7. Anglian Water and Thames Water submit annual reports to the TECC Select **Committee on the progress** reducing towards amount and duration of overflows storm and discharge events in the county, well as improving their infrastructure Buckinghamshire.

#### **Anglian Water** Yes

Anglian Water is currently increasing understanding of storm overflow operation across the region through the delivery of investigations in our Water Industry National **Environment Programme** (WINEP). We recognised the imperative of this work and have accelerated the programme to deliver 100% coverage of storm overflows by December 2023, with 73% already delivered. This has included ecological modelling of storm overflows in targeted river catchments.

The storm overflow investigation programme includes approximately ten (10) assets within Buckinghamshire and is helping to inform our storm overflow strategy for 2025-2030 (AMP8) and beyond.

#### **Anglian Water**

Position remains the same as 6 months ago.

#### **Thames Water**

We will be happy to provide an annual update on an agreed date each year. We have set out our plans for reducing harm to rivers and communities in a document which can be downloaded from our website: https://www.thameswater.co.uk/medialibrary/home/aboutus/performance/river-health/riverhealth-report.pdf This includes a commitment to reduce the total annual duration of discharges by 50% by 2030, and within that a commitment to achieve at least 80% in sensitive catchments. This will see us progressing further and faster than the targets set in the Government's Storm Overflow Reduction Plan.
