorities and how Responsible Authorities should work with them. A key part of making sure LNRSs are genuinely collaborative

Requirements for wider engagement

How to bring a far wider range of organisations and viewpoints into LNRS preparation, including publishing information online and the need for public consultation



Publication requirements, rules for review and republication

Must be published by the RA and provided to Defra. Reviews will be announced by the Secretary of State every 3-10 years

Dispute Resolution

How to resolve disagreement between RAs and SAs should they occur. Good engagement across LNRS preparation will likely prevent this

LNRS Statutory Guidance

Powers come from Section 106 of the Environment Act, which outline what must be in an LNRS

C Stepwise process

Links all the required elements of the LNRS together into a logical series of steps that opens up preparation for stakeholder input

Other plans and strategies

When to draw on other pre-existing work, not reinventing the wheel and helping to draw together action for different objectives that benefit nature

Ambitious, but deliverable

LNRSs are meant to be practical and deliverable, rather than a vision of how we wish things to be. They are important, but not as important as the action on the ground we want them to lead to


'Areas of importance'

Defining what this means for Local Habitat Maps. Includes: national conservation sites (SSSIs and Local Nature Reserves)

Environment objectives

Helping guide LNRSs to focus on local opportunities that contribute to national targets

Our Responsibilities, Financial Implications and next steps

What are the financial implications for the council?

- Defra have confirmed new burdens funding of £238,000 over next two financial years for preparation of Bucks and MK LNRS
- £126,956 in 23/24 and £111,044 in 23/24
- No revenue implications for Buckinghamshire Council budget as a result of preparation of LNRS
- Delivery of LNRS priorities will be via biodiversity net gain, environment land management and other government funding streams related to nature recovery and climate change(i.e. woodland creation grants)

What are the implications for the council?

- Buckinghamshire Council appointed as Responsible Authority for geographic area of Buckinghamshire and Milton Keynes
- Responsible for preparing the Local Nature Recovery Strategy in accordance with Regulations and Guidance
- Responsible for reporting on progress to Defra every 5 years
- Responsible for updating the LNRS every 5 years(further new burdens funding will be provided for this)
- The government intends for local nature recovery strategies to inform the local planning process. Local planning authorities must have regard to LNRS in complying with the strengthened biodiversity duty. Further guidance is awaited from the government on this

Next steps

- Formal appointment of Buckinghamshire Council as Responsible Authority by Secretary of State - July 23
- Confirmation of Service Level Agreement between Buckinghamshire Council, MK Council and Bucks Natural Environment Partnership regarding preparation of LNRS. – August 23 - setting out roles and responsibilities
- Distribution of new burden funding by Defra to Responsible Authorities – September 23
- Commencement of process expected to take 12-18 months. Series of 8 introductory webinars held in July 23 for stakeholders. Completion by Nov 2024
- Formal public consultation before consideration for approval/adoption and submission to Secretary of State.
